SUN'S HEAT AS A STAR HAS AFFECTED WEATHER EARTH WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—(A. P.)—By its researches in the last twenty-five years, the Smithsonian Institute has established to its satisfaction that not only is the sun a variable star but the variation in the heat it radiates has a direct influence upon the weather of the earth. It is hoped to make possible by the further development of the science a system for long range forecasting, although this is a field the institution has not entered. Particular interest is attached to the work at the present because for three years the amount of heat given off by the sun has been below normal, a condition believed by some scientists to represent a periodic swing in solar conditions. Two stations are maintained by the institution for observing solar conditions, one in Chile and one in California, while Dr. Charles G. Abbot, the director of the Astrophysical Observatory, is now abroad with funds supplied by the National Geographic Society to select a site for the erection of a third station in Morocco, Baluchistan, or German West Africa. Describing solar radiation and its effect upon weather, as well as the work of Dr. H. H. Clayton, the institution said: "What stands out clearly is this: I. Real pre-visions of weather conditions is shown: It is based on a new element, the solar variation, which, except in Argentina has hitherto never been taken into account among weather services of any of the governments of the world. 2. The accuracy even now attained is sufficient to make Dr. Clayton's forecasts of the weather of next week, or next month, decidedly better in the long run than a mere guess."
