SOCIETY GIRL IS WINNER OF WAGER ON 44-MILE HIKE

(Associated Press Local Wire.) BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 14.—Miss Eleanor Sears, Boston society leader, today completed a walk from Providence to her home in Boston to win a wager. She covered the 44 miles in a little over 31 hours, although the time limit set by the terms of the wager was 15 hours.

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 14.—Miss Eleanor Sears, noted society sports-woman, was attempting to walk 44 miles in 15 hours today to win a bet.

She left Providence, R. I., at 11 a. m., and her early progress gave her high hopes of being able to reach her home in executive Beacon Street, Boston, within the stipulated period.

The amount of the wager was withheld, but Miss Sears said she made it a year ago in Paris, with Howard Sturges of Providence.

Miss Sears, Boston and New York social leader, "good fellow" and athlete, extraordinary for 20 years has kept her name among the leaders in almost every line of amateur sport.

She has been a finalist in both the women's singles and mixed doubles national tennis tournaments. Until she sold her stables and shot her favorite horses that no one else might own them, her performers were consistent blue ribbon winners. She is an excellent swimmer, can handle a yacht, shoot with rifle or revolver, skate, was the first American woman to fly over water.

In 1912 she bet \$200 she could walk the 110 miles between Burlington and Del Monte, Cal., in 45 hours. She biked over the stretch in 32 hours flat. Miss Sears, who is 40 years of age, is a member of one of the oldest families in Boston. Periodically since 1912, she has been reported engaged to Harold Vanderbilt, but to date she has remained Boston's "society bachelorette girl."

GEN. SUMMERALL ON STAND ANSWERS MITCHELL CHARGES

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Major General Charles P. Summerall, one of the outstanding figures of the American army, took the witness stand in the Mitchell court martial today to reply directly to Colonel Mitchell's charges that as commander at Hawaii he countenanced improper conduct of the island air forces.

The general appeared before a court, whose president he had been during the first few hours of his existence, and from which he had withdrawn voluntarily on the opening day of the trial after his record in Hawaii had been attacked in a challenge by the defense.

The general contradicted General Mitchell's statement that as late as 1923 there were no army plans for air defense of Hawaii. He said he was concerned in 1923 about the shortage of air service personnel and equipment but was told by general staff officers that no reinforcements were available.

"I then created two air squadrons from field artillery troops," he added, "and finally got planes for them."

LANSDOWNE GIVEN OPPORTUNITY TO DEFER FATAL TRIP

Secretary of Navy Wilbur Asserts Commander of Shenandoah Advised of His Rights.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Referring to the Shenandoah disaster and the controversy which followed, Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, in his annual report to the White House, made public today, again declared that complete liberty of action was given Lieutenant Commander Zachary Lansdowne, the ship's commander. As for aviation policies in general, he reiterated his stand that aeronautics should continue as an arm of the fleet.

"On August 18, 1925," Mr. Wilbur said, "the chief of naval operations held his final conference with Lieutenant Commander Lansdowne concerning the flight, at which time Lieutenant Commander Lansdowne expressed himself as satisfied with the date and arrangement for the flight and expressed entire confidence in the ability of the ship and crew to successfully complete the proposed flight."

"At this conference Lieutenant Lansdowne was again reminded that in accordance with the established policy of the department he was authorized to defer the trip, change the itinerary, or abandon it altogether if in his judgment such changes were rendered necessary by weather conditions."

BOOZE BARON OF ENGLAND FORCED INTO BANKRUPTCY

(Associated Press Local Wire.) LONDON, Dec. 12.—Sir Broderick Cecil Hartwell, known as the "rum running baron," again is in financial distress. His name is included in the Official Gazette list of receiving orders in bankruptcy.

Sir Broderick, in 1923, organized a company to buy liquor, with the alleged purpose of seeing that the United States was made comparatively moist. Circulars were issued inviting the public to take shares in the company, promising large returns to subscribers. Large shipments are said to have been made, but finally it was reported that the American coast patrol had put a crimp in his activities by the seizure of some thousands of cases of liquor and that the various shareholders in his company would get little returns for their outlay.

Later it was said the baron admitted that he was out of luck and also funds but that he would continue to work. A circular issued announced that he would attempt to land cargoes through the Bahamas International Trading company if funds for the project were forthcoming. Whether any cargoes got through the blockade is unknown.

PROTECTIVE SOCIETY ASKS FOR DONATIONS OF FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

HARTH'S TOGGERY

KLAMATH INDIANS ASK U. S. FOR LOAN OF FIVE MILLIONS

(Associated Press Local Wire.) KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 14.—Fred Hendricks, Klamath Indian, left here today for Washington, D. C., where he will appear before interior department officials and members of congress to press the Klamath Indians' request for the \$5,000,000 loan on the sale of reservation timber. Although he needs approximately \$500 to finance the trip, Hendricks is leaving here with but \$248, but hopes some way or other to procure sufficient funds in the east to keep him there lobbying for the bill and then bring him back to the reservation.

"I can only buy a one-way ticket and trust good fortune to get enough to bring me home," said Hendricks prior to his departure this morning. "But I am so anxious to get this over for the Indians that I am willing to take a chance on any personal discomfort."

U. S. Senator McNary has before congress a bill to advance a loan of \$5,000,000 to the Klamath Indians, to be paid back at five per cent interest from the sale of their timber lands. This would give the Klamath Indians approximately \$4,000 each and would enable them to farm their lands properly and get on their feet financially.
