MARY E. HAGAN DIES TODAY AFTER LONG ILLNESS. Mary Elizabeth Hagan, of North Roseburg, died this morning after a most severe illness which extended over the past three weeks. Mrs. Hagan was born at Monmouth, Maine, Aug. 8, 1833 and resided in that city until 13 years of age when she removed to Lowell, Mass. In 1875 she was united to Captain James Hagan of Stockton, Maine, and moved to Nebraska and later to Iowa. After a year spent in the middle west she and her husband returned to Maine where Captain Hagan passed away in 1885. Eighteen years ago Mrs. Hagan moved to Oregon and for the past thirteen years has been a resident of Roseburg. She is survived by three children, Horace H. Hagan of Roseburg, Mr. Emma M. Mitchell, of Marshfield and Latavia Hagan of Roseburg. At the age of 16 years Mrs. Hagan united with the Free Will Baptist church. During her residence in Oregon she has been affiliated with the Christian church. The funeral services will occur at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Christian church. Rev. H. E. Mow officiating. PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—Turkey receipts in the local market over the week-end were only fair and this morning the streets was pretty well sold out on fancy dressed toms. Arrivals Sunday Sunday promptly went to fill shipping orders and today the bulk of the offerings consisted of hens and small. The market held firm at 45 and 46 cents over Sunday, but this morning showed signs of weakening. Top birds, however, were still going at 45 cents at a late hour. Commission firms look for an easier market from now on until after the holidays. Other lines of poultry are fairly steady with demand well equal to supplies. Dressed geese are the exception with the street well supplied and the demand limited. Best prices late this morning on dressed geese were 25 to 26 cents. Dressed ducks were very scarce and firm at 30 to 32 cents. Dressed springs brought 25 to 28 cents and hens 23 to 29 cents. Live poultry was steady at Saturday's closing prices. Wholesale firms have announced a decline of 10 cents a sack in sugar effective today. New price on best cane is \$5.55. The entire flour list is down 20 cents a sack, the decline being effective Saturday. Family patents now quoted at 9:40 and bakers wheat at \$10 a sack. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—(U. S.
