will be followed by a dance.  
A nominating committee with  
Dr. Lee A. Wells as chairman,  
was named and will propose the  
officers to serve for the ensuing  
year.

WORK OF PACKING  
CHRISTMAS BOXES  
HAS COMMENCED  
The task of packing the Oregon  
product gift boxes sponsored by  
the Chamber of Commerce as a  
unique Christmas gift has been  
started. These boxes will contain  
two one-pound boxes of Oregon  
prunes, two cans of pears and a  
pound of English walnuts. The  
boxes will be sold on a non-pro-  
fit basis all the contents, the box  
shook and all materials being sup-  
plied at actual cost, so that the  
boxes can be sold at \$2 each,  
that sum including the express  
rate to destination, the express  
company having made a flat rate  
on these packages.  
The idea has gained very popu-  
lar favor and it is indicated that  
the entire number of boxes pre-  
pared will be sold in short order.  
Many orders have been received  
from the state at large, several  
having come in from Portland  
and Willamette valley towns, in  
spite of the fact that the Port-  
land Chamber of Commerce is fol-  
lowing a like plan.

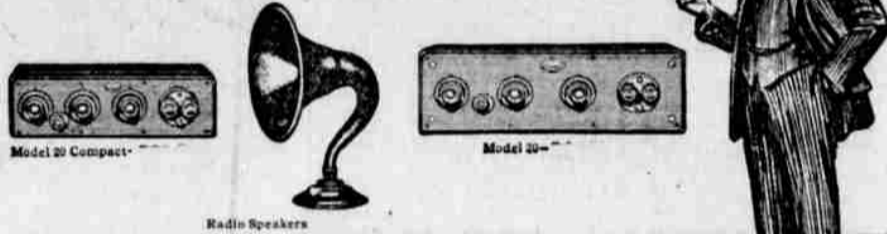

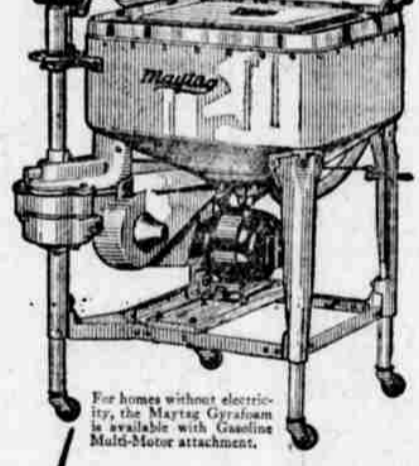
