Too Many Office Holders

CHICAGO, Nov. 11—General James G. Harbord, in an Armistice Day speech today, declared "a decent personal liberty as to milder forms of beverage, with the accompanying appropriate internal revenue tax, would obviate the necessity of a income tax in this country."

Whether the powers of our government shall be legislative, judicial and executive, as contemplated by the constitution, or be distributed among a wilderness of commissions and committees, semi-legislative and semi-executive in character, but at all times outside the constitution, is a choice which the American people must make.

"The direct primary, outside the principles of representative government and marking the drift toward pure democracy which when once established, no government has ever long survived, susceptible of corruption, expensive and inefficient in the crop of office holders it has produced, charges your decision as to its survival."

"The amendment of the Volstead Act, far wider in its application than was ever contemplated by the Eighteenth Amendment, its disregard of the constitutional provision against unreasonable searches and seizures, and the wholesale official corruption to which it has led, is an issue which patriotic Americans must face."

NO SOUL, NO CRIME

PLEA REJECTED IN TRIAL OF BLAZER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

LITTLETON, Col., Nov. 11.—The "no soul—no crime" plea of counsel defending Dr. Harold Elmer Blazer, charged in district court here with the murder of his 34-year-old daughter, Hazel, the "child woman," found no response in Judge Samuel Johnson today when he overruled a motion by Lewis Mowry, chief of defense counsel, asking for a directed verdict acquitting the country doctor.

Harking back to the old English common law, Mowry held that the girl was not a human being, as comprehended by the statutes of Colorado. Following on this presumption, he declared that the state had failed to prove the imbecile girl had a soul.

Further, he contended, the state had failed to prove corpus delicti or that the defendant was sane.

The motion was made in the judge's chambers and promptly overruled by the court.

JUGO-SLAVS ONCE MORE VENT ANGER AGAINST ITALIANS

VIENNA, Nov. 11.—Demonstrations against an Italian literary society at Slavica, Jugo Slavia, culminated in a shooting affray last night between the demonstrators and the police. About 100 shots were fired and dispatches say many were wounded.

The whole affair was wholly contrary to the formal orders of Premier Mussolini, who had directed that no reprisals be taken for the recently discovered plot on his life. The foreign minister concluded by deploring the anti-Italian manifestations throughout Jugo-Slavia last Sunday, which were marked by the burning of Italian flags.
