packages often receive very rough treatment, and this should be borne in mind when preparing bundles for shipment.

One new ruling of the post office department insures prompt handling and delivery of parcel post packages. A 25-cent handling stamp is provided, which gives the package the same attention as first class mail matter.

In addition to the handling stamp a special delivery stamp will insure immediate delivery of the package to the person to whom it is addressed.

Local employees report that there is seldom a mailbox carrying Christmas packages arrives without having in it several broken parcels from which candles, toys or other articles are released to become hopelessly mixed with the other articles in the bag.

In view of all conditions it plainly behooves Christmas givers to send their mail through the post office as quickly as possible in order that it may reach the proper destination promptly and in a safe condition.
