GOVERNMENT CROP FORECAST CAUSES WHEAT ADVANCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—Wheat prices shot skyward as the result of the government crop report suggesting that the United States has already shipped abroad wheat that is needed at home.
Today's opening prices ranged all the way from 23 to 24 cents higher than yesterday's closing figures. December delivery touching \$1.76 1/2 a bushel.
According to a leading trade authority the government's definite corroborated assertions that the United States has only sufficient bread wheat available for domestic requirements until another crop is gathered or prices advanced to a level that will check wheat use.
The most active trading was in May delivery. Initial quotations for May were \$1.67 1/2 to \$1.70 and despite rapid subsequent changes the market held most of the time near to the top opening figures.

PROVIDES QUICK SERVICE FOR CARS

In anticipation of another record-breaking year during 1926, the Chevrolet Motor company has greatly expanded its field organization to assure quick distribution of cars and parts to its thousands of dealers.

The expansion program just completed involved the opening of three new zone offices in key cities and the erection of specially designed sales and service buildings at four other zone points.

The new zone offices are located at New York City, Cleveland, O., and Omaha, Neb. The offices are in the heart of the automobile districts in their respective cities.

The new zone distribution buildings are at Des Moines, Ia., Minneapolis, Minn., Charlotte, N. C., and Jacksonville, Fla. All of the buildings have direct railroad freight service, facilitating the receiving of cars and parts and their reshipment to dealers throughout the zones.

The drive-away stocks of cars are so arranged that they may be started enroute within a few minutes after a call is received from any dealer in the zone. The supplies of parts are compactly arranged in special stock rooms adjoining the packing and shipping departments. This arrangement insures equally quick action on requests for parts.

Besides providing ample space for stocks of cars and parts, the new buildings contain zone offices, assembly rooms for meetings of the zone organizations, and Chevrolet service schools where dealers' shop experts are given special training with especially designed Chevrolet precision tools. There now are 29 of these schools, the number having been doubled during 1925.

BOSTON FEELS COAL PINCH.

BOSTON, Dec. 23.—Hard coal has become so scarce here that only one large firm which has opened 12 distribution stations is offering anthracite to cash and carry customers at one cent a pound. Buyers must bring their own basket.

NEW PROCESS MAY MAKE OLD OIL GOOD

AUBURN, Dec. 23.—(A. P.)—Demonstrations here indicate that old crankcase oil of automobiles which has been regarded fit for nothing may be reclaimed and used again.

Dr. C. D. Miller, who is engaged in research work in the department of agricultural engineering of the Agricultural College of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute, has succeeded in working out a method for reclaiming or laundering old oil at a cost estimated by him at less than five cents a gallon.

In studying the problem, Dr. Miller found that oil does not "wear out" by use in a crankcase, and neither does it change its composition, some losses occur mechanically and by oxidation, but the oil itself remains substantially the same as it was before used. It is rendered unfit for service by contamination with other substances, such as carbon and other solids, and certain constituents of gasoline.

The removal of these substances is all that is required for its successful reclamation. This can be done by pouring the oil into a tank, adding a washing powder, blowing steam through it for about three hours, allowing it to settle and then drawing off the oil from the top, leaving the foreign substances, both solid and liquid, in the bottom.

When treated this way the steam is partly condensed, dissolving the washing powder, which has the property of loading down the carbon and other solid particles in the oil with a film of the solution, causing them to coagulate somewhat as casein coagulates in milk when it curdles. This causes the solid particles to settle to the bottom of the container, forming a layer of sludge or muck between the oil and the solution. The uncondensed portion of the steam carries the gasoline away with it as vapor.

On the efficiency of this method Dr. Miller says that four quarts of oil as it is drawn ordinarily from a crankcase should return three quarts of oil as good as new.

While the practical use of this discovery remains to be determined Dr. Miller predicts that many garages and service stations will take advantage of it.
