Frederick Steiwer, candidate for the republican nomination for United States Senator, has been active during the past few weeks visiting prominent citizens and political leaders in various sections of the state. DEALER SELLS EGGS BY POUND, DEFYING STATE GRADING LAW

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 12.—W. S. Fitts, local produce dealer who opened an innovation here by selling eggs by the pound, following effectiveness of the new state law requiring them to be graded, hurried a deft at State Dairy and Food Commissioner J. D. Mickle of Portland today, following instructions from Mickle that eggs must still be graded, even when sold by weight.

"I will continue to sell eggs just as I am until I am arrested," declared Fitts. "We will then find out whether or not it is illegal to sell eggs by weight without grading them. From compliments I have received from all over I am satisfied the people want eggs sold in this manner."

The dairy and food commissioner himself, in his letter to Fitts, advising him that while he still may sell eggs by weight under the law, says that nevertheless the requirement of the law regarding grading must be followed and adds, "In regard to selling eggs by weight this department has no objection to the procedure; in fact if it were a universal custom it would be more satisfactory than the practice now in vogue. However, we have a law on the statute books in the state of Oregon which cannot be ignored."

Here he points out the various grades required under the law and goes on to say "regardless of whether eggs are sold by weight or count they must be graded into these classifications."

SUSPECTED SHEDD BANK ROBBERS TO FACE CHARGE SOON

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12.—The five men held in jail as suspects in the Shedd and Troutdale Bank robberies will face some sort of charges shortly.

District Attorney Stanley Myers announced that if they are not taken to Albany on actual bank robbery charges, he will file charges of possessing stolen property against them here.

This announcement followed the identification by both Mr. and Mrs. John L. Etheridge of Vincent Murphy and Columbus Jimmy Murray as the two men who had opened negotiations with Etheridge to buy a block of bonds which, according to the authorities, included some stolen from the Shedd bank.

Any charges to be placed by Myers will include also Wallace Witzel, George (Mike) Welch and Charles L. Griffin, the district attorney announced.

District Attorney L. G. Lewelling and Sheriff Frank Richards of Linn county have gone back to Shedd to see if they can get some better finger prints.

One of the prints brought here appeared to check to some degree with one taken from a member of the alleged robber gang, but it was not close enough to form the basis of charges.

Cashier H. E. Boyd and E. Turner, a customer of the Troutdale bank, are to decide today whether they will lay a complaint against the men. They picked out Witzel and Griffin as two of the three men who robbed the bank, but they were not certain enough to act without thinking the matter over.

YOUNG MEN HELD FOR INVESTIGATION Three young men, giving the names of A. C. Ramsey, Andrew McNew and L. A. Willey, giving their residence as Los Angeles, were picked up here last night and are being held for investigation. They were driving in a Ford roadster, and had no drivers' license, ownership certificate, or any papers to indicate title to the machine. A series of entries also indicates a possible murder in which an aged, wealthy man was the victim.
