W. H. MARCOMBE NEW POLK COUNTY DIST. ATTORNEY

STATE TO BUILD UP PARKS ALONG THE HIGHWAYS

PORTLAND, Dec. 28.—An important item in future state highway budgets will be for the development and maintenance of highway parks.

Since legislation was enacted a few years ago, enabling the state highway commission to acquire on behalf of the state, either by donation or purchase, 18 parks, embracing a total acreage of 630 acres has been acquired.

For the purpose of improving the parks on standard line with local variations, the highway commission some time ago appointed an advisory committee to suggest plans. This committee, which is composed of Professor Peck and Hyacinth of the Oregon Agricultural college, Professor Sweetser of the University of Oregon, and J. A. Curry of Portland, is now making a study of the different parks and will, it is understood, make a report on the subject.

Eight—nearly half of the parks thus far acquired—are located on the Columbia River highway and Old Oregon Trail.

On the Roosevelt highway there are four parks, of which three are in Lincoln county between Newport and Siletz bay. The fourth is the George Henry park in Curry county.

The only park on the Pacific highway is the Booth park on the banks of the South Umpqua north of Myrtle Creek. On the west side branch of the Pacific highway is Heimlich park, at the crossing of the Luckiamute river. The only other park in the Willamette valley is Holman park, between Salem and The Dalles.

The largest of the parks is Mayer park, which was donated by Marcus A. Mayer. It covers 280 acres on the heights above Roseburg on the Upper Columbia River highway.

Next to it in size is the Henry park in Curry county, which embraces an acreage of 242 acres.

In addition to these two large parks are the following, with their acreage:

Sarah Heimlich park, Polk county, 546 acres; Holman park, Polk county, 802 acres; Ditto park, Columbia county, 1.88 acres; Bradley park, (Clatsop Creek), Clatsop county, 29 acres; Viento park, Hood River county, 3.60 acres; Memorial park, Wasco county, 2.64 acres; Emigrant Springs park, Umatilla county, 12.15 acres; Emigrant Hill park, Umatilla county, 20.16 acres; Booth park in Douglas county, 6.80 acres; Chandler park, Lake county, 1.30 acres; Rocky Creek park, Lincoln county, 16.12 acres; Boiler Bay park, Lincoln county, 5.83 acres; Otter Creek park, Lincoln county, 1.51 acres; Lava Cave park, DeWacounty, 6 acres; Trail park, Jefferson county, 4 acres.

SAYS ARTISTIC TEMPERAMENT NOTHING BUT ADVERTISING

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—"Artistic temperament" popularly believed to cause artists to indulge in hair-raising tantrums is nothing but "advertising" in the opinion of Miss Bertha Ott, a prominent woman journalist.

Ott has been the medium whereby artists of voice and instrument have been presented to music lovers of Chicago and from her experiences, she has drawn many interesting viewpoints.

"Some artists are childish, but most of them are sound, level-headed business men and women, devoted to their work," she said. "In our experience there never has been an instance of a singer or instrumentalist refusing to complete a recital or interfering with arrangements because of 'temperament'."

The name's the thing to the general public in its patronage of concerts. Just as Babe Ruth can pack a ball park on an off day, so can a musician with a reputation crowd a house. But unlike the Bambino, who often fans the breeze and disapproves his admirers, the concert artist always delivers the goods.

Appreciation of music is strongest where an influence of foreign race or heredity exists, she said. The better class of immigrant who was taught music in childhood leaves his love for it as a legacy to his American children.

The public schools are stressing music more and more but it may take two generations to bring America to the musical peak of Italy, for instance, where even the street urchins whistle the operas.

"Jazz has not displaced classic music in popularity. On the contrary through syncretism of operatic masterpieces as Paul Whitman does, in such a way that the jazz devotee can understand them and the lover of the classics is not offended, jazz will give 'higher' music a more universal appeal."

Among the future great of the musical world, many of those in production are arranged by Miss Ott, she finds men and women about equal in number, but singers are much in the minority.

This is because it isn't everybody who has a voice," she explains, "but anybody with talent and effort can learn to play an instrument."

PACIFIC COAST ALONE FREE OF WINTRY BLAST

(Continued from Page 1)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—A reaction from the biting cold weather which has been prevalent over almost the entire United States is predicted for tomorrow by the weather bureau.

Today's weather reports disclosed temperatures below freezing as far south as northern Mexico and northern Florida. Both Brownsville, Texas, and Jacksonville, Fla., reported a minimum of 24 degrees and Mobile and Pensacola 18 degrees. A zero temperature was registered at Asheville, N. C., while in New York state it was 29 degrees or slightly higher.

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 28.—Winter laid a heavy hand on sunny Texas yesterday and even took hold of the winter garden section of the Rio Grande. Temperatures ranged from 10 above at Arnullito at the coldest place to 28 at Galveston, the warmest.

Chilrus fruit had been damaged to some extent in the Rio Grande valley, but reports today did not estimate the damage. Brownsville, where the temperature was 26 last night, reported that orchardists are hoping for a week of cloudy weather as gradual moderation without sunshine will lessen the damage.

