RHINELANDER CASE JUROR CHARGES AN EFFORT TO TAMPER

(Associated Press Lead Wire) WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Dec. 9.—The great Chatham county grand jury today was directed to conduct an investigation to an alleged attempt to tamper with the jury which heard Leonard Kip Rhineland's annulment suit against his second wife, Anne Beatrice Jones.

Frederick G. Sanford, a juror in the trial, told Justice Morchamer that he had been approached by a certain Yonkers man, who had suggested the subject of the Rhineland case.

"I gather that he favored Rhineland and was opposed to interracial marriages," Sanford told Justice Morchamer. Sanford said he had been approached by other residents of Yonkers during the trial but he was able to give the name of only one man definitely.

"This sort of thing strikes at the foundation of justice," said Justice Morchamer. "Influence of outsiders brought to bear upon a jury is harmful. It must stop."

Assistant District Attorney Coyne, after talking with Sanford said that the evidence would be placed before a grand jury and an investigation be begun.

Isaac N. Mills, attorney for Rhineland, said today he would submit a 20-page brief on the case Friday.

MAIL ORDER HOUSE TRAPS SWINDLER ON DUMMY PARCEL

DALLAS, Ore., Dec. 9.—Samuel Fleck, 23, is under arrest here held for federal authorities on a charge of using the mails to defraud. He was taken into custody Sunday by Sheriff T. B. Hooper and District Attorney Holger, when he appeared to get a package of goods he had ordered from a mail order clothing house of St. Louis.

The arrest resulted from investigation of a check for \$99, which Fleck had sent with an order for the goods. The company became suspicious and an investigation was reported to have found that there were no funds in the bank to the credit of the name signed to the check. The company sent a dummy package and requested officers to arrest the person who called for it.

Fleck, who came from Orange county, Missouri, a few months ago, had been working as a farm hand for H. S. Portwood, near Moamouth.

Officers reported finding in his possession when arrested a letter to a gun company of Itasca, N. Y., ordering a gun, and enclosing a check for \$99.55. Fleck told the officers that he had been induced to send this order by some friends. He said he was to meet them Tuesday night. The officers went to the reported rendezvous but the friends did not appear.

Patriotic music is arranged during show and as a special feature Miss Alice Backer will sing in costume preceding the picture.

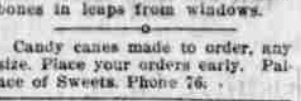

There have been some cases of tetanus (lockjaw) reported from the use of unclean pads as protective dressing. Some unclean bunion pads were examined at the Public Health Laboratories at Washington, and were found to have some lockjaw germs in them. Lockjaw germs are apt to get into all products in which glue is used, so such products should not be used where there is any wound.

The Surgeon General of the U. S. has warned against the use of these bunion pads for vaccination dressing. Vaccination is a slight wound and can be infected as can any other wound on the body, if it is not properly protected against contamination.

One of the accepted methods of treating is the covering of the wound with six or eight layers of sterile gauze loosely strapped on. This gauze should be of sufficient size to prevent the adhesive tape from covering any part of the area of the inflamed skin.

NAVAL TROUBLES "Dear Doctor: I am troubled with my nasal. Several days before and during my periods there is a small amount of secretion of a very offensive odor. I bath often, use talcum, cotton moistened with weak iodine, bismuth and anything I have in the medicine chest, that either heals or deodorizes, but as yet I have found nothing that alleviates this disorder. This condition has existed only since this past winter.

"May I hear from you soon in the columns, and if my condition is amusing rather than alarming, then I shall have no further cause for worry. — Mrs. R."

During and preceding the menstrual period the perspiration may have a little stronger odor. I imagine this is your trouble, Mrs. R. You might try a little peroxide of hydrogen, or 16 grains of salicylic acid to the ounce of talcum powder.

Efficient Housekeeping

DAINTIES FOR THE INVALID

Breakfast: Oranges, Cereal, Dropped Eggs, Coffee, Lunch: Corned Beef Hash, Pickles, Whole wheat Bread, Stewed Prunes, Cocoa, Dinner: Lamb Chops, Potatoes, Creamed Cauliflower, Spiced Beef Salad, Indian Pudding with Liquid Vanilla Sauce, Coffee.

Daintiness is an important consideration in tempting the appetite of an invalid. For instance, a poached egg served on a plate alone (as I have often seen them served) has no appeal; whereas the same egg served on delicately broiled toast-points would attract the eye and stimulate the appetite. Large portions are also taboo; if the invalid cares for more of a dish, she can ask for a second helping.

Nor should the invalid's dishes be too sweet. The simple fruit, meat and vegetable flavors are most appetizing. Try some of the following on the sick-room tray (of course, after they have been pronounced suitable diet for your patient).

Orange Almond: Into a glass jar with a tight-fitting cover, put one unpeeled and uncut orange, one unpeeled and uncut apple, the juice of one large orange and either one tablespoon of sugar syrup or one tablespoon of powdered sugar. Cover and shake till the ingredients are well mixed but not till the egg-white has become foamy.

Lemon Sponge: Soak one teaspoon of granulated gelatin in one tablespoon of cold water for a few minutes, then turn this into one-fourth cup of granulated sugar, and one tablespoon of lemon juice, and stir till the sugar is dissolved. Let stand till it begins to congeal (that is, till it begins to cling to the sides of its receptacle). Then fold in one-half of a stiffly-whipped egg-white. Beat till smooth and stiff, then heat in a dainty sberbert cup and set on ice till thoroughly cold and set.

Meat Custard: Dissolve one-half teaspoon of beef extract paste in one-third cup of cold water, then add this to one-half cup of hot sweet milk. Season with salt and stir in two well-beaten eggs. Turn all into a custard cup, place the cup in a pan containing a little hot water, and slip the cup and pan into a moderate oven to bake till the custard is set (that is, till a knife blade, when inserted in the middle, will come out clean).

ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS

VACCINATION VS. SANITATION Mr. G.—No, we do not believe that the decrease of smallpox is due solely to sanitation. While improvement in sanitation has steadily increased in the last years, so has smallpox—that is, here in the United States.

According to the League of Nations Bulletin Epidemiology and Intell. No. 9, United States had the largest number of smallpox cases (55,538) in the world, during 1924, with the single exception of the British India. In all of European and Asiatic Russia there were only 24,967 cases reported. The figures for the United States for the last year show an increase of 85 percent over 1923, while Russia shows a decrease of more than 45 percent for the same period of time. If cleanliness were a sure protection against the disease, then it would look as though the people of the United States are on the whole dirtier in their habits than the people of Russia. We certainly don't believe that.
