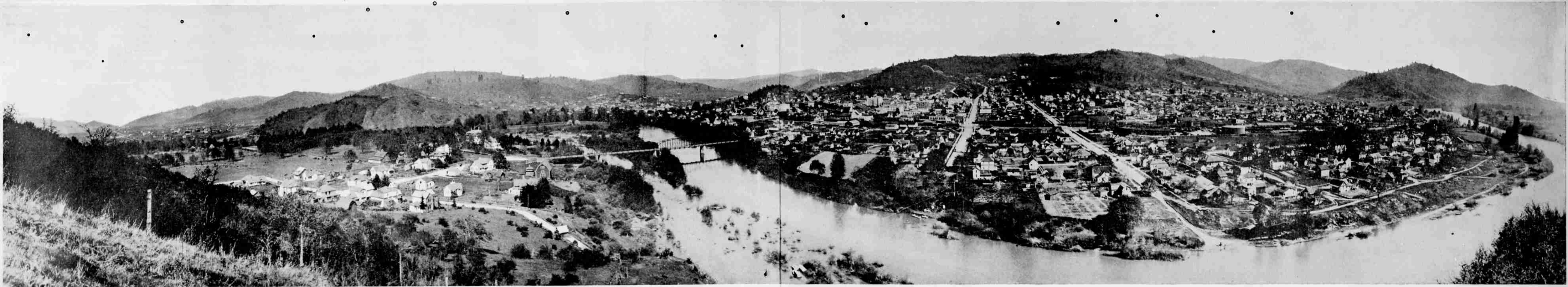
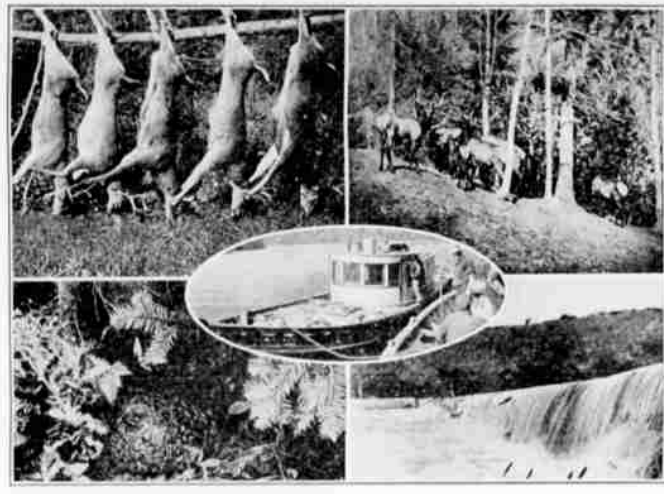
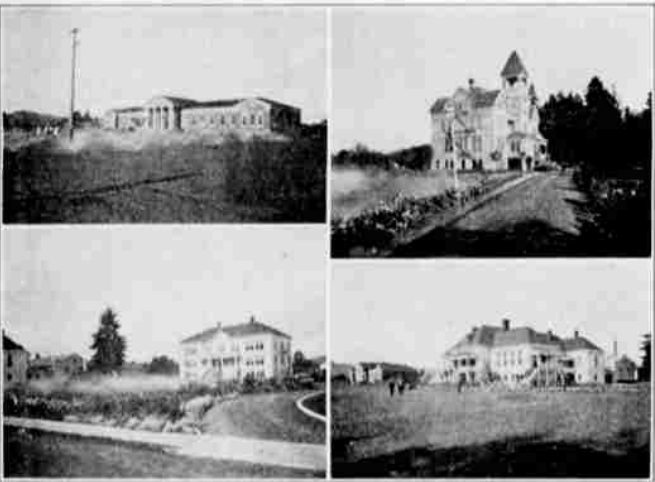


Panorama View of Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, The Queen City of The Umpqua Valley, With a Population of 6,500 Contented People

THE OREGON STATE SOLDIERS HOME is located in Roseburg. It was created by an act of the legislature enacted in 1892. It is beautifully located on the South Fork of the famous Umpqua River. A large portion of the acreage is under cultivation and furnishes the Home with a great variety of garden products. The hospital is a modern building of beautiful architecture and has a capacity of fifty beds. The monthly payroll averages \$1611.44.



