POLAND STIRRED
BY A PARALLEL TO
THE DREYFUS CASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
BERLIN, Nov. 27.—The Polish
"Dreyfus case" again is to the fore
in Germany through a confession
made by the Berlin police to Tothli
Olschanska that it was he who
threw a bomb last year at Presi-
dent Wojciechowski of Poland. A
Zionist student named Stanislaw
Stelger is on trial at Lemberg, Pol-
and, charged with the attempted
assassination of the president.
It has been claimed by the Jew-
ish people of Poland that Stelger is
innocent of the charge. The pris-
oner is regarded by them as a
martyr and a second Captain Drey-
fus, a Jewish officer in the French
army who was convicted by a secret
military tribunal of having divulged
state secrets to a foreign
power and was sentenced to penal
servitude on Devil's Island in
French Guiana. Dreyfus later was

re-tried and convicted again. He
was sentenced to 10 years in pris-
on, but later was pardoned.
Olschanska confessed to the po-
lice that he threw the bomb under
orders of a secret Ukranian military
organization which had instructed
him to commit in order to prevent
the conviction of Stelger. Olschan-
ska's guilt, the Berlin police say,
is clearly apparent from the details
of his confession.
