The Community Chest campaign has now resulted in contributions amounting to \$6,872.65. The work

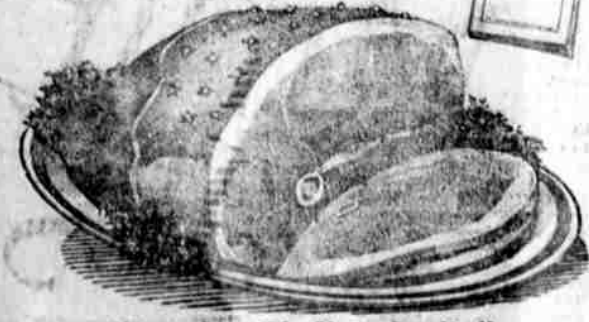

WOODARD RELIES ON SPEED TO WIN FROM SPEC WOODS

Ernie Woodard, Portland welterweight who meets Spec Woods in the 16-round headliner at the armory in this city tomorrow, arrived here this morning with his manager, Virgil Hamlin, who went on to Medford with seven other scrappers, who will appear in the Elks smoker there tonight. Hamlin will return here tomorrow and on Saturday he will probably go to Ashland to put on a card for the Elks lodge there.

Woodard appears to be in first class shape. He will enter the ring at about 142 pounds, at least five pounds less than Woods will probably weigh. This handicap will be no cause for Woodard any worry, because he is confident he can easily offset it with speed, coupled with a thorough knowledge from personal observation of Woodard's style of fighting. Woodard is going into the fight, he declares, with the determination of doing his best to win. He is anxious to have another try at Cal Herman in this city, and he realizes that a victory over Woods is his one chance to get it. Owing to the long, tiresome ride from Portland, Woodard did not work out today, but he plans to go through the paces tomorrow afternoon.

The seven fighters whom Hamlin took to Medford for tonight's card there are Solly Burns and George Dixon, welter, who will oppose each other; Herold Reese and the Manila Tiger, 135-pounder, who will be the principal in another event; Freddie Anderson and Billy Robbins, 110-pounders for a third number, and Joe Jewett, recently knocked out by Ernie Woodard at Salem, who will swap punches with Johnny Carlson, of Gold Hill, in the headliner.
