WAY CLEAR FOR PRE-WAR BASIS MELLON'S VIEW

Situation in United States Satisfactory; Outlook Abroad Hopeful.

CRITICISMS UTTERED

Installment Buying Unwise, Private Loans to War Debtor Countries Disapproved.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Early accomplishment of a complete world wide economic stabilization is foreseen by Secretary Mellon.

Both at home and abroad, the secretary declared in his annual report submitted to congress today, developments of the last year have been so satisfactory that "the way is now clear for a more complete world recovery."

Mr. Mellon believes the underlying factors of the business situation here were fundamentally sound and "warrant optimism for the future."

While the secretary saw no approaching cloud on the economic sky, he warned against expansion and speculative tendencies. The program of public economy has had its effect, as has the public debt retirement program, he said, but "there is some tendency for the consuming public to buy every conceivable commodity 'on time' and mortgage future earnings." On the other hand, he found business men conducting their affairs with restraint and caution in order that the prosperity may not bring on carelessness.

"It is hoped, furthermore," he added, "that the speculative tendency in real estate in some communities may not proceed to the point of undermining the spirit of caution in business."

Enlarge Coast Patrol.

Mr. Mellon reviewed the department's work in enforcement of prohibition and expressed the belief that progress had been made in reducing the supply of illicit liquor through the reorganization directed by Assistant Secretary Andrews.

He suggested that expansion of the coast guard was necessary if it were to continue efficient work in its dual capacity as a conservator of life and property and a guard against rum smuggling, and reiterated that the department's policy was to attack sources of supply rather than to attempt local police work.

Included in the secretary's report was one by the American debt commission, of which he is chairman. That report made mention of frequent press comments respecting refusal of the administration to sanction foreign loans here when the powers seeking new money had not funded their debts to this government.

Halt Foreign Loans.

"Early in 1925, after much consideration," the commission report said, "it was decided that it was contrary to the best interests of the United States to permit foreign governments which refused to adjust or make a reasonable effort to adjust their debts to the United States to finance any portion of their requirements in this country. States, municipalities, and private enterprises within the country concerned were included in the prohibition. Bankers consulting the state department were notified that the government objected to such financing. While the United States was loath to exert pressure by this means on any foreign government to settle its indebtedness, and while this country has every desire to see its surplus resources at work in the economic reconstruction and development of countries abroad, national interest demands that our resources be not permitted to flow into countries which do not honor their obligations to the United States and through the United States to its citizens."

Heat with gas.

"OLD IRONSIDES" WILL BE SUBJECT OF HISTORIC FILM

genius of the screen, left Los Angeles today for Europe on a trip of observation to gather data and select locations for the filming of a super-historical epic to be called "Old Ironsides." Cruise will visit Tripoli, where the "Constitution" reached the climax of its naval fame during the war against the pirates of the Mediterranean in the United States in 1804.

Saved once before by Oliver Wendell Holmes' stirring poem, "Old Ironsides," the frigate, now falling to pieces from rot and disuse in the Boston Navy yard, is today again being rescued from oblivion by the school children of America under the leadership of the navy department, through millions of small contributions toward its reconstruction. The Elks, Daughters of the Revolution and many other patriotic societies are lending their cooperation and support.

Although this will preserve the vessel for another half century, it is now to be immortalized in a larger way by Cruise. It is to be preserved not as a glorious hulk fallen into sad decay, but as a living thing, beautiful and proud, its canvas belled to the wind, helm down, sailing forever before the eyes of American youth across the magic of the silver screen.

Coincident with Cruise's departure, Jesse L. Lasky, first vice-president of Famous Players-Lasky corporation, announced that the "Constitution" gripping story, from the time its keel was laid in the Philadelphia navy yard in 1794 and including its valiant service against the pirates of Tripoli, will be filmed on the mightiest scale ever attempted.

It was "Old Ironsides" which carried the flag of a pugnacious nation, the United States of America, to the Mediterranean, and inspired by the slogan, "Millions for defense, but not one cent for tribute," swept the pirates from the seas forever. In that glorious chapter of our navy's history, leading parts were played by lads, most of them mere striplings, whose names form a veritable roll of honor of the American navy—Stephen Decatur, Lawrence, Bainbridge, Porter and Somers.

Full pressure on the work of preparing the story, setting and properties is now under way at the Paramount studio in Hollywood.

TAX EXTENSION APPLICATIONS ARE NOW AVAILABLE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10.—To expedite the granting of applications of extensions of time in which to file income tax returns, Commissioner of Internal Revenue David H. Blair, has delegated to Collectors of Internal Revenue authority to grant such extensions. Heretofore, under the revenue act of 1924, applications for extensions have been addressed to the commissioner.

Extensions are granted in cases of absence, sickness or inability to obtain data to make a correct return with certain provisions. No extension will be granted unless application is made therefor on or before March 15 the date prescribed by law for filing the return. The applicant must state specifically the reason for such request, which will be granted only if the explanation is satisfactory to the collector. Illness or absence of a particular officer of a corporation or a member of a partnership does not constitute, in itself, a sufficient reason for granting the corporation or partnership such extension.

In no case will a particular extension be granted for more than 90 days. Where a taxpayer requests an extension of more than 90 days, the extension may be granted only for 90 days and the collector will advise the taxpayer that if he is unable to file the completed return prior to the expiration of the 90-day period, a new application should be made before that period expires. In this way, extensions may be granted, in meritorious cases, for a period of not to exceed six months from the prescribed date by law for filing the return. No extensions may be granted for more than six months, except in the case of American citizens residing or traveling abroad, non-resident alien individuals and foreign corporations having no office or place of business within the United States.

In the case of corporations, no extensions of time usually may be granted, unless conditioned upon the filing of a tentative return and payment of one-fourth the estimated tax, on or before the date prescribed by law for filing the return. However, if the application for the extension was made on or before such date, but it was impossible to grant the extension in ample time to enable taxpayers to file a tentative return on or before due date, the date for filing such tentative return and paying one-fourth of the estimated tax may be advanced in the communication granting the extension to permit the taxpayer to comply with this requirement.

Individuals also are required to file a tentative return and pay one-fourth of the estimated tax, on or before the date prescribed by law for filing returns, whenever, in the opinion of the collector, it is possible for the particular individual to do so. Where, in the case of such individuals, the application was made on or before the date prescribed by law for filing the return and where it is impossible to grant such extension in time to enable the taxpayer to file a tentative return, on or before the due date for filing and payment of one-fourth the estimated tax may be advanced, as is done in the case of corporations.

In all cases of requests for an extension conditioned upon the filing of a tentative return and payment of one-fourth of the estimated tax shown thereon, such requirements must be met or the extension is of no effect. The taxpayer need only show on his tentative return, filed on appropriate blanks, his name and address and the estimated amount, if any, of the tax due.

MILLERSVILLE, Ind., Dec. 10.—(A. P.)—Joy and grief have followed each other through the luxurious corridors of Laurel Hall, once the palatial country seat of Stoughton A. Fletcher, Indianapolis capitalist, which soon is to become a school for girls.

The pretentious home and 229 acres of the estate have been purchased by the Sisters of Providence, a Catholic order, who will convert it into an academy.

Fletcher, once one of the wealthiest men in Indiana, built the home and laid out the estate in 1916 at a cost of more than \$2,000,000. For several years it was the scene of
