## OREGON FRUITS TO BE USED FOR CHRISTMAS GIFTS

An all-Oregon product gift campaign is being started by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and will be carried on until Christmas time. ## SHERIFF DENIES CHARGES MADE AT COTTAGE GROVE

A few days ago a dispatch was received from Cottage Grove, stating that the officers of that city had placed a man under arrest there upon instructions from the Sheriff's office of Douglas County, and that the local officers had failed to follow up the case, causing the Cottage Grove authorities to become peeved. The item stated that because of this action the Cottage Grove officers would no longer cooperate with the sheriff's office here.

Sheriff Starmer stated today that he was out of the city at the time he was notified of the situation, and that it was not called to his attention until today. The case did not originate in the sheriff's office, he states, and none of his deputies were concerned in the matter.

The man arrested, who gave his name as Rasmussen, negotiated a considerable purchase at a local garage, and failed to make payment. The garage man trailed him as far as Sutherlin and seeing that he could not catch up had Rasmussen stopped at Cottage Grove, Rasmussen left a spare tire as security and the garage man then refused to hold him longer.

Sheriff Starmer yesterday called on Deputy Sheriff Pletcher, at Cottage Grove, and explained the situation, and the same friendly relations which formerly existed between the officers have been restored. The Roseburg and Cottage Grove authorities have worked in close cooperation for a number of years, and many lawbreakers have fallen victims to the vigilance of the authorities who thru their close connections have accomplished much good for their respective communities.

## INQUEST TO FOLLOW AUTO FATALITY IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10.—Decision to hold inquest over the death of Mrs. Ethel Golt, who died yesterday of injuries received when she was crushed between her husband's auto and a runaway one, was reached today by Dr. Earl Smith, county coroner.

Yesterday C. P. McDowell, whose car ran away from the curb a block and a half away and struck the woman, appeared in municipal court and paid a \$25 fine for having defective brakes.

Municipal Judge Ekwall, who assessed the fine, said that no mention had been made of her serious injury.

## BOOZE, ANGRY HUSBAND, PISTOL, MURDER TRIAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10.—Leroy Hansen, ex-penal city police officer, fired two shots at James Elliott, a friend, before he turned and fatally shot James A. Day in a rooming house at 349 Twelfth street the night of August 16, according to Elliott's testimony before a jury in Circuit Judge Hewitt's court today.

Both shots at Elliott went wild, the witness said.

Hansen is on trial before Judge Hewitt on a first degree murder charge.

Elliott said that he and Day had taken a few drinks in Day's apartment.
