

FOOTBALL OUTLOOK IS GOOD DESPITE SEASON'S DEFEATS

Faced by one of the strongest teams of the state, claimants for state championship honors, the Roseburg football team went down to a pitiful defeat yesterday when the galloping Medford warriors crushed the local eleven by a score of 102 to 0. The Medford first team started the game with three touchdowns in almost as many minutes. After the slaughter was well along, the Medford second team went in, but there was little difference in the result, and the Roseburg players were left fanning the air as the visitors ran foot races all over the field. Hopelessly outplayed, Roseburg continued to fight, but Medford was too much for the inexperienced Roseburg squad, and the game was too one-sided to be interesting.

The Roseburg team gave everything it had, and a few times held Medford for downs, but a revolving play, cross buck, or trick formation left them flat-footed wondering what it was all about.

"Roseburg people have no right to be discouraged over the poor showing made this year," Coach Doubet said, in commenting on the results of this year. "We started the season with a green team. The boys are nearly all freshmen and sophomores, light in weight, young and inexperienced. Only four knew the first principles of football. From this material we have had to build a team. We could have made up an eleven which would have perhaps been flashy and able to make a better showing, but instead of doing that we have worked for the future. The Roseburg team has demonstrated a knowledge of the fundamentals of the game equal to any team they have met. On straight football they have been of a par with any opponents.

"They have a basic foundation upon which to work. They have the experience of fighting the strongest of opposition. They know how to take defeat and go down fighting, and everyone must admit that the team fought even when hopelessly defeated.

"Our line, outweighed - game, was able to make a good showing, out greatest handicap being in the lack of a fast, speedy runner in the backfield.

"It takes years to build up a winning team. If the Roseburg team had been winning games they would have had a glad hand from everyone, but because they are losing they receive little encouragement. We have now the best prospects for a winning team that he have had for years, and the team should be given support. This means that we can start in next season right where we left off, and can take up the new points which we lacked this season. The following year the squad will still be intact, will have put on weight, and Roseburg should be well represented.

"Next year the team should start winning. Perhaps not every game, but they will be, we believe, on a par with the average high school of the state. The third year, they should be among the best and with the willingness to obey orders, follow instruction, and with the school spirit which they have shown, Roseburg may expect a good team to grow out of the defeats of this year."

The school will now turn to basketball, practice having already started among the classes. Each class has its teams, from which the members of the school squad will be chosen. The first team will then be picked from the squad.

Roseburg is expected to have a good basketball team this year, although the players will be handicapped by lack of weight. However there will be a great deal of speed, which will in a measure overcome the handicap.

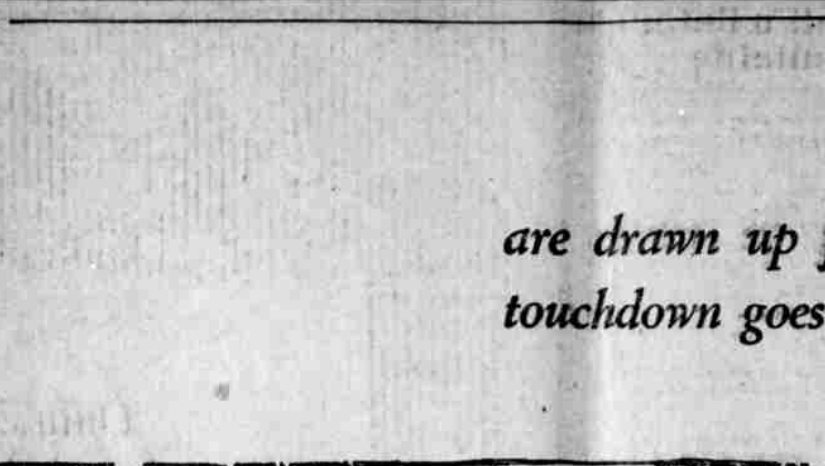

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50,000 MILES OF IMPROVED ROADS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 18.—The perfection of a national highway system embracing 50,000 miles of improved roads and connecting all the states and the larger cities, preliminary steps toward which were taken at a recent conference of Federal and state highway officials in Washington, will be one of the matters fully discussed at the convention and machinery exposition of the American Road Builders' Association to be held in Chicago, January 11-15, next. The new national highway system is to be perfected by the government in conjunction with the states through Federal aid. The routes will be marked and operated by the states.

On account of the great number of Federal, state, county, township and city highway officials, engineers, contractors and machinery and material men attending the convention, President W. H. Connell of the American Road Builders' Association, has divided the program of the convention into two divisions, one especially attractive to engineers and highway officials, and the

other to contractors and machinery and material manufacturers and dealers. Frank Sheets, state highway engineer of Illinois, and treasurer of the American Association of State Highway Officials, is in charge of program for highway engineers and officials and S. M. Williams, vice-president of the Autocar Sales and Service Company, is in charge of the contractor's program.
