NEW FINANCE HEAD OF FRANCE KNOWN FOR DARING IDEAS

PARIS, Nov. 28.—Brand's new cabinet, although falling short of the great concentration of all parties, hoped for in many quarters to face the precarious financial situation, is composed of the safest elements in parliament, and is the most moderate body of ministers assembled since the elections of May, 1924.

The complete elimination of extremists, both of the communists and socialists of the left and the nationalists of the right, is one of its features.

Acceptance of the finance portfolio by Louis Loucheur has aroused intense interest in financial circles. Loucheur is known to be a man of daring financial and economic conceptions, and his activities as France's cashier will be watched with great attention.

The groups represented in the cabinet by the various ministers command 269 votes in the Chamber of Deputies out of the total membership of 597. It is expected that the more moderate elements of the right and center will vote with the government on the ministerial declarations of policy next Thursday.

SLAYER CHAPMAN WRITES BRIEF IN HIS OWN DEFENSE

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 28.—Repealed from the gallows for three months by Governor Truman Bull, Gerald Chapman, mail hand convicted of murdering a policeman, is acting as one of the lawyers for himself.

In a five-page brief written with pen and ink in his cell and bristling with legal terminology he contends that President Coolidge has "immorally and unlawfully" employed the commutative power as an instrument of force.

The President has commuted Chapman's sentence of 25 years to Atlanta for robbing the mails in New York in order that Chapman may hang in Connecticut for killing a policeman after he had escaped from Atlanta.

GOVERNOR PIERCE PRESENTS BADGES TO BOY SCOUTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28.—Boy Scouts of Oregon, in their third annual convention, held the annual banquet last night and are closing their business session this forenoon. The afternoon will be devoted to various contests.

Eight councils are represented among the 225 delegates attending the convention: Cascade council, Lane county, Klamath Falls, Central Oregon, Crater Lake, Mount St. Helens, Douglas, Mid-Columbia and Portland councils.

Outstanding feature in yesterday's meeting was presentation of eagle badges, the highest award in scout craft, at a ceremonial on board the battleship Oregon.

FRENCH PREPARE TO MEET ANOTHER ATTACK OF DRUSES

BEIRUT, Syria, Nov. 28.—The rebel Druse tribesmen are answering the signals from various high hills in the region of Rasheya and are flocking down the mountain-side and from the villages to reinforce the bands of the leaders preparatory to further anticipated attacks by the French forces. It is the desire of the Druses to wipe out the defeat which the French recently administered to them in Balka valley and at Rasheya.

Around Hama, in northern Syria bandits have struck terror in the hearts of the population. To meet the situation there French reinforcements from Tripoli are carrying out a forced march as the railway line between Hama and Pas Hasleek to the south has been cut.

The Christians at Hama are seeking safety in the foreign mission compounds or in flight toward the Mediterranean.

On Thanksgiving Day Sheriff Starmer was called and asked to assist in locating a Star car which had been stolen from Drain. The owner was unable to give the license number of the machine, the engine number or any mark of identification which might distinguish his car from any other.

The only thing the sheriff could do was to telephone other officers of the state and ask them to look for suspicious persons driving a Star car.

PIERCE TO DECIDE TONIGHT WHAT TO DO WITH McLAREN

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 28.—Governor Pierce said today that he will not reach a decision before tonight, whether Allan McLaren, Portland youth, sentenced to the state penitentiary for a statutory crime, will receive further clemency.

A 30-day reprieve granted McLaren expires today. W. L. McLaren, father of the youth and former member of the state prison parole board, who resigned because of his son's trouble, will make a personal plea to the governor at 10 o'clock today. Gladwin Lawpage, another youth involved in the same offense, is already in the penitentiary.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28.—A jury last night returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of William Smith, for hire car driver, who was tried on a charge of assault with intent to kill for the shooting of John E. "Handsome Hans" Fagerlie, special police operative, in a police raid on a hotel, February 17. The case went to the jury at 3:30 and the verdict was returned at 8 o'clock. Smith was tried last September, but the jury in that case failed to agree and was discharged. Smith's defense was that he shot Fagerlie in the belief that he was a burglar.

