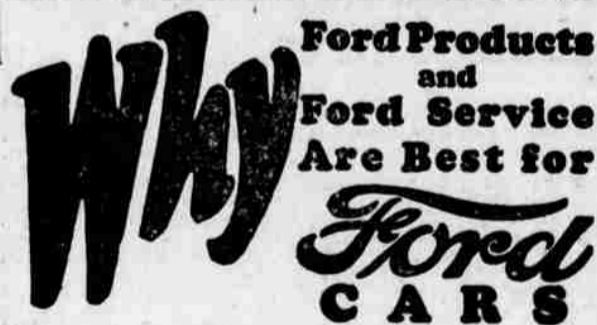

### COMPANY'S CRASH ENGLUFS SAVINGS HUNDREDS OF FOLKS

**ELGIN, Ill., Dec. 26.**—Jailed as the result of the uncovering of an alleged forgery involving \$3,000, the life savings of an aged widow, Walter C. Ripberger, of the bankrupt Charles Ripberger Company, today faces prosecution on a series of criminal charges.

Up to this afternoon only one warrant signed by Mrs. E. McDonald, of this city, had been secured. Numerous others alleging forgery, misappropriation of funds and duplication of mortgages, have been threatened.

Ripberger is in the county jail under \$10,000 bonds. Notices have been served that if an attempt is made to secure Ripberger's release on bonds, additional warrants will be secured.

The financial crash of the company is said to have swept away the life savings of hundreds of residents. According to unofficial reports, between three thousand and four thousand Elgin residents have been transacting business through the Ripberger Company.

### FEDERAL DIVORCE BILL APPROVED BY CHICAGO JUDGES

**CHICAGO, Dec. 26.**—The federal divorce bill, introduced in congress by Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas, was unanimously favored by five Cook county judges who have had experience in the divorce courts, though they suggested alterations, a symposium revealed today. The five have heard more than 7,600 divorce petitions in the last five years.

Judge Joseph Sabath expressed approval of an amendment which would require the prospective bride and bridegroom to give two weeks' notice before they obtain a marriage license.

All the judges declared that inability to perform the marriage duties and communication of a social disease has also been made a basis for a divorce in a national law.

## ITALY SNARLS AT GERMANY IN BOASTFUL TONE

**Racial Animosity Develops From Press Comment on Affairs in Tyrol.**

### LOCARNO FORGOTTEN

**Brenner Guard Formed With Declaration Boundary Pass Will Be Only Starting Point.**

**ROME, Dec. 26.**—Anti-German sentiment is flaring up in Italy. Denouncing Germany as "our instinctive racial enemy," the Fascist paper Impero, has come out with a warning to Italians against the trade and other activities of Germany.

The immediate occasion of the paper's article is news that the German press is perturbed over the treatment of Germans in South Tyrol, a district which includes the famous Brenner Pass through the mountains. The pass is the shortest route between central Germany and Italy and marks the frontier between Italy and Austria.

**Brenner Guard Formed.**  
The Impero announces the formation of an organization known as the "Brenner Guard," which has among its slogans: "The Italian of total is insuperable. Brenner Pass is not the goal, but the starting point."

This extreme Fascist development has come less than a month after the signing of the Locarno pacts at London and a few days after ratification by the Italian chamber of deputies of a treaty of commerce with Germany. It follows also the arrest in Palermo recently of Mrs. Ella Briggs, a New York architect as a German spy.

**Concise Supreme.**  
The Impero says Italy never will play second fiddle to Germany again. It demands that Germany shall expiate her criminal folly, that Germany never aspire to the possession of colonies, that Austria be prevented from joining Germany against Italy and that Italy forever hold the Brenner Pass, acquired as a result of the war.

Signor Marinetti, a fascist artist, is the organizer of the "Brenner Guard." Its program says among other things:

"The ancient Romans conquered all peoples of the earth; the Italian of today is insuperable."  
"Brenner Pass is not the goal, but the starting point."  
"The most unworthy Italian is worth a thousand foreigners."  
"Italian products are the best in the world."

## FEWER AMERICANS IN PRISON, DUE TO PROBATION SYSTEM

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.**—The American people are showing increased ability in the way of keeping out of prisons, it was indicated today in census bureau figures on the prison population of the nation. Covering estimates as of January 1, 1923, the latest date on which the facts were obtainable, the bureau placed the number in prisons at 169,619 as against 111,498 on January 1, 1910.

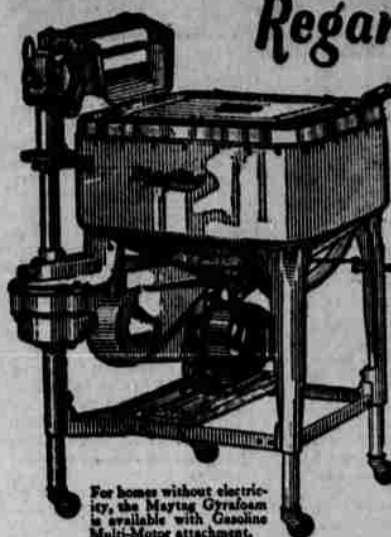
This would indicate an imprisonment rate of 99.7 per 100,000 of population for 1923, whereas in 1910, the rate was 121.2 per 100,000. The bureau warned however, that the figures should not be considered as exact in revealing the relative prevalence of crime in general, nor of "specific offenses," because the rise of the probation system, the leniency in treating juvenile delinquency and other changes had operated to alter the imprisonment results of court action.

The male sex has shown an overwhelming proportion of responsibility in crime. On January 1, 1923, 2 per cent of all prisoners in penal institutions were men, and only 5.1 per cent of 4.8 per cent were women. Considering geographical distribution, the western mountain district shows a commitment rate of 47.3 per 100,000 population during 1923, while the west south central division had 44.2; the Pacific division 41.1; middle Atlantic division 30.5 and New England 21.

league that an increased appropriation be given the county health unit, but it was decided by the court to leave this amount the same as it was last year, \$4,860.

The report of the sundry items committee recommending a number of minor changes found the court unresponsive. The recommendation that \$400 be restored to the county horticulturist's budget was not allotted; the \$3,000 for a revolving horticultural fund was denied, and the appropriation of \$500 for the publication of the reports of the recent agricultural conference was turned down.

The matter of the employment of a government hunter carrying an appropriation of \$500 was left for future action, for this money, if provided, will come from the bounty fund.

The action of the court on the budget has been delayed for several weeks because of the failure of the state tax commission to certify the amount of the state tax, which was necessary before the budget could be definitely allowed.
