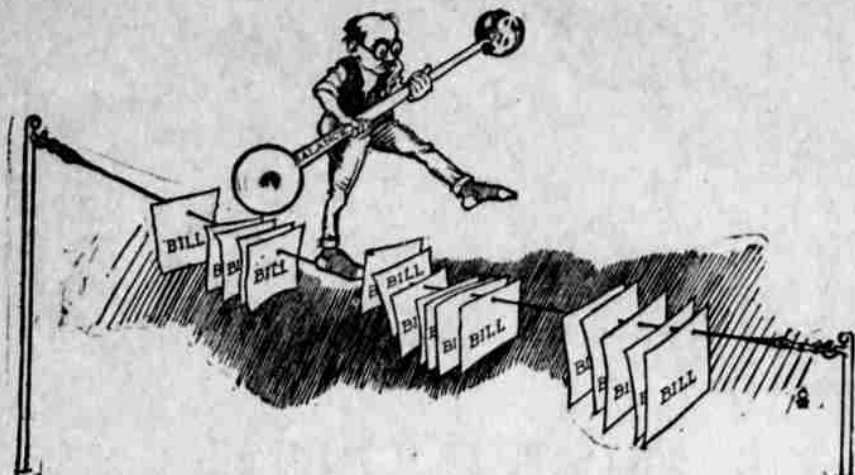

of these actually caused any damage.

Such tender blooming plants as nasturtiums, which usually are killed by the first light frosts, are still blooming out of doors in many parts of the city. Rose bushes are bearing blossoms in nearly every yard. Scores of varieties of garden flowers are in bloom and the Christmas table in hundreds of Roseburg homes was trimmed with flowers taken from the yard. A reader of The News-Review, only a few days ago, brought to the office a twig from a raspberry bush bearing a number of ripe raspberries, the second crop the bush has borne this year.

If this condition continues for a few more weeks Douglas county is going to harvest a vegetable and fruit crop such as has never been known before, predicts County Agent R. W. Cooney.

Broccoli growers have set out more than 4500 acres. If no bad weather is encountered between the first of the year and the middle of February there will be between 1500 and 2000 carloads of broccoli for shipment out of the Umpqua Valley. This will be, at a low market figure, worth more than a million dollars and will have a wonderful effect on the financial condition of the community.

Prune growers likewise have visions of a bounteous yield. For the past two years Douglas county has experienced short periods of unusually low temperature. There are several hundred acres of young prune orchards which have been materially affected by this cold. Some of these orchards, seven or eight years old, have borne no fruit, but have been putting out a vigorous wood growth. This year the prune orchards are in excellent condition. There has been ample moisture, unusual warmth and everything necessary for the formation of fruit. If clear weather can be had during the pollination period the county

agent predicts that the yield will run more than 16,000,000 pounds—nearly one-third more than has ever been produced before. The young orchards which for two years have been ready to come into bearing, but which have been held back by the cold, will be ready to deliver a heavy crop, while old orchards will set new records for quantity, the county agent says.

The continuation of the good weather for a few more weeks will mean a bounteous harvest of all fruit and grain crops, as well as the garden crops for which the county is noted.

The year of 1925 has been a record breaker for weather, and it is hoped that the conditions of the past 12 months will prevail for a short time more, bringing unprecedented prosperity to the county.

FLOODS IN FRANCE AND BELGIUM ARE WREAKING HAVOC

PARIS, Dec. 31.—Although all the rivers and streams in France are over their banks, there is confidence everywhere that the situation is well enough in hand to prevent serious disaster. Two places suffering most are Rheims, where some streets are under three feet of water and the assistance of engineers from Arras has been asked, and Caen, where the Orne river has done much damage.

At Caen many persons are being rescued from half submerged homes in canoes. Much damage has been done in Quimper.

The plains about Verdun are a vast lake, due to the overflowing of the Meuse, which at Maunogue the low quarters are inundated and many factories suspended operations. Three feet of water is reported in many houses in Brest.

