Two years ago, but still leaving farmers with much accumulated debt and lacking stability because of unsolved market problems.

**Business Outlook Brighter.**

CHICAGO, Dec. 31.—Financial, industrial and agricultural leaders hail 1926 as promising to lead the nation much farther away from the bugaboo of post war depression.

Their views, representatives of wholesale and retail dry goods, the railroads, the farmers, labor and banking, both in agricultural and livestock regions and in industrial districts agree that the new year will marshal in an era of better times.

This outlook comes on the heels of a record breaking Christmas buying season, which closed a "most successful" year during which many business records were broken.

A rising standard of living will see an upward trend in wages and commodity prices, business executives believe.

**Agriculture Needs Aid.**

The farmer is on the threshold of prosperous days, manufacturers will increase production and need all of the available labor, the railroads will be busy with heavy traffic, and the year will be one of large but conservative profits, is the consensus.

Farmer money will tend to a moderate slackening of stock and bond activity and speculation in real estate and other fields, it is felt. The prediction is for ample credit at satisfactory rates.

The peak of this period of prosperity will be reached during 1926, says Colonel Leonard P. Ayers of the Cleveland Trust company, a nationally known institution. In the earlier months of the year the course of general business promises to be ascending to that peak and during the latter months of the year descending from it.

The farmer's condition, is, on the whole, the most favorable since 1920, says Samuel H. Thompson, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, "but much remains to be done to put agriculture on a prosperous basis."

"With business strong but conservative, in balanced proportion, the year ahead of us should be one of genuine, widespread prosperity for all classes throughout all parts of the country," is the inspiring forecast voiced by James Simpson, president of Marshall Field and company.

NEW HAVEN Conn., Dec. 31.—Dr. L. C. Strong of the Bussey Institute, Harvard, told the American Society of Zoologists, during its cancer symposium here, that twin sisters 21 years old had been found who had developed cancer of the left breast each of the same microscopic structure at almost the same time.

Dr. Strong cited this to prove his contention that the cancer is hereditary and cannot be developed by persons born without a cancerous strain.

**WHERE QUALITY MEETS CONFIDENCE**

**ICE JAMS ADD TO FLOOD HORROR IN CENTRAL EUROPE**

Artillery Is Used to Clear Rivers as Thousands of Persons Are Forced From Lowlands.

**PARIS, Dec. 31.**—The floods in central Europe continue to spread notably in eastern Hungary. There the river Theiss is 25 feet above normal level at Tokaj, famous for its wines. The devastation by the waters is being added to by ice jams forming at bridges. These great masses of ice are being demolished by artillery shell fire, but with some damage to the bridges; thousands upon thousands of persons driven from their homes are flocking to cities which are above flood level.

While the situation in France thus far is merely threatening, the rivers, notwithstanding official optimism, continue to rise at a fast rate in the east, west and north. It is now admitted that the peak of the flood will not be reached before Sunday.

The flood situation has been complicated by a recurrence of last week's hurricane, which has put the half restored telegraph system out of commission again.

The Eiffel Tower wireless aerial again was carried away by the wind and in consequence of this the actual state of affairs in the provinces is not fully known.

**Taxes Suspend.**

VIENNA, Austria, Dec. 31.—A dispatch from Oedenburg, in Burgenland, West Hungary says the dam at Kleinraab, on the Raab river, burst last night, menacing 30 villages.

An unconfirmed report states that 36 miners were drowned when the salt mines at Maros-Ujvary were flooded.

The dispatch adds that the flood damage in Hungary is so great that the finance minister has suspended taxes in the afflicted districts.

**Havoc in England.**

LONDON, Dec. 31.—Great Britain was struck by another westerly gale last night bringing heavy rainstorms, which further raised the waters of the already swollen rivers. In London two men were killed and eight injured when a chimney crashed into the dormitory of a Stepney workshop. More than 100 telegraph and telephone lines were down in the country. A mail train crashed into fallen trees at Berwyn, Wales, but only the locomotive was damaged.

**RUSSIAN SCIENTIST CLAIMS SEX EXISTING IN STONES**

LENINGRAD, Dec. 31.—Sex exists in stones, it is claimed by Prof. Peter Mantuloff, of the Russian Physico-Therapeutic Academy.

Prof. Mantuloff is confident of proving the existence of one harmonious division of the male and female gender in the entire creation of the world, from human beings down to minerals. In the course of an address before the Academy of Scientists, Prof. Mantuloff said:

"In my experiments to prove the existence of sex in minerals my attention was arrested by the fact that the same mineral, perfectly identical in its chemical nature, is of two crystalline forms, in one case cubic form and in the other of octahedron form. To discern the exact sex I have subjected to a certain reaction the blood of human beings and animals, as well as extracts from plants. I have subjected to a similar reaction various crystalline forms, taking pyrite as a typical mineral.

"The pyrite crystallized into cubic form produced a discoloration of the composition into which it was dropped, namely a typical male reaction. The same mineral crystallized into an octahedron form, discolored the substance into which it was dropped, giving a typical female reaction. I have repeated this experiment with eleven different minerals, obtaining the same results."
