BEAUTY CHATS

PIMPLES

Pimples are entirely unnecessary. They come because the first rule of good health and good looks is neglected—the rule being that the body must be given as much food as it can digest and dispose of without over working itself, and no more.

In the beginning they come because this first rule is overlooked. If a constipated condition has become chronic, pimples will come even when the amount of food is correct, for then the body is poisoning itself. And after a long attack of them, they will continue to break out on the skin even when the internal condition has been cured, because the skin reflects itself. So you have two kinds of treatment to give yourself.

The first, and immediate, thing to do is to diet. You can begin that this very minute if you have pimples. Drink two glasses of hot water with salt in it if you hate the taste of heated water. This helps flush out bowels and kidneys. Your next meal must be light and simple—little meat, no pastry or pudding, fruit and salads. All meals must be light and easily digested. Six glasses of water, preferably hot, must be drunk during the course of the day two of them before breakfast.

Yeast should be taken to overcome constipation. Anywhere from one to three cakes a day in the "dose." After this the very important skin treatment must be considered. I think the best combination is to steam the face at night and rub it full of sulphur ointment to cure the pimples and make the skin antiseptic against further infection, and to touch each pimple during the day with a half and half mixture of ether and alcohol, to dry them up. Put the stuff on cotton and stick bits of wet cotton over the skin. Wet

every now and then, keeping on half an hour.

they are forming if you bathe them with spirits of camphor. If the blisters have formed open them carefully with a sterilized needle, and then bathe with peroxide or any other mild and antiseptic solution.

ANSWERS TO INQUIRIES

H. W.: "Do you suppose any of your readers could give me a recipe for Plum Duff?"

Answer: Perhaps some kind Reader Friend will write this recipe on a postal card and mail it to me for publication.

Mrs. McL.: "Recently one of our Column Sisters asked for this recipe: Jeff Davis Pie: Two cups of granulated sugar, one-half cup of butter, three eggs, two cups of sweet milk, two tablespoons of flour, one teaspoon of ground cinnamon, one-half teaspoon each of ground cloves, allspice and nutmeg, and one-fourth teaspoon of vanilla. Cream the butter and sugar together, add eggs, milk, and flour with spices. Bake in a low-er crust of pastry. This recipe was used in the kitchen of the Executive Mansion during Jefferson Davis' term as President of the Confederacy. This recipe makes the filling for two pies."

Answer: We seldom fail to get one of our generous-spirited Column Readers, do we? I am sure we all thank you for this one.

W. T. L.: "Is there any way of keeping hops-chest linens white for several years?"

Answer: Yes. Wrap them in blue tissue paper. They should be ironed but not starched.

Miss M. K.: "How is a tan wool sweater cleaned?"

Answer: Dissolve a handful of white soap flakes in a basin of hot water; after a few minutes add enough cold water to make a lukewarm suds. Put the sweater into this, squeeze and press the suds through it, and if the water becomes very dirty repeat this washing with fresh suds of the same temperature. Then rinse by pouring off the suds and adding clear lukewarm water. Throw away this first rinse water and use a second, also lukewarm.

Squeeze the garment as dry as possible without wringing, and dry it by laying on a clean white cloth in a shady spot (out of doors if possible, but not in freezing temperature). Pull and push the sweater into its original shape and let it dry in this way. It is always safest to measure the garment before washing, and then pull it to the same measurements when you lay it on the cloth to dry.

Mrs. A. H.: "Please print a recipe for Vanilla Sauce for Puddings."

Answer: Vanilla Sauce: Mix together five-eighths of a cup of sugar and one and one-fourth tablespoon of dry cornstarch powder. Add one and one-fourth cups of boiling water, cook four minutes, remove from fire, and add one-half teaspoon of vanilla extract, a pinch of nutmeg, and one and one-fourth tablespoons of butter. If a tart flavor is liked, add also one-third teaspoon of cider vinegar. Serve hot.
