ANNUAL FISH CONTROVERSY STAGED.

The controversy that always follows the annual tinkering with the state fishing laws broke out on the south of us this week, during a meeting at Medford of southern Oregon sportsmen with State Game Warden Averill.

In reply it may be stated that there is no expressed dissatisfaction on part of local anglers—at least none that we know of—with the present law that permits the taking of steelheads in the Umpqua river not shorter than fifteen inches during the closed "trout" season.

The proposal to place the steelhead beyond the reach of commercial interests by officially placing it in the same category with trout, leaving to the canneries the more profitable chinook and silverside salmon, appears to be a proper solution for the whole matter.

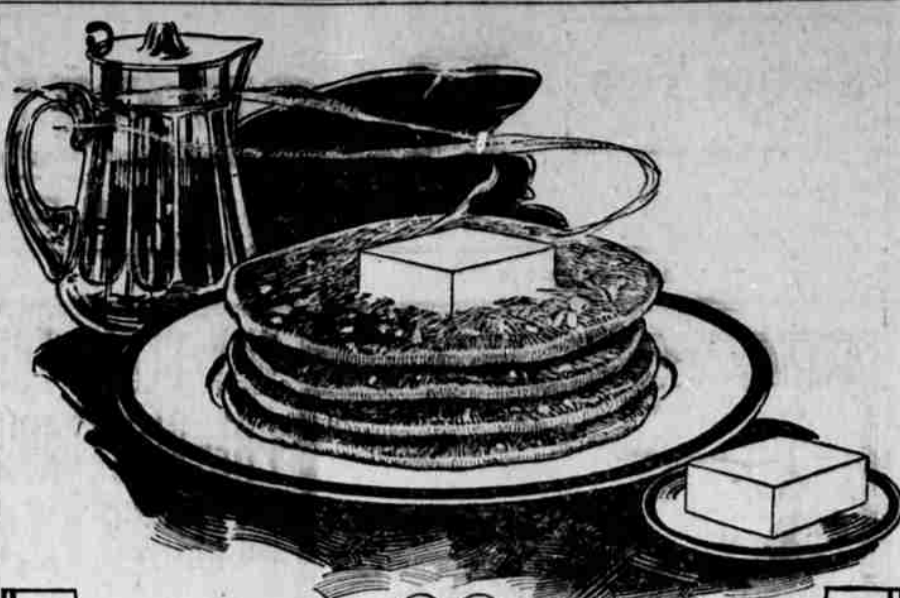
GLENDALE CITY COUNCIL INSTALLED On Monday evening, December 7, the common council met in regular session and the regular routine of business was carried on.
