the youth of the country since the war.

"Incidents like the Mayflower case are going on and they are responsible for creating the character of the youth."

"It isn't a question what you think of prohibition. It is a question of whether lying, stealing and cheating are necessary to enforce laws."

Law Must Be Enforced.

The Tucker amendment was opposed by Chairman Madden of the appropriations committee and Representative Byrnes, Tennessee, ranking Democrat on the committee.

Mr. Madden said he voted against the eighteenth amendment, but since prohibition was law, he favored enforcement.

"If people are opposed to prohibition," he said, "the main thing to do is to repeal the law. If you adopt this amendment you will make it unenforceable."

He added that he did not approve the tactics pursued by the prohibition agent at the Mayflower.

Representative Blanton said it is "the blitherers who are making a farce of prohibition."

"Don't put the enforcement of prohibition," he said, "in the hands of a man whose finances are involved in enforcement."

Langley Case Pending.

The special house committee appointed to investigate charges against Representative John W. Langley, Republican, Kentucky, who was convicted of conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act, reported today that it understood he would resign from the house in event his appeal to the supreme court failed.

The committee held that it was not the policy of the house to take action against a member accused of crime until the court of last resort had passed on the case.

Participation by the United States in the forthcoming League of Nations disarmament conference would be authorized in a resolution introduced today by Senator King, Democrat, Utah.

The resolution, which Senator King asked to have temporarily laid aside, would authorize the President to name delegates to represent the United States.

A similar resolution was introduced in the house by Representative Moore, Democrat, of Virginia, a member of the foreign affairs committee.

Army Court Upheld.

The army court that tried and sentenced Colonel William Mitchell for his criticism of the government air services was defended in the house today by Representative Wainwright of New York, a former Republican assistant secretary of war.

It must be remembered, Mr. Wainwright said, that although Colonel Mitchell wears decorations for valor, every member of the court that tried him also had been decorated.

Court martials are necessary for discipline, he continued, and discipline must be enforced in peacetime, or it will disappear in time of war.

Coinage of a new fifty-cent piece designed to commemorate the erection of a memorial to President Harding at a point on the old Oregon trail, where he delivered a speech shortly before his death, is proposed in a bill introduced by Representative Sinnott, Oregon.

Senator La Follette, asked the senate today to call on the treasury department for a report showing the financial ramifications of the anthracite operators.

Black has won the Canadian professional title four years in succession. Both men have been Pacific northwest and Washington state open golf champions.

WILL PURDY DIES.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 22.—Will E. Purdy, who was a delegate from Oregon to the Democratic National Convention in San Francisco in 1920, died at his home here today at the age of 63 years. He had been many times a candidate for state or congressional offices. He was defeated for the Democratic nomination for congress for the first district in 1924.

Purdy's career was varied. He was formerly a minister, later a lawyer and of late years has engaged in several business ventures in Salem.

He is survived by his widow and nine children.
