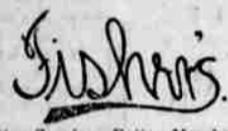

WOMEN DEMAND ATTENTION FOR LIFE ON FARMS

(Continued from Page 1.)

making:
 1. Conservation of time and energy through
 (a) Labor-saving equipment;
 (b) Installation of water, sewage, light, and heat systems;
 (c) Better methods;
 (d) Best use of material resources of the farm and home;
 (e) Wise and fair expenditures of time and money available for adding to comfort and attractiveness of the home.
 2. Cooperation within the family and community to realize the complete development of all members of the family, and to insure active and influential participation in civic life.
 Successful home life depends not only on conveniences and equipment, but also upon the physical condition, the health, of individual members of the family in the home. The close relation between food and health has been clearly realized in recent years, and experimentally established facts prove human food needs for an optimum condition of health. Failure to meet food needs has resulted in the poor physical condition of both children and adults in every part of this country. There are millions of children today growing to man and womanhood with physical handicaps, such as defective teeth, retarded growth, and lowered resistance to disease, due to faulty food and related health habits.
 People living on farms have

first chance at the most important foods for health—namely, dairy products, fresh vegetables and fruits, meats and eggs. We urge not only better use of this opportunity, but also that an effort be made to establish more generally essential food habits: first to prevent, and second to correct abnormal physical conditions, with special emphasis on the serving of hot lunches in rural schools.
 We recommend for good nutrition: That there be produced and retained for home use an adequate supply of milk, vegetables, fruit, meat and eggs. This involves more home gardens, more storage, and more preservation.
 We recommend also that the nutrition problems, involving not only personal food habits, but proper example to the children, be considered as family problems, and not merely of interest to women.
 To clothe the family economically, healthfully, and suitably is the responsibility of the women in the home. Suitable dress is a definite factor in promoting health and happiness. With this problem we need more help from the Extension service. In view of the unfulfilled demand for educational assistance in Home problems, we recommend that additional Home Economics workers be supplied in those subjects, clothing, nutrition and home improvement, which contribute to better homes and therefore are the most vital projects conducted by the Extension Service.
 We recommend that every rural organization include in its program definite support and systematic study of some of the problems relating to the home, such as sanitation and health conditions, nutrition, and home expenditures. Physical health and opportunity for development mentally and socially are fundamental, and any effective program for agriculture must include them. They must not only be adopted in the program, but must be stressed in developing it. The standard of physical, mental and social life must be set and consciously maintained in working out the program for improving, eventually, the rural life of Douglas County. This is the only method which can stimulate pride in and give dignity to rural life.

CHAPMAN BEGINS LEGAL FIGHT FOR LIFE ON MONDAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 26.—Every detail necessary to give Gerald Chapman, bandit and mail robber, at least three more months of life has now been completed with the exception of the signature of Governor John H. Trumbull to a second reprieve.
 That detail, the governor announces, will be given his attention tomorrow when he will take steps to stay the execution until March 3, 1926. Chapman had been sentenced to hang December 3 for robbery.
 With these legal acts completed, Chapman will launch into his final fight for his life, his first objective being to convince Federal Judge E. S. Thomas at a hearing at the state prison Monday that he is not compelled to accept President Coolidge's commutation, announced yesterday, of his 25-year federal sentence at Atlanta prison for mail robbery.

HUSKIES ACCUSED OF "ROUGH STUFF"; FACULTY TO PROBE

SEATTLE, Nov. 26.—President Suzzalo of the University of Washington today announced a conference tomorrow to discuss an answer to President Wilbur of Stanford University, who in a statement published yesterday charged illegal roughness November 7 in a football game between Stanford and Washington and November 14 in a contest between Washington and the University of California.
 Before calling the conference, Suzzalo issued orders that "no member of the Washington faculty, managerial or coaching staffs shall discuss the letter of President Wilbur. It is now a matter between Dr. Wilbur and me."
 Called to the conference were John E. Condon, dean of the Washington law school and chairman of the university's athletic council, who last Thursday at a lunch honoring the team said that Coach Warner of Stanford "needs a lesson in how to accept defeat gracefully." Enoch W. Bagshaw, football coach, and Dewey Melness, graduate manager.

FATAL ENCOUNTER PRESAGES ANOTHER ROW FOR BULGARIA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PARIS, Nov. 26.—A Sofia dispatch to La Liberte reports a frontier incident on the Bulgarian-Yugoslav border in which two men, believed to be Jugo-Slavs, and one Bulgarian soldier were killed.
 The dispatch says a party of four armed men attempted to penetrate Bulgarian territory between two villages, coming from Jugo-Slav territory. Shots were exchanged with a Bulgarian post, two Bulgarian soldiers being wounded in addition to the one killed. The two un wounded assailants retreated to Jugo-Slav soil.
