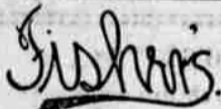

### Heat with gas. WOMEN VOLUNTEER BUILDERS AT BEND HAVE CLOSE CALL

BEND, Ore., Nov. 25.—Women engaged in nailing boards on a tabernacle being erected close to the downtown district yesterday narrowly escaped injury when the roof and one side of the building fell. Mrs. George Kistler of Powell Butte, one of the women at work on the building, was hit by falling boards, but was not seriously hurt. Lack of supports in the center of the building was thought to be responsible for the accident. The building, which was to have a seating capacity of 800 was being erected by contributed labor. Women worked with the men nailing on the weather boards, especially during the day time while men worked at night under electric lights strung from low poles. Only a few men were present yesterday when the roof and side fell in.

### FIRE INSPECTION MADE AT CITY SCHOOLS.

A committee made up of members of the Kiwanis Club, City School Superintendent, M. S. ### KLAMATH TREE STREET DECORATIONS MEET WITH OPPOSITION

The decoration of city streets with large, young evergreen trees at Christmas time, is a useless, wasteful practice, and should be discontinued, according to a statement just issued by the U. S. Forest Service.

The cutting of small seedling Christmas trees for home use, which better be left to grow into future sawtimber, thus contributing to the industrial stability of the region.

Decoration with greens and boughs is suggested instead. This would give the same holiday spirit, without the economic waste. It is also suggested that a large living fir tree be selected in one or more of the parks, to be decorated annually as a civic Christmas tree.

### CONVICTED MURDERER NOW PLEADS INSANITY

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 25.—Council for Harrison W. Noel of Montclair, under sentence to be electrocuted during the week of January 10 for the murder of Raymond Pierce, negro taxi cab driver, has appeared before the court of pardons with a plea for clemency, asserting Noel was insane and should not therefore be executed. Argument before the pardons court will be completed next week.

Noel is alleged to have killed Pierce to get his machine for the kidnapping of six year old Mary Daly, subsequently slain. Pierce and the Daly child also lived in Montclair.
