## SHENANDOAH CASE WITNESS DISPUTES MITCHELL CHARGE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Colonel William Mitchell's assertion that the dirigible Shenandoah was destroyed by the expansion of her gas cells was disputed before the Mitchell court martial today by Colonel C. G. Hall, army dirigible expert, who was aboard the Shenandoah when she was wrecked.

The destruction of the craft, said Colonel Hall, was "due to the dynamic force of the storm" in which she perished.

Adverting to Colonel Mitchell's complaint that no parachutes were carried by the Shenandoah, the witness said that parachutes would have been "absolutely useless." Had the ship been inflated with hydrogen instead of helium, Colonel Hall testified, "probably everybody would have been killed."

Captain Gatewood S. Lincoln of the Navy Department, who prepared the orders for the last flight of the big dirigible, told the court that Commander Zachary Lansdowne did not "object to making the mid-west flight."

He added that on the contrary, Lansdowne told him and Admiral Eberle, chief of the naval operations on August 15 or 19, that he was "satisfied with the flight at the time it was planned and with the arrangements as planned."

On cross-examination, Captain Lincoln said he was not a flying officer. He prepared orders for the Shenandoah flight on instructions from the chief, or assistant chief of naval operations.

## BATTLE COMPELS MANCHURIAN ARMY TO MAKE RETREAT

TOKYO, Dec. 3.—Chang Tso-lin's army is retreating from near Chinchow, Manchuria, after a major battle, Tokyo vernacular newspapers stated today.

This is the first major engagement reported by Marshal Chang of Manchuria and his former subordinate who recently revolted against him. Chinchow is an important station on the Peking-Mukden railway, 250 miles northeast of Tien Tsin.

Recent dispatches had indicated that the Manchurian leader intended to give battle near Shanhaiwan, 114 miles north of Tien Tsin, at the eastern extremity of the great wall of China. He was reported calling in reinforcements from Jehol, in northern central China, to aid him. Whether these reinforcements reached Manchuria is not known.

Reid of Illinois, defense counsel, and Major Gullion, assistant trial judge advocate, had engaged in a sharp dispute over the examination of Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Rosenbuhl, senior surviving officer of the Shenandoah.

Major Gullion objected to a question Mr. Reid had asked the witness.

Turning to Major Gullion, Mr. Reid said: "Things get into your ears, but they never reach your brains."

## OREGON FARMER IN POLK COUNTY DISCOVERS OIL

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
RICKEAL, Ore., Dec. 2.—Oil, seeping out of a tile drainage pipe on the George Walt farm about a mile south of here, was discovered this morning by Mr. Walt and other men who were clearing out a drainage ditch.

When first discovered it was thought that the oil might be seeping from the highway or railroad rights of way, but investigation revealed that the flow had its source in a direction opposite to either the railroad or highway.

Soon after the discovery a match was touched to the oil and it has been burning steadily now for several hours.

Considerable prospecting for oil has been done in this vicinity and several wells have been sunk in past years. Illuminating gas has been frequently discovered, in some cases of sufficient volume for use in lighting farm houses.
