GARNER TO BE TRIED IN JUSTICE GEO. JONES' COURT

Chan Garner, arrested here a week ago charged with possession of intoxicating liquor, was discharged from the federal court at Portland, and has been rearrested by Sheriff Starmer and will be tried in the local justice court. Garner was arrested on the 31st of last month, when his car, loaded with 101 gallons of alcohol was stopped by federal officers south of this city. He was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Hopkins where he waived examination and was placed under \$2,500 bonds. The federal court, however, for some reason did not take the case, and Sheriff Starmer took the prisoner in custody for a trial in the local justice court, where possession will be charged.

ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION TO BE BIG EVENT

Olden of Kane street south of Oak, and on Cass street east and West of Kane.

American Legion men will aid in forming the parade and will direct entries to their proper position and signal for them to start.

The parade will disband near the Antlers Theatre where the program is to be given. The program will be opened by the Douglas County Band, and Mrs. Fred Strang will also assist in the music. The chief speaker will be Hon. O. P. Coshow, associate justice of the Oregon Supreme Court.

At noon a free "chow" will be provided at the Armory for all ex-service men. This is not for American Legion men alone but is for any veteran, and visiting world war vets are invited to attend. This is an annual feed furnished by the local post and is an opportunity for the veterans to get together for a social time and talkfest.

In the afternoon there will be a machine gun demonstration by the local machine gun company at 2 o'clock. The guardsmen will place their weapons on Finlay field and will fire at targets on Reservoir hill. This will be an interesting and instructive exhibition.

It will be followed by a football game between the local American Legion post team and the Eugene All-Stars, one of the three U. of O. freshmen eleven. The local team is to be strengthened by the presence of Wally Rapp, former brilliant high school star, and there is no question but that a fine game is assured. In order to protect itself from loss in the event of rain, the local post has insured the game for rain, because a heavy financial outlay has been assumed in bringing the Eugene team here. The day's celebration will close in the evening with a vaudeville and dance. The vaudeville will start at the armory promptly at 7:30 o'clock and will continue until shortly after 8 p. m., when

the mard-gras dance will start. The legion post, which is sponsoring the program, is being given excellent cooperation. The local merchants today announced that stores will be closed all day, in order to give the clerical force of each business an opportunity to attend the various events.

The Spanish American war veterans of George Starmer Camp No. 19, have taken a firm stand of cooperation with the American Legion post in supporting the observance of the day. The action of Thomas McCusker of Portland to keep stores open in Portland, has been condemned in no uncertain terms, and support given the American Legion in the resolution adopted at the last meeting of 23 veterans, the resolution being as follows:

RESOLVED: That we condemn the action of Thomas McCusker in writing the letter expressing certain sentiments opposing the observance of Armistice Day, that we consider the letter an insult to all soldiers of our country and especially to the memories of our heroic dead, who made the great sacrifice for Freedom and Humanity.

That the sentiments expressed therein are repugnant to good government and good citizenship. Be it further resolved that we endorse the stand taken by the Veterans Organizations of Portland and hereby place ourselves on record in favor of the proper observance of Armistice Day.
