MEDFORD DOCTOR IS INDICTED ON PERJURY CHARGE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 29.—Dr. Charles T. Sweeney, a prominent local physician, in a secret trial returned last Wednesday, was indicted for perjury. The indictment made public today, arises out of testimony given by Dr. Sweeney at the trial of Omar W. Murphy, convicted a month ago of manslaughter for the alleged beating to death of his wife last spring.

It is asserted that Dr. Sweeney testified he was in full attendance at the post mortem examination, when three other witnesses testified he was there but five minutes. A telephone conversation Dr. Sweeney testified he had with Dr. F. G. Swendborg of Ashland, whose wife was a member of the jury, is also involved in the indictment. Dr. Sweeney testified that, when he called Dr. Swendborg to ask him to testify at the trial he did not know that Mrs. Swendborg was a juror. He admitted that the telephone message was sent from the office of Murphy's attorney.

An affidavit made by Dr. Sweeney is also attacked. The physician is at liberty on \$2,000 bond.

BOXING PROMOTER WAS ONE OF FIRST SALMON PACKERS

C. H. Clough, of Roseburg, manager of the Roseburg boxing commission, is in London spending the week end with old friends while sponsoring Charley Dundee, the boxer who is to appear against Ace Boles on the card Christmas afternoon at Dreamland, says the Bamdon World in a recent issue.

Mr. Clough is not a stranger in Bamdon although he has not been here for many years. He furnished the first payroll for this city. It was back in 1879 when he came to Bamdon from Hoquiam River for R. D. Hume to prospect the local river for a fish cannery. His duty was to get all the salmon possible and put them down in salt brine, the purpose being to find out what the river would net. By the end of the season he had salted down 600 barrels here and they were shipped to San Francisco on the old sailing schooner Mose. But the salmon market was down that year so Hume decided not to establish a cannery despite the favorable circumstances.

Mr. Clough later started a cannery on Coos River opposite Marshfield. That was nearly 40 years ago. He has since spent most of his years in the salmon packing industry in Alaska and British Columbia.

LOCAL POSTOFFICE SHOWS INCREASE CHRISTMAS MAIL

The volume of Christmas mail handled by the Roseburg post office during the Christmas season just passed was the heaviest on record, according to Postmaster Heinline. Last year the office handled more mail than at any previous time, and this year the volume was still greater. The cancelling machine during the six days immediately preceding Christmas showed an increase of 19,481 letters and cards over last year. This took into consideration only the ordinary letters and cards and not the odd sized pieces of mail which were cancelled by hand. The receipts of the office for the month of December, up to date, show an increase of 37.7 per cent over last year. The increased volume of business was handled with the same amount of extra help and the same allowance as last year, the postmaster says.

ASHLAND, Dec. 28.—The death of Mrs. E. W. She taught at Springfield and a number of other places, until her marriage, December 24, 1919 to E. W. Redifer, living at Myrtle Creek since that time.

Mrs. Redifer is survived by her husband, E. W. Redifer, little son, Paul, aged five years, and two stepsons, Everett Redifer, Ashland, Ore.; three sisters, Mrs. Fannie Cooper, Ashland; Miss May Benedict, Ashland; Mr. Effie Elliot, Bellingham, Washington, one brother, Clarence G. Benedict of Portland, and her father, G. W. Benedict, Ashland, and a number of other relatives.

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Jai Dastur C. Pavry, young Columbia University student, who speaks the latest American slang and knows all the latest dance steps, today is on his way home east of Suez to succeed his father as spiritual head of India's 1,000,000 fire worshippers.

In correct American garb, he sailed yesterday aboard the Majestic, carefully explaining that the religion of his ancestors is not fire worship at all, but that fire is merely the Zoroastrian symbol of absolute purity.

Although only 26, the future leader of his church is a doctor of philosophy, and is an authority on his religion. He has been studying for the past four years at Columbia, to fit himself to succeed his father.

Known among his classmates as "Jai," the young Indian is described as a regular fellow who is an expert on all the latest dance steps and a popular man on the campus. SCIENTISTS ROW OVER PROBLEM OF ORIGIN OF MAN

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 29.—The problem of the origin of man is engaging the attention of some 500 scientists here today for the dedication of the Peabody Museum at Yale.

One section of the museum has exhibits outlining the theory of evolution. The visiting scientists already have had disagreements at meetings.

Dr. E. P. Goddard of the American Museum of Natural History in New York aroused a mild controversy by his assertion that man may have existed in America prior to the last glacial period, contrary to prevailing scientific belief, which holds that man crossed the Bering Straits from Asia after the last pre-historic ice flood. Dr. Goddard cited the finding of flints found under 26 feet of

AUTHOR LEAVES LEGACY TO STRAY DOGS AND CATS

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 29.—A generous percentage of royalties from the books of Edgar Saltus, novelist, essayist and critic, goes toward the care of dumb and defenseless animals, as was his wish before his death. Mrs. Marie Saltus, the widow, is carrying it out.

Mrs. Saltus, an ardent humane worker, has aided in the founding of homes for the care and protection of animals and in spreading the gospel of humane education in the schools. An initial gift of \$1,000 by Mrs. Saltus made possible the founding of the first Southern California Bide-a-Wee Home for Dogs and Cats at Altadena, Calif., a few miles from Pasadena.

One of the contributors to the enterprise, the activities of which later were merged with the Pasadena Humane Society was the late Mrs. Warren G. Harding, whose husband, the late president, was an admirer of Mr. Saltus' books. Among other leaders in the work was Mrs. Guy Bates Post, known on the stage as Adele Ritchie.

The home, while it operated as a separate unit, provided temporary shelter and food for lost and starving animals and endeavored to locate homes for the refugees. An average of twenty cats and dogs a day were saved from pounds and placed in homes.

Mrs. Saltus and Mrs. Post also aided the San Diego Humane Society in giving a benefit for a similar home for San Diego. To a reader of Mr. Saltus' books his fondness for cats is remarked. A contemporary writer recalls seeing him one wintry day on Broadway, New York, accompanied by several cats, and adds:

"If by any chance you talked to him about a cat and stopped for a moment in your story, he would urge you, 'Go on, please.' It was said of him, he who was too aristocratic ever to go into a store to buy things for himself, would stop at the first butcher shop and purchase a piece of liver if he had just made the acquaintance of a stray cat in the street."

Mr. Saltus' regard for animals, and particularly for cats, is explained by his widow.

"Through a great extent," she said, "it was developed through my influence, as animal rescue work in every form in my life work. Owing to heart trouble, which made it difficult for him to lift any weight, I rescued dogs and Mr. Saltus cats. We made a practice of buying meat and bones for these dumb and defenseless little ones, and animals, with their unerring instinct, loved Mr. Saltus. His last act every night was to take our pet dog Toto for a walk around the square."

Upon the death of Toto, Mr. Saltus asked that its ashes be preserved in order that they might be interred with his own. This was done.

Mrs. Saltus, who has arranged that her estate shall go to the cause at her death, sums up the cause of animal rescue work in this rather plaintive statement:

"The need is so great and there are so few who care."

"From my experience," she added, "I realize that it is the humans who need educating, as much as the animals, saving if the work is to be permanent."
