IF YOU SMOKE

Let's hope—you don't. It's one of the unnecessary habits. It has a bad effect on your teeth, gums, fingers, lungs, digestion and heart, and its good effects are imaginary.

My objections to cigarettes are based on aesthetic rather than moral reasons. I don't think it's a good looking habit. But if you must smoke, remember these hints: Rinse your mouth and gargle your throat with some good antiseptic to take away the taste and odor of tobacco.

The fingers that hold the cigarette will stain yellow. It's quite hard to remove this, but rubbing the skin with a very weak solution of oxalic acid will do so.

Had stains may have to be rubbed with pumice stone, and the place cold creamed afterward. Powdered pumice, by the way, must be used on the front teeth to remove the brown stains that will appear there.

Be careful of your sweets and candies, for they are high in energy (calories) and low in building elements.

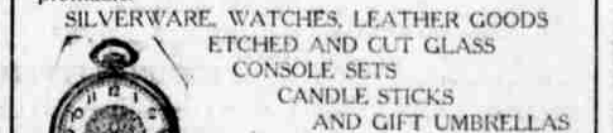
