With the purpose of enlisting the support of the Coos County Chamber of Commerce in the North Umpqua Road project, a delegation composed of A. C. Marsters, Senator B. L. Eddy, Forest Supervisor, Carl B. Neal, Bert G. Bates and L. Antles, left this morning for Coquille to attend the banquet for directors of all of the chambers of commerce of Coos county.

The North Umpqua road project has been recommended to the government as a forest highway, but the endorsement of the state highway commission is necessary. The road is of great importance to all of the Coos Bay and Reedsport districts, and all Chambers of Commerce in Douglas and Coos counties will be asked to appoint representatives to go before the state highway commission with a request that the road be designated as a part of the forest highway system.

So it is that the little French girl discovers a new existence, though she learns to her sorrow that even here folks look most upon a career such as her mother's.

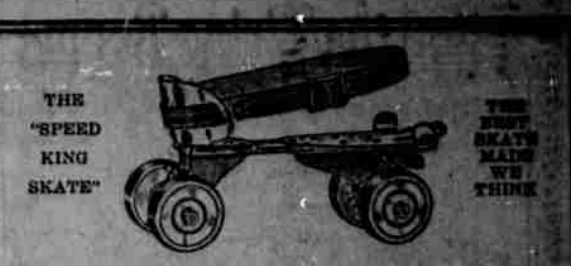
