### ADMIRAL HARBER DEAD

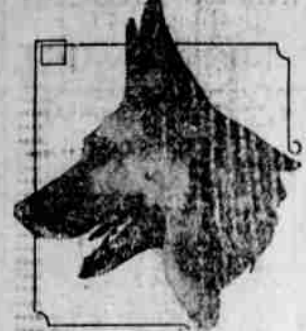

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Dec. 30.—Rear Admiral Gillo Bates Harber, 76, retired, died here last night of inflammation of the bladder.

Admiral Harber, who was born here, was graduated from the naval academy in 1869.  
In 1882-84 he commanded the relief ship sent out to hunt for survivors of the Jeannette polar expedition. He found the polar ship with all the crew dead and brought back the bodies of two.

In 1887, Admiral Harber was promoted five numbers for "eminent and conspicuous conduct in battle."

### FLOODS HOURLY ADDING TO BIG LOSS IN EUROPE

(Continued from Page 1.)

from Transylvania are arriving. They describe the loss of life in the valley of the Szamos river as extremely heavy. Bodies, intermingled with debris, are floating through the town of Torda.

A long stretch of the Paris-Constantinople railroad track has been washed out between Arad and Tokva.

**Glasgow Gets Thrill.**  
LONDON, Dec. 30.—Rapid melting of snow and continued heavy rains are causing serious floods in many parts of Great Britain. Vast tracts of land are submerged. The rivers Wye and Monnow in Derby are rapidly rising. The Avon is seven feet out of its banks. Much farm land along the Dee, Severn and the Clyde is inundated.

Glasgow experienced an unusual high tide yesterday. The water rose to within a foot of the top of the quay walls, giving the ships the appearance of resting at street level. All shipping was suspended as a precautionary measure.

**Bus Blown Into River.**  
AMSTERDAM, Holland, Dec. 30.—A terrific gale and torrential rain over most of Holland have caused serious damage. Most of the rivers have overflowed their banks. At Tholen, an island in the River Scheldt, a motor bus was blown into the river, six occupants being drowned.

**317 Farms Wrecked.**  
BUDAPEST, Hungary, Dec. 30.—The flood damage in the Bekes district of Hungary is increasing, with 175,000 acres of winter crop land under water and 317 well stocked farms totally wrecked.

Artillery is being used to break up the masses of ice retaining the flood waters.

Declaring that national prosperity is dependent on agricultural prosperity, Senator Capper asserted that the public opinion everywhere should support the farmer in his economic difficulty. He pointed to the general depression in 1920 as indicative of the disastrous national effect when the farmers' buying power slumped.

**Opposes Export Bill.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—Charging President Coolidge had "taken to the tall timber," in his agricultural policy, Representative Asa Carter, Louisiana, the ranking Democratic member of the house agriculture committee, declared today he would fight any administration farm bill along the terms of the McNary-Haugen farm export corporation measure.

"It is inconceivable to me," he said, "that President Coolidge after his bold statement in advocacy of sound legislation, sound economically and based upon sound governmental principles—could now as a result of the threats from certain interests to attack the protective tariff law, take to the tall timber and advocate any legislation creating an export corporation upon the communistic principles of the McNary-Haugen bill."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—The extent to which machinery continues to supplant the horse on American farms, was revealed today in census bureau figures showing that the number of horses on farms decreased 16 per cent during the last five years, or from 19,767,161 in 1920 to 16,535,759 in 1925.

The number of mules, however, increased more than five per cent, or from 5,442,391 to 5,740,608.

### SENATOR McNARY ASKS COOLIDGE TO APPOINT DANA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—President Coolidge was urged today by Senator McNary, Oregon, and Shortridge, California, Republicans, to continue representation of those two states on the shipping board. Both declared later that they were encouraged, but the indication was given that the President had reached no conclusion as to whom he would nominate to succeed B. E. Haney, Democrat of Oregon, and Meyer Lisener, Republican of California, as commissioners.

McNary particularly urged the appointment of Marshall N. Dana, Democrat, a Portland newspaper man, as successor to Haney, who has been in disagreement with the president on the marine policy and will not be continued in office. In the event Coolidge desires to name a Republican from the northwest states, McNary urged the selection of Frank L. Shull of Portland.

As a successor to Lisener, Shortridge supported Phillip Teller, Republican of San Francisco. He also proposed H. U. Brandenstein of San Francisco if a Democrat is to be named from that section.

President Coolidge intends to fill the two vacancies by the selection of both a Republican and a Democrat, but it was indicated he had not determined which portion of the Pacific Coast should furnish each.

Selection of two Pacific coast members to the shipping board is further complicated by the advocacy of Senator Jones of Washington, chairman of the senate commerce committee, of H. Y. Saito of Seattle to one of the posts. Saito is holding a position with the board here.

### OFFICERS BADLY HURT WHEN HUGE STILL EXPLODES

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 30.—Sheriff Henry McKinney and two deputies, Frank Littlefield of Baker and Arthur Romageaux of Huntington, were seriously injured in the explosion of a still they were ridding in the hills near Snake river, six miles below Huntington, late last night. Romageaux is in a Baker hospital today and McKinney and Littlefield are confined in their homes here. All are expected to recover.

The officers raided the Will Baird farm late Tuesday, finding what they declared to be the biggest still ever taken in Baker county, with twelve 50-gallon barrels of mash. No one was found at the still, which was in a dugout on the hillside. Wishing to destroy the outfit the officers saturated it with coal oil. Littlefield then lit a match.

A terrific explosion threw all three men several yards and knocked Sheriff McKinney unconscious for a moment. When he recovered his senses his clothing was on fire and his head was burned. He staggered to his feet, fell, rose again and put out the fire in his clothing. The other two staggered to their feet, badly burned.

Will Baird, owner of the property on which the still was located, was arrested in Huntington and brought to the county jail here. He denies any knowledge of the still.

The three officers are all burned about the head and face. McKinney and Littlefield lost all their hair. Their hands are severely burned.

The men were standing several feet from the dugout at the time of the explosion. Two other men with the officers were further away and not injured.
