LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

COUNTY COURT WRITES ABOUT OAK ST. BRIDGE

Editor News-Review—
In reply to your article in Thursday's News-Review regarding the Oak St. bridge.
It would appear that the county court is altogether to blame for the muddy condition of the Oak street bridge.

In the first place the county court has already spent many times the city's share of the road fund, which heretofore has been thirty per cent, on this bridge this year or in the neighborhood of \$7000.00. The center pier, floor and sidewalk were all repaired and the bridge painted.

At the time the bridge repair work was started the city council was asked to assist in building an entire floor system, this they refused to do. Had the floor system been elevated two or three inches the water would have been drained off. Owing to the fact that most of the stringers were good it was impossible to change the floor system, without considerable additional expense and delay in laying the floor.

As the city refused to assist in the least, the floor was repaired in the cheapest possible manner and at the least expense. The city then turned all the drainage water from two streets on this bridge and in turn have refused to answer or clean the bridge with their street cleaning department.

It would, therefore, seem to the county court that the city is at least partly to blame for the condition that exists on the Oak street bridge.

PORTLAND MARKETS

—PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 4.—
There is another decline in the local egg market today with all grades of fresh stock 2 cents lower with the exception of undersized or peewees.

Fresh standard extras now posted at 47 cents on the dairy exchange; standard firsts 45c and mediums 40c. Current receipts are 35c net and ungraded remain steady and unchanged at 32c.

Fresh receipts are increasing with arrivals during the past 24 hours, the heaviest in several days. At the same time storage stocks are coming out in the coolers at a rapid rate as operators are eager to get rid of their holdings while prices are still high.

Cube butter is down 1 to 1 1/2 in the local market in all grades but top extras. Standard cubes 50c; prime firsts 50c and firsts 49c. Extras unchanged at 52c.

The market is weak with a lower trend indicated.

Portland millers have advanced flour prices 2c a barrel throughout the entire list. Best family patents now quoted at \$9.60 with bakers' hard wheat \$10.20 and bakers' bluestem patents \$9.40. Radical advance in grain prices is responsible for the higher flour prices.

Very little live poultry is coming in now and the market is in a good healthy condition. Commission men are urging the shippers to get their live stuff in now while the market is good instead of waiting until Christmas, when there isn't time to dress it. This happens every year, the dealers say and a break in the live market always results.

Choice light veal and pork sells at 18 to 16 1/2 in the local dressed market. Country receipts are moderate with a good demand for fancy stuff.