Hunting and Fishing Fine

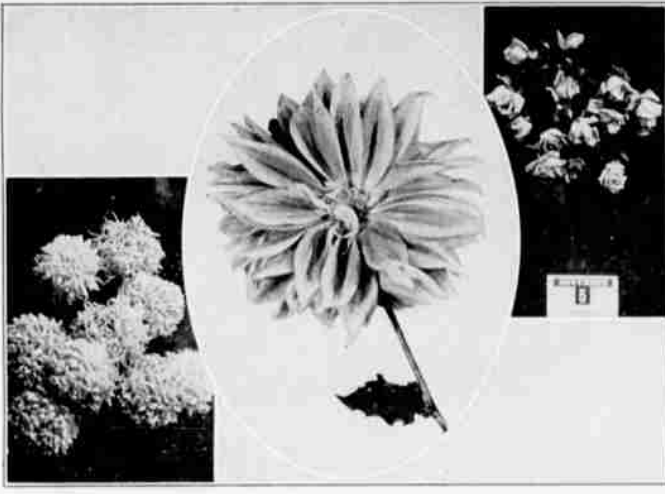
DOUGLAS COUNTY has a coastwide reputation for good fishing and deer hunting. The major portion of trout inhabiting the waters of Douglas County are the Cutthroat or black-spotted Rainbow and there are no streams in the state where better fishing is found than in portions of the Umpqua and its tributaries. Deer hunting, the prouder sport of North America, can be indulged in here without stint. There is not in all probability, a half dozen sections in the entire county where deer do not exist.

Partial View of the Famous Dillard Valley on the South Umpqua River

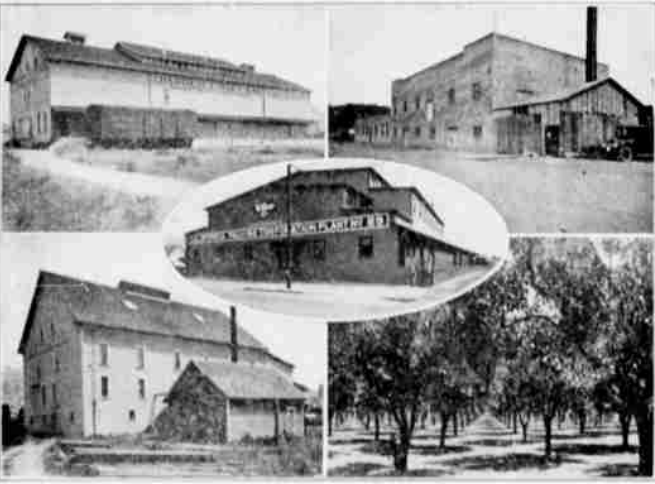
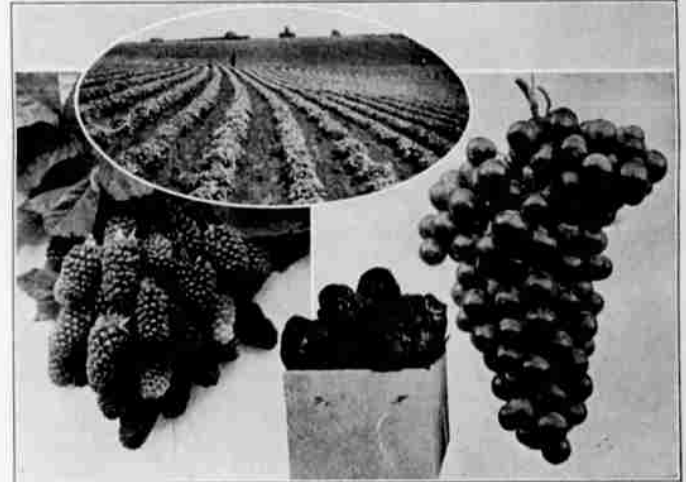


Flowers Grow in Profusion

THE UMPQUA VALLEY is so situated that it is protected from severe cold winds and zero weather. The home rose gardens present a most striking appearance to the visitor from the middle west, where snow, ice and sleet is their portion during the winter months. Roses grow to perfection here and it is possible to have some blossoms the entire year. Roseburg roses are the first of the season. Dahlias, sinias, chrysanthemums and all other favorite flowers and bulbs grow to profusion in this county.