Belgium's Worst in 49 Years. BRUSSELS, Dec. 31.—The worst floods since 1876 are causing much damage throughout Belgium. The vaults of several banks at Charleroi have been submerged. In a funeral at Marchienne the cortege had to proceed to the cemetery in boats.

The city hospital at Namur was evacuated, and hundreds of families have abandoned their homes because of rising water. Flooded tracks have held up many trains.

U. S. EXPORTS FOR MONTHS OF 1925 GREATEST

Total Exports 12 Per Cent Higher Than Same Time Last Year.

COTTON SETS RECORD

Automobiles and Manufactured Articles Reach High Levels in Export for Year.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—Exports of the United States for the first nine months of this year were greater than those of any full year before 1916, according to a report on American foreign trade for the first three quarters of 1925 made public today by the Foreign Commerce Department of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The report points out that "total exports for the first nine months of 1925 amounted to three and one-half billion dollars, which averages 389 million dollars monthly. This is twelve per cent greater than a year ago."

"When the figures for the best months of the year—October, November and December—became available, the value of our exports for 1925 will be close to five billion dollars—a figure reached only in the war and postwar years 1916 to 1920. Since 1920 the general trend of exports has been upward, with the tendency since December, 1923, more sharply upward than theretofore."

"In 1925 there was the normal seasonal slowing up, which lasted from May through July, when the usual late summer and fall activity began with the exportation of cotton and other agricultural products.

"High levels, which in some cases constituted new records, were reached in both quantity and value by some of our leading exports. Shipments of raw cotton for the January-September period of 1925 totaled more than two and one-half billion pounds, nearing the high figure of 1912, the year of our second greatest crop. In value our cotton exports were exceeded only by the high-priced cotton for 1919 and 1920, when raw cotton topped 40 cents. In the light of the high cotton production figures for the crop now being ginned, the prospects for cotton exports for the last quarter promise to bring the year's total up to heights well above a billion dollars."

"Records were made in automobile exports, with shipments of 218,471 cars and chassis, valued at \$162,690,000 figures never equalled in volume or value. Wherever the American automobile goes, there we find American gasoline. Exports of gasoline, naphtha, and other light products also exceeded those of all previous nine-month periods, with total shipments of 937,000,000 gallons, valued at \$147,000,000."

"Exports of refined copper for the first three-quarters of 1925 amounted to 789,000,000 pounds, only about 200 tons smaller than the record shipments in 1917. The value, \$114,000,000, was exceeded

only by the war values of 1916-1918.

"Nearly every important group of exports showed increased values over last year's figures. Meat exports increased 2.4%; grains, 35%; raw textile fibers, 20%; manufactured textiles, 18%; paper, 5%; coal, coke and petroleum, 3%; copper, lead and zinc, 24%; machinery 19%; vehicles, 41%; and chemicals 9.6%; miscellaneous vegetable products (tobacco, rubber and naval stores) were off 7.4%; lumber was off only 1%; and iron and steel were off 2.6%."

"The increased value of exports was due in large measure to higher prices on many products, notably grain, pork products, gasoline and metals."

"Exports of raw cotton increased 20% in value and 43% in quantity; automobiles increased 66% in value and 62% in quantity; gasoline, naphtha and other light products increased 13% in value and 4% in quantity; wheat increased 35% in value, but declined 2% in quantity; refined copper increased 13% in value and 7% in quantity. Lard exports were 4% lower in value and 30% off in quantity; leaf tobacco declined 20% in value and 25% in quantity; coal and coke declined 1% in value, but increased in quantity six-tenths of 1%; lubricating oil increased 2% in value and 5% in quantity; wheat flour increased 11% in value, but declined 26% in quantity. Exports of rye increased 69% in value, and 25% in quantity; oil cake and oil cake meal increased 65% in value and 59% in quantity; barley increased 121% in value and 147% in quantity; brass and bronze increased 79% in value and 117% in quantity; automobile engines increased 387% in value and 642% in quantity; lead pigs and bars increased 94% in value and 56% in quantity; oats increased 2,776% in value and 3,154% in quantity.

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
