## NEW HARRISBURG BRIDGE, AIDING EAST SIDE, OPEN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10.—State Highway Engineer Roy Klein announces that the new \$200,000

bridge over the Willamette river at Harrisburg will be opened to traffic today. The bridge is the last Willamette river bridge on the Pacific highway and will take the place of the Harrisburg ferry that has been in use for years. Construction of the bridge has been under way for the last 18 months. The bridge has three 180 foot spans, making the total length 540 feet, but with the addition of approach construction the length stretches out to 1600 feet. The bridge is of concrete and steel. The new bridge is expected to increase traffic over the east side route of the Pacific highway.

## BROTHER KILLS BROTHER AS THIRD OFFICER, LOOKS ON

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 10.—William Smith, a rancher of Franklin, 15 miles south of here on the Sacramento river, was shot and killed this morning by his brother, Henry, authorities allege, while a third brother Ed, a state traffic officer, looked on.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 10.—Henry Schmidt, a rancher at Franklin, near here, early today shot and instantly killed a brother, William, threatened another brother, County Traffic Officer Edward Schmidt, and declared his intentions of destroying William's family, consisting of a wife and two children. The slayer is said to have been crazed by religious fanaticism.

William Schmidt was slain by his brother when he stepped from his house and faced the crazed man, who carried a shotgun from his own ranch to that of his brother, two miles south of Franklin.

Firing once, Henry Schmidt approached the second brother, the county traffic officer, placed the muzzle of the weapon against the latter's breast and was about to press the trigger when the gun was wrested from his hands.

## SEISMOGRAPHS IN U. S. RECORD QUAKE IN DISTANT LAND

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—Severe earth tremors were recorded at 8:21 this morning by the United States Weather Bureau seismograph at the University of Chicago. The maximum intensity occurred at 8:35, while the shocks were still "going strong" according to observers, at 8:40, when the recording photographic sheets were changed. The distance was estimated at 2100 miles from Chicago.

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—Extreme earth tremors at 8:33 this morning were discerned by the seismograph at the University of Chicago. The most intense shock was recorded at 8:40, with total disappearance a minute later. It is estimated that the tremor occurred 2100 miles away.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 10.—Central America probably was the center of severe earth tremors recorded at St. Louis University between 8:25 and 8:38 a. m. today, Seismologist James B. Macelwane said. He estimated the distance at 1700 miles.

## SUCCESSFUL MINER PREFERS PROSPECTING TO MINING

SEATTLE, Dec. 10.—(A. P.)—William G. Grady, who discovered

gold in Gold Pan creek and started a rush in Cassler country of British Columbia last year, says that looking for the precious metal is more fun than taking it.

Mining is just hard work, but prospecting is great sport. "Maybe I'll sell out my interests so I can go out in the hills and try to find something else," he added.

Grady and his partner, Hugh Ford, worked the claim for 50 days last summer and took out \$50 per shovel daily. Grady came to Seattle enroute to Eastern Canada to visit his mother. He had about \$10,000 in gold nuggets.
