Parish Dinner This Evening—

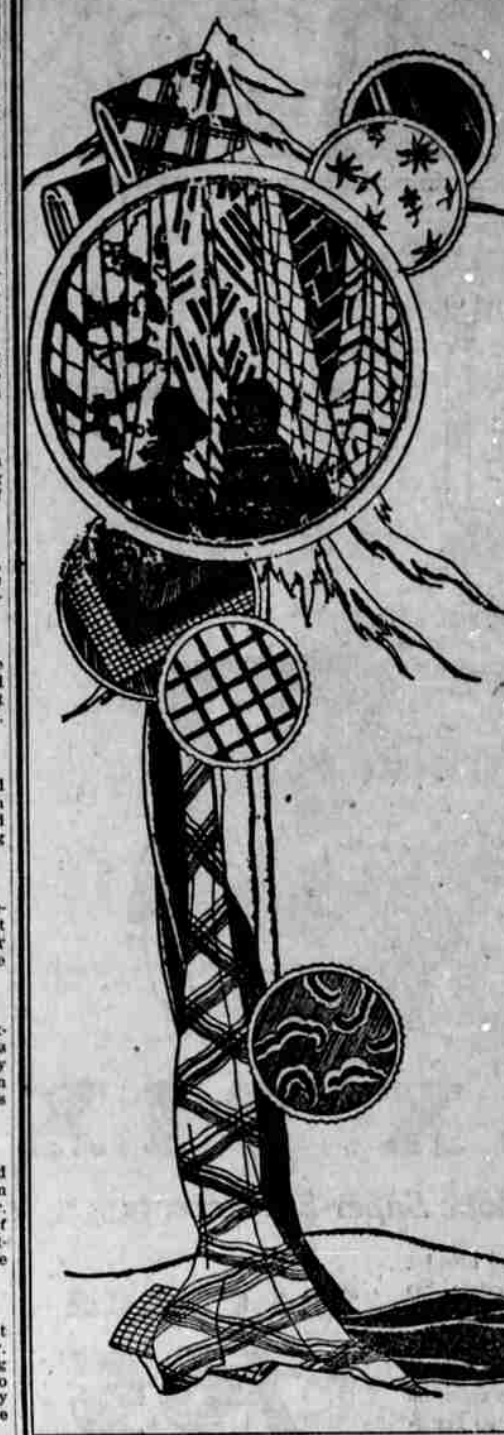

Nominations Made for the Office of Director— Amendment to By-Laws Proposed.
