NEW YEAR'S EDITION TO BE A BIG ONE

The 1926 New Year's edition of the Roseburg News-Review will be the largest newspaper ever published in southern Oregon, according to present indications and the work of assembling the material to fill the columns of this mammoth edition is rapidly being completed.

One entire section of the paper will be devoted to the pioneers of the county and will contain historical articles dealing with the founding of Roseburg and other pioneer towns.

THREATS OF RAID PUTS GUARD OVER IRISH DOCUMENTS

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Twenty seven armed police and detectives, the Daily Mail says, are guarding day and night the office in Clement's Inn, London, where the documents relating to work of the Irish boundary commission are kept. Information received by the authorities of a possible Irish Republican raid on the office, are responsible for this precaution. Clement's Inn is one of the Inns of the courts of justice.

All the documents which have been prepared since the commission was formed are kept in Clement's Inn and though a successful raid would not affect the findings of the commission, the loss would delay the decision and give the irreconcilables, who are bitterly hostile to the commission's work, inside knowledge of everything concerning the commission's activities.

MARION COUNTY TWISTER ONLY OF LESSER DEGREE

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 16.—No great damage resulted from the tornado which swept a section of the Willamette Valley in the Independence district last Wednesday, declared Edward L. Wells, government weather forecaster who returned today from a tour of inspection of the storm area.

"I found some evidence of a tornado, but it was not a strong one," he said. "I found no well defined path where damage was done, but I found evidence of a whirl of the wind and of an explosive force.

UTE WHO BURIED HIS BABY ALIVE PLACED ON TRIAL

PUEBLO, Colo., Nov. 16.—The trial of Platt Nae, a Ute Indian brave, on a charge of murdering his 17-day old daughter by burying it alive in the grave of its mother was delayed in the United States court today because some of the government's Indian witnesses strayed from the government building and are roaming over Pueblo.

Case E. Harrington, Jr., and Ivor E. Green, defense attorneys question the witnesses informally and announced that their defense would be that Nae lived in extreme fear of Mormon Joe, his father-in-law, the Ute medicine man, and that the burial of the baby was made under Mormon Joe's orders. Mormon Joe, it has been asserted, claimed burial of the baby would restore the mother's life.

Mormon Joe, the only witness to be subpoenaed by the defense, was brought from the state penitentiary today under heavy guard. He is serving a sentence of from 25 to 30 years for the murder of a cell-mate, who taunted him about the burial of the baby. At that time Mormon Joe was held on a charge of being an accessory to the killing of the infant.

COMBINE LEGAL IF CONTROL OF TRADE IS NOT INTENTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 16.—The Western Pine Manufacturers' Association, which was charged yesterday by the federal government in a civil action tried here, with violating the Sherman anti-trust laws, today was given a clean bill of health in orders filed in federal court by Judge Wilbur P. Booth.

In effect the order of the court entered following stipulation of the defendants and the attorney-general, recognizes the fairness and legality of all trade practices of the Western Pine Manufacturers' Association.

There were more than sixty defendant individuals and firms cited in the original action.

Final disposition of this case, which is regarded as one of the most important in its effects upon trade associations, means that Trade organizations, consisting of members who are competitors, legally may compile statistics of production, post sales and stocks on hand, may conduct educational campaigns to stimulate trade and may engage in all similar activities to enhance methods of doing business, so long as those practices do not actually fix prices or control production.

KELSO MEN LOST ON BEAR HUNT IN HEAVY SNOWFALL

LONGVIEW, Wash., Nov. 16.—Fears were felt for Al Gordon and Ralph Burchett, both of Kelso, who have been missing since Saturday and are believed to be in a snow storm on the upper Coveeman, where the pair had gone on a bear hunt.

Gordon and Burchett left the ranger station early Saturday morning. They had expected to return to Kelso Saturday night. Only lightly clothed and provided with a few sandwiches, their predicament may be serious, as a heavy snow storm is reported falling on the headwaters of the Coveeman, a wild and very sparsely settled mountainous region. The men are believed to be in the big game region, 30 miles east of Kelso, where a searching party is now conducting a hunt for them.

Gordon recently was convicted on a charge of embezzling Kelso city water department funds and a jury in a similar case disagreed and was discharged.
