DEBATING TEAMS BEFORE ROTARY

The affirmative was represented by senior members composed of Leah McGaughey and Floy Strader, the negative by Harland Anton and Dorothy Geddes, juniors. The first rebuttal on the negative side of the question was taken by Harland Anton, and the rebuttal on the affirmative by Leah McGaughey.

Many decidedly interesting points were brought out in today's discussion of this very important subject which has engrossed the minds of many able thinkers throughout the nation. Both debating teams proved they had given the subject much thought and study and the clear and constructive arguments presented by both sides certainly rounded out the credit of Miss Emma Berg, under whose supervision the debate was held.

The judges, Dexter Rice, Mose Rice and Jos. Shockley, gave the honors to the students representing the affirmative, though the juniors put up a very able argument on the negative side of the question. Constructive arguments were limited to eight minutes, four minutes being taken for rebuttal. Bill Weaver made a good report on the meeting between Eugene and Roseburg Rotarians Tuesday evening, and expressed the thought that more gatherings of this kind would be conducive to the best interests of both clubs and that he would like to see inter-city meetings between various clubs continued.

It was decided that the local club will have a Christmas tree at their meeting December 24, and a committee was appointed to look after details.

To encourage development of commercial aviation I wish especially to endorse the recommendation of the committee for the creation of a bureau of air navigation in the department of commerce."

SENATE LAUGHS WHEN RIDICULE ASSAILS DAWES

Resolution introduced by Chairman Moses of the senate post office committee, authorizing continuation of the present temporary postal rates until the opening of the next session of congress or until the committee now investigating the rates completes its report.

Immediate repeal of the federal inheritance tax was demanded today in a resolution adopted here at a meeting attended by members of the legislatures of Texas, Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, North Carolina, Rhode Island and South Carolina.

Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee today introduced a resolution calling for the recognition of the Russian Soviet government by the United States. At his request action was postponed.

BUDGET ACTION DELAYED

Action by the county court on the budget for the ensuing year will probably not take place until the January term, owing to the delay of the state tax commission to specify the amount of state tax. Until state tax is announced the county court cannot specify the amount which must be raised for county purposes, and consequently some delay action on the budget will result as the necessary information is forthcoming. Recommendations of the taxpayers league are still before the court, but action probably will not be taken until the January term.

RED GRANGE HURT BADLY TODAY IN PITTSBURGH GAME

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 10.—Harold Grange, the red-head star of the gridiron, met with injuries here this afternoon during the Chicago Bears-Pittsburgh All-Stars battle at Forbes Field. In addition to the loss of their drawing card, the visitors were overwhelmed by a team of former college players 24 to 6.

Grange, taken out at the end of the first period, was found to be suffering from a torn ligament and broken blood vessels in his right arm. An X-ray will be taken tonight to determine the extent of his injuries.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Dec. 10.—A check for \$300,000, made out to Harold (Red) Grange, was received today by the Illinois Trust and Savings Bank of this city. The check was signed by Dr. W. E. Shallenberger of the Arrow Pictures Corporation.

"The check is to be held in escrow until Grange completes his contract," said Harrow E. McNevin, cashier of the Illinois Trust and Savings Bank. McNevin is a partner of C. C. Pyle, Grange's manager, in the operation of theaters in Champaign and cities in the central west.

"We are receiving checks made out to Grange every day from the east," said McNevin today. "Sometimes there are three or four in the mail."
