OREGON WEDDINGS FEWER, DIVORCES ON THE INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The Department of Commerce announces that, according to returns received, there were in Oregon, for the calendar year 1924, 4,367 marriages performed and 2,945 divorces granted. For the calendar year 1923, 7,151 marriages and 2,894 divorces were reported. The decrease in marriages reported for 1924 from the number reported for 1923 is 184 or 2.6 per cent. The divorces reported for 1924 show an increase of 51 or 1.8 per cent over the number reported for 1923.

The statistics of marriages for 1924 were furnished by the state board of health and those of divorces for the same year by the county clerks. The figures are preliminary and subject to correction.

NEW TUMALO RESERVOIR LEAK MAY END PROJECT

SALEM, Nov. 23.—Efforts to save the Tumalo project reservoir that was constructed in 1913 about eight miles northwest of Bend have so far been futile, according to information received by State Engineer Luper from D. J. McElhan, engineer who has been working on the reservoir. McElhan reports that the reservoir has sprung new leak of 350 second feet. It began to leak soon after its construction and has never been repaired. This is not interfering with the development of the project, it is claimed, water being obtained from the Crescent Lake storage which was secured after the failure of the reservoir.

TAX REDUCTION ON 1926 PAYMENTS IS EXPECTATION NOW

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The House Ways and Means committee hoped to wind up today its six week task of framing a new revenue bill to reduce the nation's tax burden.

Carrying through this program, Chairman Green announced yesterday that he would present the non-partisan bill, providing for more than \$500,000,000 tax reduction annually and including relief to virtually every federal taxpayer, to the house on the opening day of the session, December 7.

SPECIAL TRAIN TO CARRY DELEGATES TO CONVENTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.—Active plans for a special train to carry the delegates of the Pacific coast to the mid-year meeting of the chamber of commerce of the United States to be held in Seattle, December 7th and 8th, are now reaching completion, according to announcement made here at western divisional headquarters of the national chamber. The reservations already made indicate that several hundred delegates and their wives from Arizona, California, Nevada, and Oregon will journey to the convention on this train.

The train is to originate in Los Angeles, where delegates from Arizona and Southern California will assemble. The train leaves Los Angeles December 4th and provides for an all day lay-over on December 5th in San Francisco. Here delegates from San Francisco, Oakland and adjacent points will join the train. At Sacramento the train will pick up delegates from the San Joaquin and Sacramento valleys and points in Nevada.

After crossing the Oregon line parties will board the train at Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass, Roseburg, Eugene and Salem. At Portland and Astoria, carrying fully one hundred representatives, will be added to the train.

This is the third annual mid-year meeting of the western division of the national chamber, and every indication is that it will be the most important, both from the standpoint of attendance and program. This special train from the east states will make up one of the most imposing business delegations ever attending a western convention. It is said.

TOURIST'S STORY LEADS CORONER ON HIKING TRIP.

