REEDSPORT — Reorganization of the Far West Manufacturing company and sale of this firm to C. McC. Johnson of Reedspport was announced at the company's headquarters late Saturday afternoon. Possibility of a sale was made known sometime ago, but the final signatures were not written until late this week. The new owner is a lumberman and banker of Reedspport. This morning Mr. McC. Johnson took over active control of the business. The company will be reorganized soon and eventually the pay roll will be increased to twice the size of what it was this summer when 10 men were employed, it is announced. Other products will be added to the output of the firm in the spring, the new owner announced today.

STRUGGLE FOR POSSESSION OF SYRIA GOES ON

French Aviators Dropping Bombs on Druse Horde Near Damascus

CAVALRY COOPERATE

American's Letter Tells of Horrors Prevalent—French Unable to Win, He Says

(Associated Press Special Wire.) PARIS, Nov. 10.—The French troops in Syria will take the offensive against the rebels tomorrow, La Liberté's Cairo correspondent declares. A great encircling movement was under way today, while two regiments of cavalry were directly pressing the forces of the bandit chief, Bakri, who recently was proclaimed "president of the Syrian Republic." French aviators were bombing the insurgents within plain sight of Damascus. War Horror Described. LONDON, Nov. 10.—Additional light has been thrown on the situation in Syria, where the French are faced with an insurrection of tribesmen, by receipt here of an uncensored letter from an American arriving in Haifa from the troubled region. On October 31, he writes, there were 30,000 Arabians in Beirut, crowded into an "unspeakable" camp, and refugees were arriving from Damascus at the rate of 4,000 daily. The refugees were sheltered in houses constructed of oil tins and the crowding was "terrible," as many as nine people living in a single small room—cooking, eating and sleeping in this tiny quarter. The sanitary arrangements were totally inadequate and water scarce. Many of the refugees were ill, with no medicine, and the children were pale and sickly. The writer confirms previously published statements that no Americans or British were reported killed up to that time. "The situation is getting very serious," the letter continues. "The French will have to bring in a much larger force before they can conquer the bandits and Druses (tribesmen). The Druses have caused trouble ever since the war was peopled and the French cannot conquer them with 30,000 men, which is all they have there now. They need several times that number."
