her life is mocked? That her marriage is not a fulfillment but a doom? That her parents have cheated her with their hypocrisy and her own shallow audacity fails to bring the happiness she craves? The situation is pregnant with drama.

I didn't write "Sandy" or "Chickie" to settle the problems of the universe. I wrote these stories because they gripped me and I felt they would grip others.

One day I chanced to be at the City and County Hospital. A young girl was brought to the Emergency. She had tried to commit suicide by letting herself into the bay from one of the piers. Her dress caught, hanging her to a beam with only her feet touching the waters.

She tried to die because she was going to have a child and the man she loved no longer cared for her. This girl wasn't a moon—not the flat-faced, bovine type often found in such situations. She was beautiful, eighteen and very intelligent.

She preferred death to the disgrace the world would mete her; death to the torment of bringing a child here only to have it branded and shamed all the days of its life.

This incident was the first of many that eventually made up the impression of "Chickie." There are many Sandys in the world today and many Chickies—winsome

things eager for love—standing on a hilltop with some Barry's arm about them, trembling because his kiss is such a tenderness and such a rapture; whispering: "You'll love me always!"

It starts sweetly so. In this day of freedom when a girl thinks she has as much right to love and live as a man.

But when the end comes, pitiless and inescapable with the ancient cruelty of sex, it is the girl who bears the cross.

Those writing these stories serve any purpose? Does it arouse mature minds to search some more adequate answer than that pitiful bunkum: "In our day, girls didn't think such things?"

I don't know. But I do know that at every freehold mothers and fathers agonize sorely the problems of their young; and the young flaunt brazenly their defiance. If you want to interest parents, just talk about their children; if you want to interest girls, ask what they think of petting and bootlegging.

A story that tries faithfully to portray the tumult of the one; and the bafflement of the other inevitably rips. We like to see in fiction the characters and tribulation we find in our own lives. Perhaps this should be enough for the maker of serials.

went off a road in an outlying district and landed wheels up. Officers said they found a bottle of liquor on Baker.

Mrs. Mildred Harper, 49, was found dead by other members of a Christmas party three hours after their holiday repast. An autopsy will be performed to determine the cause of death.

An autopsy on the body of Mrs. Harper revealed nearly a quart of liquor in the stomach, the coroner's office reported.

Scouter Proves Fatal.
VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 26.—A scooter brought death to 13-year-old Clayton H. McRay on Christmas. He was riding on the scooter which shot from under him and he fell, striking his head and shoulders. He got up, carried the scooter home and told his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clinton McRay of the accident. They called a physician who found the boy's neck broken. The lad died four hours later.

Fire Friend Figures
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26.—The Christmas celebration at the home of Harry Hall, a laborer, ended in tragedy when the body of his four-year-old son, Edgar, was found in the ashes of the Hall home here today, surrounded by the charred remains of his Christmas toys. Seven persons are in the hospital as the result of the fire—four other children of the Hall family and their grandfather, William Mitchell, Fred Allen, a neighbor and Charles Gerhow, a policeman. The latter three were burned when they attempted to rescue the boy. An overheated stove caused the fire.

Gunmen Trio Slain
NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Three men were shot and killed early today as the climax of a Christmas dance at the Adonis social club, a South Brooklyn resort.

The triple crime was discovered when a policeman found one of the bodies lying in the street. He made his way to the dance hall and found the other men lying amid broken furniture which had apparently been wrecked in a terrible struggle. The hall was deserted.

One of the slain men later was identified as Richard (Pegleg) Lanigan, alleged member of the notorious Lovett gang, known to the police as Doc Mauranders.

William Lovett, former leader of the gang, also known as the "white hand gang," was found mysteriously murdered in November, 1923, in the back room of a tenement near the Brooklyn bridge.

Xmas Skates Bring Death
BELLINGHAM, Wash., Dec. 26.—Henry Braithwaite, 16, a high school student, was killed near his home south of Sumas today when he was struck by an automobile as he was trying out a pair of roller skates which he had received for Christmas.

Cure Kills The Cause.
COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, Dec. 26.—Oil of wintergreen which he drank Christmas eve, apparently to kill the odor of liquor on his breath, caused the death here last night of Elvin Adams, 25, the coroner announced today after an examination.

BEIRUT, Syria, Dec. 26.—Under cover of a violent storm last night bandits attacked the station at El Fijeh, on the railway north of Damascus. They were beaten off by a French armored train and suffered heavy losses. It is confirmed that the rebel tribesmen in recent fighting at Hasbiya southwest of Damascus and at Fort Christophine, lost 70 men killed and 200 wounded.