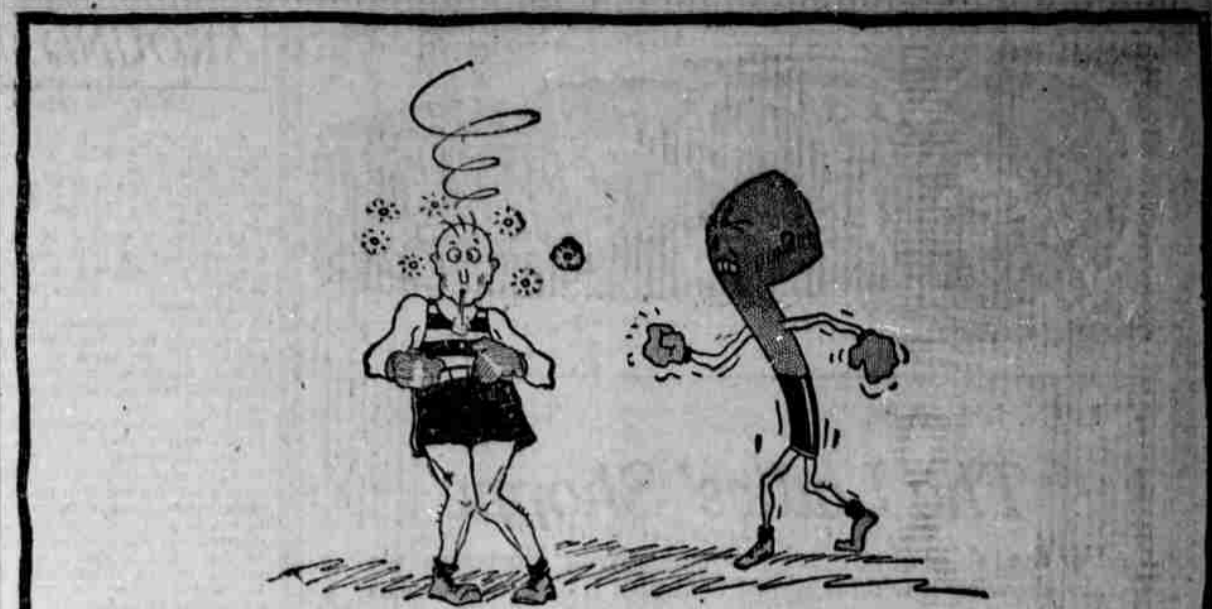

IDAHO MINING COMPANIES LOSES LONG COURT FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The supreme court refused yesterday to entertain the appeal of the Bunker Hill and Sullivan and three other mining companies who sought to have reviewed a decision of the lower courts holding that 230 acres of land owned by Jacob Polk, Shoshone county, Idaho, had been demised by operations of mining companies on the south fork of the Coeur d'Alene river through pollution of water and by inundations and overflows.

DOCTOR, FORMER MAYOR ADMITS HE IS AN IMPOSTER

CORDOVA, Alaska, Nov. 24.—After posting for four years as Dr. John Akin Flanders, serving as mayor of Kenai for three years, and ministering to the medical needs of cannery employes at Bristol Bay and Kenai, Rudolph Griess, former Chicago medical student, was here today on his way to spend a year and a day at the federal penitentiary on McNeill's Island.

Griess was convicted at Seldovia for violations of Alaska narcotic laws, after admitting during the course of a trial on a statutory charge that he was not the man he pretended to be.

Dr. John A. Flanders, who is said to be a Chicago physician, was Griess' roommate at Loyola College medical school in 1915. Griess testified. Using Dr. Flanders' name in San Francisco in 1921 Griess obtained employment as a doctor for Libby, McNeil and Libby canneries at Bristol Bay and Kenai.

Griess was acquitted of the statutory charge.

RUSSIA STAYS OUT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

MOSCOW, Nov. 24.—Soviet Russia firmly intends in the future, as in the past, to stand aloof from the League of Nations and similar organizations, Acting Foreign Minister Litvinoff declared yesterday in a carefully prepared official statement. The Locarno security treaties will not alter the Soviet foreign policy, he said.

SOVIET GOVERNMENT SUED FOR MILLIONS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—Suit to recover \$45,587,000 from the Russian Soviet government was filed in supreme court today by F. Dudley Kopler, an attorney representing the Uesiflo, Inc., a New York corporation. The corporation, as assignor of Sophy Kapnist, Marie Karppf and Vera Karppf Pesteroff, alleges that the three women on December 5, 1919, were deprived by the Soviet government of gold rubles, jewelry, a bond and property to the value named in the suit.

BOWERS IN CANADA.

Portland newspapers recently carried an account stating that Robert G. Bowers, a former resident of Roseburg was missing from the metropolis under circumstances indicating the possibility of foul play. Bowers, it was stated, had sold a ranch, and had \$15,000 on his person, and had suddenly dropped out of sight. County Judge Quine this morning received a letter from the missing man, stating that he is now located in Edmonton, Canada, but expects to return to Roseburg soon.
