GEN. SLADEN ASSIGNED TO PHILIPPINE AREA.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Assignment was announced today of Major General Fred W. Sladen, new superintendent at West Point, to command the Philippine department, succeeding Major General James H. McGee, who already has been assigned to command the Ninth Corps Area, San Francisco.

General Sladen, who will sail for the Philippines next April, was one of the group of 12 general officers originally named to the court martial assembled to try Colonel William Mitchell, of the air service, on charges of insubordination, but was removed from the court on the lone peremptory challenge permitted the Colonel's counsel.

General Sladen will be succeeded at the military academy by Colonel March B. Stewart, now commandant of West Point.

BEAUTY CHATS

POLISHING

To keep the nails really glossy, they should be polished every day with a fairly large, soft chamois covered polisher. I have an economical trick which may appeal to you. It is to keep two long soft pieces of chamois leather somewhere in the dressing table drawer, and to use them over the buffer and put them away immediately afterward. They stay clean longer that way, and clean leather is essential if the nails are to look nice.

If you do not tint your nails, you need only one chamois. But if you do, after the usual manicure, rub your pink paste over the nails and then rub it in with one of the leathers stretched tightly over the polisher. Then wash off, for you cannot get a real polish if there is any grease around the nails. And then polish again with the new clean leather. Here is a formula for clean leather. Here is a formula for a good polishing paste.

Three drachms of oxide of tin three grains of tragacanth, half a teaspoon of glycerine and a little powdered rouge to tint. Mix the powders and rub the glycerine in well.

By the way, a useful cream to soften the skin around the edge of the nails and to keep the nails themselves from growing brittle, is made by mixing half an ounce of spermaceti and a quarter ounce of lanoline. Mix by melting them together.

Do you want something to clean under dirty nails? There's a very simple, effective preparation made by mixing a tablespoonful of soft soap and a tablespoonful of ammonia. Keep in a tiny bottle and rub under the nails by dipping in the end of orangewood stick. This has the advantage of washing out easily, which acid bleaches do not, and it is not so drying.

Mrs. George D. Fancy shoes attract attention to the feet, so do not wear them unless your feet are well shaped and not too large. When there is any tendency for the flesh to grow up along the toenail, trim the nail into a V shape for a time to avoid having to worry with an ingrown nail later.

Two Misses.—The reason why blackheads sometimes form between the shoulders is due to carelessness in bathing. Use a flesh brush and scrub with hot water and soap every day until the skin is freed of them.

XMAS GIFTS EASILY MADE

Appreciating the fact that many women are still racking their brains to think what to make for this or that friend for Christmas, I offer the following suggestions for inexpensive gifts.

Cat Sachets: These are very new. They consist of a cat's head made of satin taffeta ribbon, the eyes, nose, and whiskers drawn on the ribbon with black ink. To make them, take a four-inch length of pink ribbon which is two inches wide, and double it at the crease, where it is doubled, stitch diagonally on each corner—thus making kitty's ears! Then stuff the "face," gather the ribbons together at the "neck" and shake some violet sachet into the little opening before sewing it up tight and covering the seam with a baby ribbon bow.

The New Baby Blankets: Buy two lengths of white flannel. Secure three sides together with featherstitching done in pink mer-

cerized cotton (or bind the edges with wash ribbon). Leave the fourth side open like a pillow case. Into this end slip a square of rubber the same size as the blankets. These blankets are used on the mother's lap when she holds baby. If they are accidentally wet, they may be washed out—the rubber being easily removed.

The New Rubber Bibs: This is another up-to-the-minute article for young children. It consists of an egg-shaped piece of rubber with a hole in it at the "pointed" end of the egg. Through this hole goes the little tot's head. How much simpler it is to draw such a bib over a child's head—instead of having to fuss tying bib strings! Any woman can decorate such a bib attractively—pinkings its edges and perhaps stencilling some design on it.

New Book Bags: Although these are shown in leather in the shops, I see no reason why some heavy material such as imitation tapestry or rep should not be used in place of leather. They are made exactly like a flat pocketbook which has two leather handles; but instead of having a pocket for money in the center, they open out flat and the two covers of a novel slip into either side, then, when the handles are brought together again, the resulting effect is that of a hand-bag. Books carried in a little case of this sort do not show their titles—indeed the entire cover of the volume is concealed. It is much more convenient to carry a book thus, by handles, than under one's arm. And because it is neater and smarter, I believe women will welcome them.

Vaccination for Dogs. Mrs. W.—You ask why we cannot get rid of rabies, that terrible disease of "mad" dogs, which is such a menace to children. I have read that Australia has never had a case of rabies. The reason? Very strict quarantine regulations. No dog is allowed to get into Australia that is not quarantined until the authorities are sure it is free from disease. England was entirely free from rabies for many years, but during the World War some infected dogs gained access by airplane.

Dogs can be immunized against rabies by vaccination. Any veterinarian can do this. In some communities anti-rabies dog vaccination is compulsory. Dogs suffering from rabies not only bite each other but they bite human beings and other animals. The disease is one of the most awful of all diseases, both in dogs and man. All dogs that are worth keeping should be protected against it, not only for themselves but for the protection of humans. 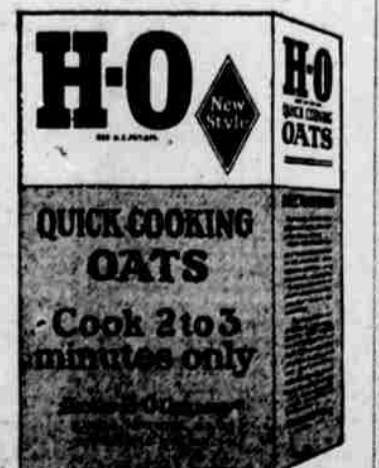
