## SUPREME COURT DECIDES 2 CASES OF IMPORTANCE

SALEM, Nov. 24.—An act of the 1925 legislature requiring that the quantity of hops picked by pickers in Oregon be estimated by weight and not by boxes is constitutional, according to an opinion of the supreme court handed down today in the case of C. A. McLaughlin, Polk county grower, against Joseph N. Helgeson, district attorney for Polk county. The opinion affirms Judge W. M. Ramsey of the lower court for Polk county.

McLaughlin brought suit to restrain the district attorney and sheriff from enforcing the penal provisions of the act on grounds that the act was unconstitutional and that its enforcement would injuriously effect his business.

Judge L. H. McMahon, judge for lower court for Marion county, is affirmed in the case of the National Thrift Association, appellant, against W. E. Crowe, state corporation commissioner, a mandamus proceeding to compel the corporation commissioner to issue a dealer's permit authorizing the association to sell certain securities.

The opinion was written by Justice Belt. The corporation proposed a scheme of selling "thrift tickets."

"This scheme," says the opinion of Justice Belt, after describing the proposed scheme, "reminds us of get-rich-quick Wallingford. It certainly does not have the appearance of a legitimate business enterprise."

INFLUX OF MIGRANTS CONTINUES TO ADD TO NORTHWEST UNEMPLOYED

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—The number of unemployed men in the Pacific northwest was further increased last week by the continued influx of migratory workers from other districts, according to the U. S. employment letter issued here today. Pine lumber cutting in the inland empire districts is undergoing seasonal curtailment and many men have been laid off during the

past week.

Fire logging and lumbering continue active, the 4L letter stated, but shingle production is being reduced, several of the smaller shingle plants having been closed and many others being operated at less than capacity.

General construction work is giving employment to less than half the number of men at work one month ago. Municipal work in most northwestern cities is being done on reduced schedules. Farmers are calling for but few men. Jobs now being offered at employment centers are largely of a temporary nature, and there are many applicants for each job offered.

## FRENCH GARRISON HAS CLOSE CALL

BEIRUT, Syria, Nov. 24.—The French post at Rahebiya, west of Damascus, was relieved this afternoon after the garrison of 250 men had put up a strong defense, holding off several Druse attacks. Be-leagured in the citadel, the French defenders resorted to a bombardment of the town, to which the tribesmen had set fire.

The Druses retired in the direction of Damascus. It is reported that they suffered heavy casualties.

## SUPER HOLDUP GANG CAUGHT IN FRISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.—Five dapper young men, one of whom may be an escaped murderer from Seattle, with two women companions, are under arrest here as the supposed perpetrators of a series of robberies. The police announced today that they had recovered hundreds of dollars of loot at the two places in the city where members of the gang were found.

Floyd Richardson, 30, who is charged in the police records with having escaped from jail in Seattle after his conviction of murder in the shooting of a Seattle policeman, is the leader of the gang. The others are Richardson's brothers, Delmont, 22, and Fred, 24; Alvin Emmons, 25, and Harold Houghton, 18.

The women are "Bobbie" Richardson, 30, and Wanda La Fontee, 21.

"Ten or a dozen holdups a night were nothing to us," Floyd Richardson is said by the police to have bragged. Virtually all of the members of the gang were said by Richardson to have come from Seattle.

## Slated for Seat in U. S. Senate



It is reported that Dwight F. Davis, assistant secretary of war, will be named to the senate seat vacated by the death of Senator Seldon P. Spencer of Missouri. Davis' home is in St. Louis.

## Duchess Refuses to Desert Lapdog



Rather than be separated from her dog, "Ginko," Milliecent, dowager Duchess of Sutherland, once leader of London society, left the fashionable Blackstone Hotel, Chicago, and sought refuge elsewhere. Officials insisted that she register the dog in the subterranean kennels of the hotel.

## S. P. WILL BOOST RATES ON BUTTER, EGGS AND CHEESE

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 24.—A new scale of class rates on commodities moving between California and Oregon points will be put into effect December 23 by the Southern Pacific company unless a suspension order comes from the Interstate Commerce Commission. This announcement was made here today by J. H. Muleahy, assistant traffic manager. Increases in typical instances range from 72 cents to \$2.11 a hundred pounds. Butter, eggs and cheese will be subjected to substantially higher freight charges.

The increase was ordered by the Interstate Commerce Commission without a formal hearing. Portland shipping interests indicated today that protests will be made by Portland, San Francisco and Oakland shipper's organizations in the hope that the order will be suspended.

## U. S. MEDIATION MADE ROW WORSE, CHILEAN ASSERTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ARICA, Chile, Nov. 24.—American U. S. mediation is making the row between Chile and Peru worse, according to Arturo Alessandri, president of Chile, in a speech delivered in Santiago today.

The former president's charges were made in a speech delivered yesterday afternoon at the funeral of a Carabinero, who was killed in an attack last Friday on a station at Mortutia.

"We went to Washington," Alessandri said, "and there we met with the justice and cooperation for the work of peace which we were looking for. But through events, which I hope will be corrected, those charged with carrying the olive branch as messengers of that great American people, instead of bringing peace, seem to have carried out a program bringing conflict, discord and hatred among the two peoples which they were to join with the holy bonds of fraternity and love."