BEAUTY CHATS

WRINKLE PATCHES Have you ever tried this stunt for first wrinkles, or for wrinkles that follow all lines? If not, do so for it has excellent results.

Buy a box of ready-made wrinkle patches, or if you want to save money, make them yourself. They are nothing but court plaster, cut in special shapes, and there is no reason why you cannot buy a few cents worth of pink or white court plaster yourself and cut out the shapes with scissors.

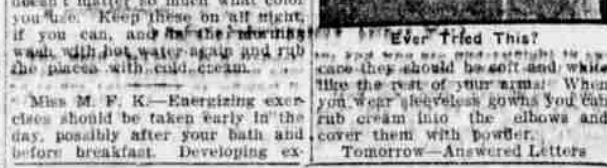
If the wrinkles are around the mouth cut two-pieces the shape of a new moon, as long as the wrinkle and wide enough to cover it. Slope the arm or horns of the "moon" so that the greatest width is in the middle, that should be nearly a half inch, the horns a quarter inch. A thicker shorter "moon" should be cut for around the eyes.

Wash the skin as usual at bedtime with hot water and soap, or with cold cream, washed off with hot water and soap. Remember the court plaster will not stick to a wet or greasy skin. Rinse with cold water, instead, an ice rub would be splendid before these plaster are put on. Moisten one plaster at a time, very slightly, then, stretching the skin just enough to open the wrinkle, put the plaster on. Straighten the plaster as best over the forehead.

Pink court plaster hardly shows so most women use this. In any case though, you won't want to appear, even before your family, with large patches on your skin so it doesn't matter so much what color you use. Keep these on all night if you can, and in the morning wash with hot water and rub the pieces with cold cream.

Miss M. F. K.—Exercising exercises should be taken early in the day, possibly after your bath and before breakfast. Developing exercises may be taken at any time except after a meal or at a time when you're tired out.

Daisy F. G.—Rub cold cream or an oil into the hardened skin on your elbows each night before scrubbing them with hot water and soap. After a few weeks of this

TOMORROW'S MENU Breakfast: Grapes, Cereal, Griddlecakes, Sirup, Toast, Coffee. Dinner: Grilled Beefsteak, Carrots, Potatoes, Pineapple Salad, Chocolate Cornstarch, Coffee. Supper: Scrambled Eggs, Left-Over Cold Slaw, Hot Biscuits, Cake, Cocoa, Preserves.

For Father or Big Brother: Silver cutlunks; some original kind of rack for his neckties (the boy of the family who is clever at carpentry should not find this hard a gift to make); a handkerchief or crocheted necktie; a belt buckle; golf balls (if he plays the game); extra razor blades (if he uses a safety razor—and be sure you get them to fit his kind of razor!); a pocket notebook; hand-made laundry bag; automobile accessories (if he drives a car).

For Big Sister: Smart-looking hand-bag; hand-made collar and cuff set to wear with slip-on sweater; a choker; chafing-dish apron; a new piece of music for the piano; a pair of frilly garters (these also can be hand-made); gloves; a door-stop; one of the small new brass knockers for bedroom doors; hairnets.

For Teacher: A pencil in which the lead screws down; a work-bank; a small vase; blotter put together with a hand-decorated cover; postcards; bookmarks; hand-made boudoir cap; bow; for tiny trinkets.

For an Invalid: Electric warming pad; dainty saucer or shawl; hand-decorated trap for meals (anyone clever with paints can transform an inexpensive tin or fibre tray with bright, cheerful colors); some piece of prism or crystal to hand in the window in the sun (thus casting beautiful colors about the room; a new puzzle or game which one can play.