Real Country for Small Fruit

STRAWBERRIES, big red, luscious, juicy ones grow in the Umpqua Valley. This county produces the earliest berries in the Pacific Northwest and high prices for the yield result. Grapes, tomatoes and other small fruits also reach a high priced market ten days ahead of competing districts. Raspberries, blackberries, and boswells grow to good advantage here and many of our people make a splendid profit each year from these three bramble fruits.

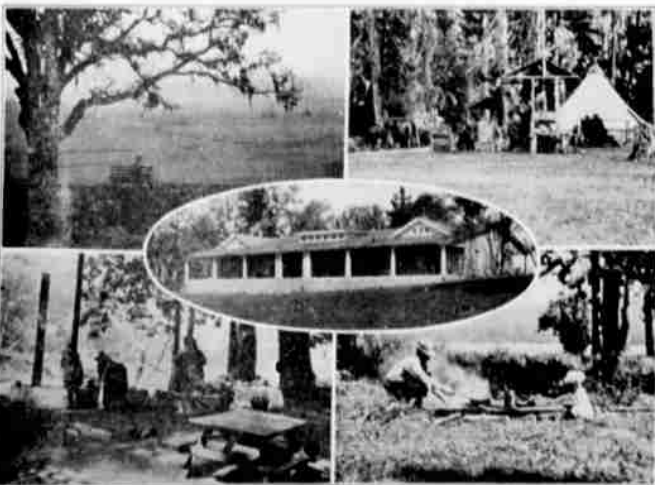

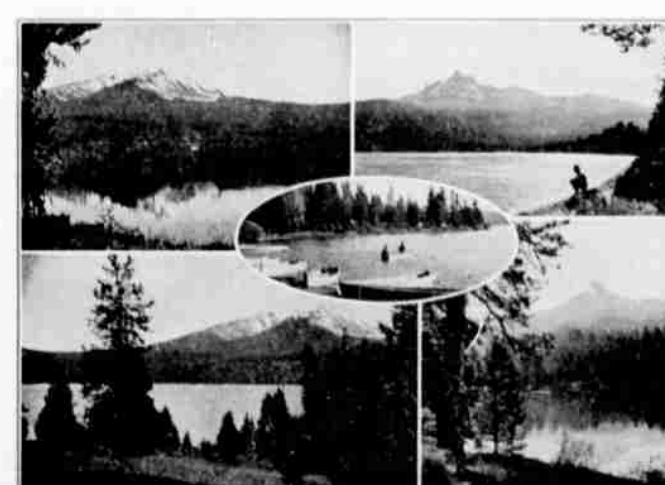

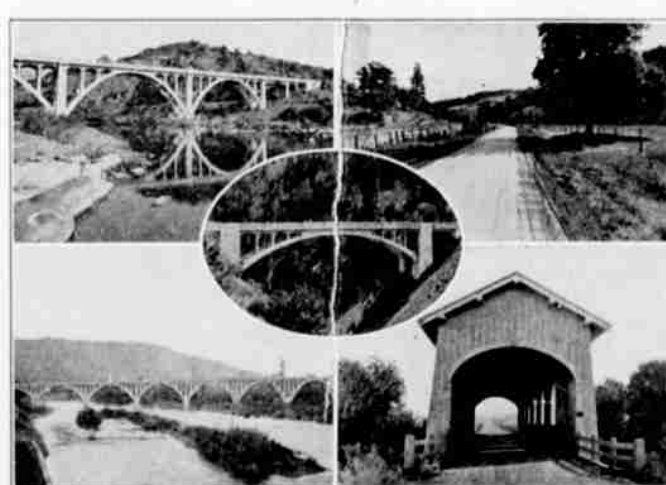