Moderating in Missouri.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 28.—The sub-zero grip that winter has held on this section since Saturday night was loosened early today and slowly climbing temperatures were forecast for tonight. From a minimum of two below zero yesterday, the mercury climbed to a minimum of two degrees above today and eight degrees above is the minimum predicted for tomorrow morning.

Temperatures Along Rockies.
DENVER, Colo., Dec. 28.—King Winter, who accompanied Santa Claus on his Christmas errand last week, continued to rule with an icy hand in the Rocky Mountain states today.

Miles City, Mont., was hardest hit. The temperature, which was 18 below zero there yesterday, slipped to 20 below.

It was one above in Denver. The cold wave was hardly felt in Arizona and Utah. Phoenix had a low temperature of 54 degrees above, Salt Lake City's lowest was 30 degrees.

Santa Fe, New Mexico, reported record cold weather for the winter—eight degrees above.

West Generally Escapes Freeze
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—The west is suffering from a sort of a synthetic cold snap. That is the way the United States weather bureau sums up the situation.

It is not exactly the real thing in cold spells," Forecaster G. H. Willson said. "We have had such calm, mild, balmy weather that we are inclined to lay undue emphasis on even a slight change in temperature. At few points in the west did thermometers hit the freezing point last night, although it appeared to be very cold generally. Night temperatures in California ranged from 32 to 35, while the day temperatures today were from 26 to 40. It has been much colder at this time of the year.

Mr. Willson noted a few exceptions, however. At Reno, the mercury was depressed to 18 degrees above zero last night, which is cold enough to cause an epidemic of frozen water pipes and coat ponds and small streams with ice. It was only two degrees higher at Winnemucca, while Salt Lake City came through with a reading of 29. At Boise, Idaho, it was 28, indicating that the plateau country was colder than the coast. Generally speaking, however, only a few points experienced exceptional cold.

Florida Fruit Nipped.
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 28.—A. J. Mitchell, United States meteorologist here stated today that temperatures in northern Florida had been low enough to damage fruit and advised that all fruit on trees in this section be picked today.

Mitchell predicted that the freeze which extended last night to Alaska and Lake counties, would reach well into central Florida tonight. Jacksonville had a temperature of 24 and Tallahassee twenty above zero early today.

Normal On Pacific Coast.
SEATTLE, Dec. 28.—Weather today was normal throughout the region west of the Rocky Mountains except in northern California, the United States weather bureau reported here. Over the Puget Sound country, centering here, lay a dense fog.

Temperature indications throughout the Pacific northwest were the following minimums for last night, all being above zero:

Oregon—Baker City 16.
Idaho—Pocatello 21, Boise 25.
Western Montana—Helena 26.
In eastern Washington, that part of the state beyond the Cascade mountains from here, Yakima and Spokane had each 32, and Walla

Walla 24.
The temperature dropped to 37 above zero here last night and had climbed to 40 by mid-morning. This mark, the lowest this month, was equaled December 14. The coldest here since last winter was 33, November 22 and 23.

Baltimore Toll Four.
BALTIMORE, Dec. 28.—Four deaths, one from freezing and three from asphyxiation, was the toll of the cold wave in Baltimore today.

Hadov in New England.
BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 28.—New England was recovering today from the shock of a cold wave that swept in with a northwest gale late Saturday, caused three deaths from cold, brought severe suffering and resulted in innumerable fires in which four children perished.

The lowest officially reported temperature at 8 a. m. today was at Northfield, Vt., which reported 14 degrees below zero yesterday.

BRIDE SKIPS WITH POLICY; HE AVOIDS POISONED DINNER

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26.—A story of how his 18-year-old bride disappeared along with an \$854 life insurance policy, bonds and cash and how poisoned apple dumplings had been left on the table for him to eat, as told by Elbert Cochran, a hotel man, caused Police Judge Jack today to issue a warrant for the arrest of the bride, Mrs. Roselle Smith Cochran, on a charge of larceny. A warrant for his mother in law, Mrs. "Jane Doe" Smith, alias Duell, also was issued.

Cochran related that he met his bride and her mother four months ago. They were in financial difficulty, he said, and he installed them in an apartment. On December 2 he married Roselle. A few days ago he brought a friend home to dinner and they found apple dumplings on the table. The friend refused to eat, but Cochran nibbled at the offering. Later, he said, he experienced pain and lay down on a bed, only to find a note from his wife under the pillow, saying she was through with marriage forever. He investigated and found the insurance policy, bonds and cash gone, he said.

Recently, Cochran said, he made his wife and mother-in-law the beneficiaries of his insurance.

NO-TOBACCO LEAGUE ASKS DAWES FOR A RESOLUTION

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 26.—Vice president Charles G. Dawes was implored today by the No-Tobacco League to make a New Year's resolution to refrain from the use of tobacco.

Charles M. Fillmore of Indianapolis, general secretary of the league, sent the vice president, a telegram thanking him for his message to the senate pages urging them not to use tobacco.

"Realizing that example is more potent than precept," said the message, "will you not make one of your New Year's resolutions the decision not to use tobacco yourself."

Fillmore said that the message will be followed shortly by a similar one to President Coolidge.
