SEATTLE DIVINE STARTS MOVE TO OUST MAYOR BROWN

SEATTLE, Dec. 4.—Dr. Ambrose M. Bailey, pastor of the First Baptist Church of this city, who told his congregation October 25 that he had seen while touring Seattle in the guise of a logger, today announced that before night he would have in wide circulation petitions to the city council to impeach Mayor Brown.

After his narrative sermon Bailey conferred with Prosecutor Colvin and a grand jury met November 9. This jury last night recommended that the council impeach the mayor or the people recall him. The jury made many allegations that vice flourished in Seattle.

Brown met all denunciations with the announcement that he will file December 26 for nomination to succeed himself.

MILLION DOLLAR LOSS FROM BLAZE IN COUNCIL BLUFFS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, Dec. 2.—A disastrous fire struck the business section of Council Bluffs early today, causing property damage estimated at more than \$1,000,000 in loss to buildings and several hundred thousands of dollars in loss of stock in stores.

The fire started in the basement of the Continental Furniture company when a boiler exploded. J. McManis, night watchman at the building, was badly burned about the head and body before he escaped from the burning building. Eighty guests at the Grand hotel were safe, but forced to flee in scant attire when the flames enveloped and later destroyed this hotel. Their personal property was lost. Eight fire companies from Omaha and Council Bluffs battled the flames, and for a time it appeared as if the fire would spread throughout the entire downtown district.

ROSENDAHL SAYS LANSDOWNE NOT OPPOSED TO TRIP

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The Mitchell court martial followed the trial of the Shenandoah court of inquiry today, covering in many particulars the same field previously explored by the navy court.

While the naval inquiry sought to fix responsibility of the Shenandoah wreck, however, the army court had as its objective the rebuttal of Colonel Mitchell's charges that the Shenandoah accident was the result of general incompetence and criminal negligence in conducting the national defense.

Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, senior surviving officer of the Shenandoah, and navigation officer of the ship during its fatal mid-west flight, related to the court martial today many details of the wreck. He was called as a prosecution witness.

Much of Commander Rosendahl's testimony today repeated his statements before the Shenandoah court. He read to the court martial his official report on the disaster, already a part of the record of the naval tribunal.

Reduction in the number of automatic gas valves in the Shenandoah, the witness testified, was made to "save weight" and not "to conserve helium." He expressed the opinion that "gas pressure had nothing to do with the disaster."

"Do you know whether Commander Lansdowne undertook the mid-western flight under protest?" the witness was asked.

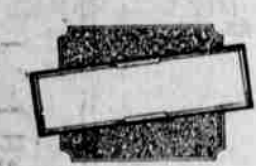
