BRITISH SUBMARINE, UNABLE TO RISE, BEYOND HUMAN AID; 68 ABOARD FACE SLOW DEATH

Lies Off Devonshire at Depth Which Precludes Diving Operations or Effort to Raise Her—30 Year Old Captain Married 11 Months Ago—Boat in no Collision, Cause of Plight Mystery

PLYMOUTH, England, Nov. 13.—The submarine M-1 was located today on the bed of the sea 12 miles southwest of Start Point, Devonshire. There is a slight chance that members of the crew of 68 are still alive.

The M-1, which disappeared during maneuvers in the channel yesterday morning, is said to be lying at too great a depth to permit either diving operations or attempts to bring her to the surface.

The naval rescue ships are reported to have ascertained that the M-1 had not suffered from any collision and for this reason it is thought the men on board may be still alive.

If they are, experts say, they face a terrible lingering death, as the boat is of too great a size and lying in too deep water to permit raising her.

The M-1 is one of the largest and newest submarines in the British navy, the distinguishing feature of her class being that they each carry one 12-inch gun. She is much larger than the American S-51, which went down off Block Island recently.

Tragedy Pathetic.
The tragedy is one of the greatest in the history of the British submarine service. So far as can be recalled the crew of the M-1—68 officers and men—is the largest ever involved in an accident aboard an English submersible.

Lieutenant Commander A. M. Carrie, who was in charge of the 11-starred craft, has a distinguished service record, although only 30 years of age. He was married 11 months ago and has a five weeks' old son.

Many of the others of the crew were married. One, Petty Officer George Morgan, has a family of seven children, the oldest 11 years and the youngest two months.
