### MANCHUS PREPARE NEW RESISTANCE TO "CHRISTIAN" FOES

(Associated Press Special Wire.)  
PEKING, Nov. 30.—Advice from Shanghai report that fighting occurred yesterday and yesterday five miles from Tsunankwan where Marshal Chang Tso-Lin's forces apparently succeeded in expelling the invaders from Tsunankwan province.  
A telegram from Mukden, capital of the Manchurian government, headed by Marshal Chang, states that confidence is returning there, and that preparations are being made to repel the advance of the Chinese Kuomintang, former Manchurian commander, who recently landed.  
Most of the members of the cabinet in Peking have ceased to carry out their functions.  
Marshal Feng Yu-Hsiang, the Christian general, has sent a message urging the defense committee to prevent further violence in Peking and declaring that he will support the chief executive, Yuan Shi-Kai. It is believed that Feng is determined to oust the anti-Chinese politicians surrounding the chief executive.  
Feng desires the tariff conference to continue but opposes the idea of carrying on government by motions of commissions.  
Notwithstanding the political situation, the sub-committee on surtaxes of the tariff conference met this morning.

CHEFOO, China, Nov. 30.—It is estimated that 25 men have been killed and fifty wounded in fighting in the streets of Chefoo between armed factions.  
A battle began yesterday when marines coming from Tsingtao endeavored to occupy barracks over

the opposition of Chefoo troops.

PEKING, China, Nov. 30.—Marshal Chang Tso-Lin is preparing to give battle to his enemies north of Tsunankwan, 140 miles northeast of Tientsin. Nevertheless the appearance of some of the forces of General Kuo Hsiang-Lien, Chang's former lieutenant, now heading the revolt against him at Tsunankwan, today caused the retirement of the Mukden chieftain's troops about 15 miles to the north.

General Kiang Teng-Hsiang whom Chang Tso-Lin made governor of Anhui and who was captured by Kuo's troops when they revolted against the Mukden leader, has been executed as "an example to peace disturbers."

Having received orders from Marshal Feng Yu-Hsiang, the "Christian general," to prevent any recurrence of the riotous outbreaks of last Sunday, Feng's garrison commander in Peking has forbidden any gathering of workmen or students.

### BERGER AND BORAH PLANNING BILLS TO SETTLE BIG STRIKE

(Associated Press Special Wire.)  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Under the anthracite situation is settled immediately, Representative Berger, socialist, Wisconsin, told President Coolidge today, he would

introduce a bill on the first day of the congressional session, authorizing the government to seize and operate the coal mines.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Full power for the President to take over and operate anthracite mines in time of a national emergency would be conferred under a bill which Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, is preparing for introduction in the senate.  
Under the measure national emergency would be deemed to exist whenever there is "threatened or impending disaster from the stoppage of the anthracite coal industry."  
This language the senator believes to be broad enough to cover a situation such as now exists.  
In control of the anthracite industry the President would have all of the power that was conferred upon the chief executive by the war time food and fuel act. He would set through a new coal division of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

### DE VALERA CHARGES BAD FAITH SHOWN IN BOUNDARY PLAN

(Associated Press Special Wire.)  
LONDON, Nov. 30.—While conferences on the Irish boundary situation continue here between Premier Baldwin and Representatives of the Northern and Southern governments in Ireland, there apparently is a certain amount of unrest in Ireland itself.  
Advices from Belfast say that the British government has suspended the giving of leave of absence to the troops in Ulster and that the sixth battalion of the Free State army is proceeding to camp near the Donegal-Fermanagh border.

At Ennis yesterday Eamonn de Valera, leader of the Republicans, in an address declared that the future of the people of Ireland would depend on how they acted at the presentation of the boundary issue. He charged bad faith against former Premier Lloyd-George, Winston Spencer Churchill and Lord Birkenhead and said that during the Anglo-Irish treaty debates the question of verification of the Irish "specious" phrase, "rectification of the boundary" was heard of only when a section of the Irish people had been so committed to the treaty as to make it impossible for them to retreat. Mr. De Valera added that he hoped the country would get no worse partition than the treaty gave.

### COOLIDGE SIGNS ORDER FOR LAVA BED MONUMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—A new national monument in northeast California to be known as the Lava Bed National Monument was created today by executive order of President Coolidge.

The region was the scene of warfare between whites and Indians in 1873. It contains fantastic examples of nature's handiwork in lava and has never been completely explored. It is approximately 65 miles by automobile from Alturas, California, and 45 miles from Klamath Falls, Oregon.

### COSTLY FIRE IN NEWARK

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 30.—Fire sweeping through eight tenement and business houses on Springfield Avenue, between Boston and Beacon streets, today drove 100 occupants to the street and caused damage estimated at \$750,000. The flames were brought under control after a two-hour fight in which the entire block in the thickly populated section was threatened.

### ELLIOT WINS 250 MILE CLASSIC ON COOPER'S ILL LUCK

CULVER CITY, Cal., Nov. 30.—The hand of "Lady Luck" turned from Earl Cooper, veteran pilot, and his fleet green racing car and as a consequence the laurels of the

250-mile race victory rest upon the brow of Frank Elliott, World war ace.

Cooper, with only 20 miles to go, made a pit stop for fuel and Elliott, close on his heels, went into the lead to win a non-stop race. Up to the time of his stop Cooper, too, drove a non-stop race. The event terminated the 1925 racing season of the American Automobile association. Four world's records went by the boards, while Cooper led and Elliott, finishing first, shattered another—the 250-mile mark. The 75, 100, 150 and 200 mile records were equaled by Cooper when he negotiated those distances at 132.6, 131.8, 130.7 and 129.5 miles per hour respectively.

Elliott drove the 250 miles at an average of 127.86, bettering the mark of 126.88 miles an hour made by Tommy Milton on the Culver City speedway last March.

### OREGON CITY-CANEMAH HIGHWAY LAMP OPENED

OREGON CITY, Ore., Nov. 30.—Traffic was opened on the Pacific Highway stretch recently completed between Oregon City and Canemah for the first time Saturday evening. Only the lighter passenger vehicles are allowed to use the new road, the heavy truck still being routed over the detour at High street.

The latter part of the week will probably see the highway opened to all traffic.  
Its completion does away with

one of the few remaining unpaved sections of the Pacific Highway between Portland and the California line.
