FRENCH READY TO CRUSH DRUSES IN 3-CORNERED TRAP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) BEIRUT, Syria, Dec. 7.—The French forces after several days of bombardment and the delivery of attacks have completely occupied the town of Hasbaya, the stronghold of the rebel Druses. They are now holding it and the towns of Hasbaya and Jeddin, positions which form a triangle and from which they will now endeavor to carry out an envelopment movement against the large number of Druses within the area. The French have 7,000 troops and the Druses less than 5,000.

The Druses also are said to have been defeated with heavy casualties at the village of Kadem, just outside of Damascus. General Gamelin, the French commander in chief, is of the opinion that Lebanon will be freed of rebels by Christmas and that the Druses either will be captured or compelled to retreat, some of them into Palestine, where they would be interned by the British.

SECRETARY OF WAR URGES EXPANSION OF VARIOUS UNITS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The attention of the Regular Army is "extremely critical," Secretary Davis of the War Department informed President Coolidge in his annual report.

"If the national defense act is to be carried into execution," he said, "the statement of the existing situation, as outlined herein, must be given serious consideration by the people."

Summarizing the status of the numerous major projects of the army that await authorization and funds, the report made these assertions:

The morale of units housed in temporary barracks is low, the desertion rate "remaining at a very high and discouraging percentage." In reserves of ammunition and supplies, the army has lived for years off of world fat "and the day draws near when there will be no more fat."

The "very existence" of the Officers Reserve Corps depends on expansion of the Reserve Officers Training Corps to provide for replacement of world war veterans who are passing out of the picture.

The National Guard must be permitted to expand if it is to be ready for the "heavy loads" which war would throw upon it. The Civilian Military Training Camps need larger facilities to care for the demand for voluntary training service.

Mr. Davis reiterated the views of his predecessor in office, Secretary Weeks, that to carry out properly the requirements of the national defense act a regular army of 150,000 men would be required.

WESTERN ELEVEN FOR NEW YEAR'S GAME NOT PICKED

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 7.—Neither Washington, Stanford nor California will accept an invitation to play in the east-west football game at Pasadena on New Year's day as representative of the west, even should an invitation be proffered, it was announced here this morning by Professor H. C. Howe, of the University of Oregon president of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Conference this morning.

Professor Howe has received telegrams from all three schools to that effect, he said. The players, J. S. Idaho, O. A. C. Montana and Oregon to be considered. Of this group, U. S. C. is held to be the most likely team.

BASING OATH ON NEIGHBOR'S WORD PUTS HIM IN JAIL

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7.—Curious Abbott's poor judgment of the length of fence cost him \$50 and a day in the county jail. Sentence was imposed by Judge Bean.

This young rancher has a homestead in eastern Oregon near the 600-acre stock raising entry owned by Mary Pechette. The law requires a certain amount of improving must be done before the entryman can prove up on a claim.

State Press Comment

Slowly this country is waking to the need of growing new timber for the lumber-hungry era coming. It is to be remembered that we are now annually consuming as lumber and fuel a total of 25,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood and growing but 6,900,000,000 to take its place. The first step toward actual reforestation is legislation that makes it possible for private interests and corporations to grow trees for the market. Twenty-six of the forty-two states which have legislative sessions this year have passed important forestry laws. The ideal legislation seems to be that of Michigan, once the greatest pine and hardwood state in the Union, but now almost bare of commercial timber.

The state takes commercially reforesting land out of the ordinary tax class and makes it subject to a 25 per cent yield tax, this tax to be collected when the timber is cut. A nominal tax of 5 cents an acre on pine land and 10 cents on hardwood land is paid into the state treasury, each county getting 5 cents an acre annually as tax on all reforesting lands within its limits.

Such legislation gives some promise of profit in raising a fifty-year crop of trees. Few individuals have either the heart or the purse to set out on such an adventure as this. Our commercial lumber must be raised either by rich individuals, by corporations, the state or the municipality. Only incorporated bodies may hope to live to see the forests they plant harvested. Fifty large commercial forest companies in the United States have already begun systematic reforestation. Five thousand such organizations beginning at once on a reasonably large scale could not avert the timber famine we must pass through before we have again an adequate supply of lumber.—Portland Telegram.

drilled, and target practice once a week will be required." Under Lillie's administration there is to be no fraternizing between guards and convicts. One of the first orders to be issued to the guards at the regular conferences that are to be a part of the new system is that "guards are not to converse with the prisoners at all except where it is necessary in the line of duty."

To cope with emergencies such as the fatal break of August 12, last, a reserve force of at least 10 guards is to be kept on duty continuously at the guards quarters. Arms for their use are to be available in the arsenal in the new tower that has been constructed in front of the main gate.

The installation of a huge siren to act as a warning for the surrounding country and the guards outside the grounds in case of a break are also on the program, as is an internal alarm system that will serve as an emergency system for mobilizing the guards.

"Segregation of the trustees working outside so that they would have no communication with the other convicts would go a long way toward preventing escapes and attempted escapes," said Lillie. "There would be practically no smuggled letters sent out then, and the danger of having weapons and other instruments smuggled in would be greatly lessened."

QUINE BROTHERS

CONGRESSMAN HILL MOVES FOR REPEAL PROHIBITION LAW.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The first blow in the annual battle of the wets and dries in congress was struck today by Representative Hill, Republican of Maryland, who proposed what he said would amount to a popular referendum on prohibition.

He presented a resolution for repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, with a provision that the action of each state on the proposal be taken through a state convention of delegates elected by popular vote. Representative Hill also proposed a bill to let each state define "intoxicating beverages" for itself, only to legalize 2.75 per cent beer and one to transfer prohibition enforcement to the attorney general.

EX-GERMAN CONSUL FACES CHARGE OF EMBEZZLEMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7.—Clement J. Pape, former vice-consul for Germany and former resident manager of the Portland office of the Shanghai building company of China, went on trial today on a charge of embezzlement. Pape was arrested several

months ago after Edward Bell of Shanghai, head of the company, charged that more than \$50,000 had been taken from the company by Pape. Four indictments were returned against Pape. He was tried two months ago on a charge of forgery and was acquitted. The other three indictments charge embezzlement.
