Roseburg's Public Library Fulfills a Big Public Need

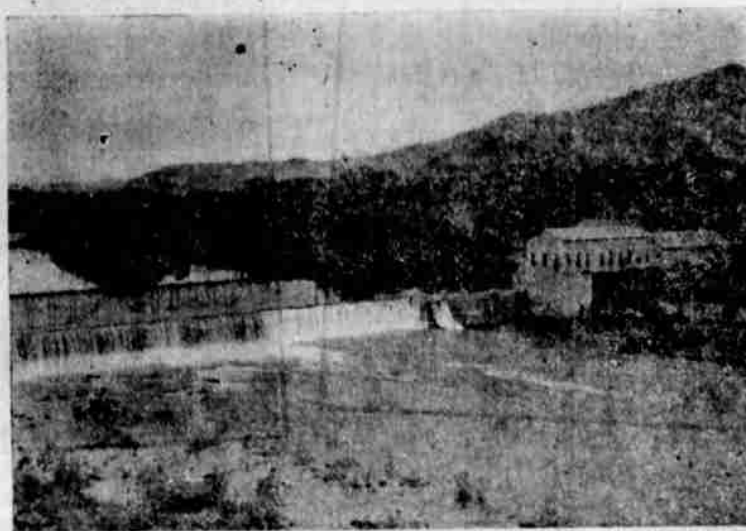
Roseburg's public library is established in a converted residence occupying a portion of a half block of ground near the business center of the city. It has a spacious and well appointed interior and its shelves contain upwards of 4,000 books, embracing a wide range of subjects for general instruction and the better class of popular fiction. Daily newspapers and forty of the leading magazines are also at the convenience of the numerous patrons who assemble regularly in the comfortable reading rooms.

The borrowers registered at the library total approximately 3,500, a number slightly greater than one-half the population of the city. The monthly circulation is about 2,500, exclusive of an average of 50 books received from the state library at Salem on special requests.

Established June 1, 1921, in original quarters that soon proved inadequate for the rapid increase in patronage, the library was moved December 1, 1924, to the present location, which the city purchased at a cost of \$12,000. The building is an enlargement of the original home of the late William B. Willis, a pioneer jurist of Roseburg, and at one time mayor of the city. His widow, who still makes her home in the mansion, is a pioneer school teacher of Roseburg, a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and one of the city's two members of the American Tree Association. She is one of the city's recognized experts in landscape work and despite her advanced years finds her greatest pleasure in personally attending to the upkeep of the trees, shrubbery and flowers that embellish the grounds.

The building bears the distinction of having had as guests in the '70's a party that included President Rutherford B. Hayes and General William T. Sherman, of Civil War fame. It forms an interesting link of connection between the past and the present. When the original unit was built for the Willis residence 53 years ago, pastures, truck gardens and corn fields stretched away from the premises, which today are completely surrounded by modern business structures of concrete and brick.

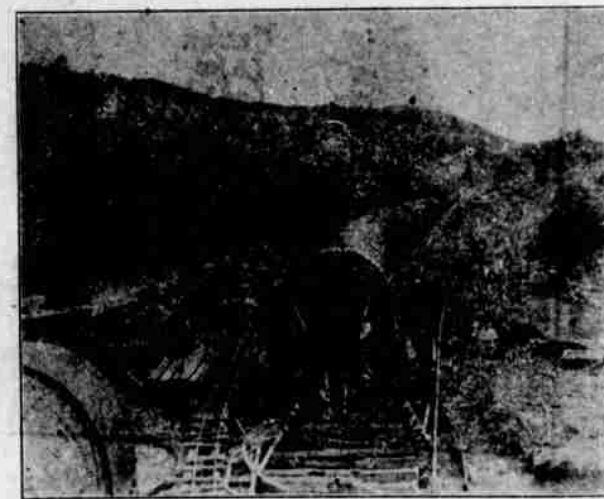

pacity of almost one hundred thousand horsepower. These plants are

all interconnected by means of a network of transmission, and distribution lines, thus automatically providing standby service to the entire area served in the event of an emergency. The dependability of Copco service is well known to the

residents of southern Oregon.

Outdoor Life Enjoyable in Douglas County

Hunting and fishing is a recreation enjoyed by every one. Douglas county has a coast-wide reputation for good fishing and deer hunting. The major portion of trout in-

habiting the water of Douglas county are the cutthroat or black-spotted rainbow, and there are no streams in the state where better fishing is found than in portions of the Umpqua and tributaries. These same streams in season provide steelhead, silverside and Chinook salmon fishing unsurpassed in any streams.

The advocate of the rod and reel as the sportsman's ideal of outdoor pastime could dwell indefinitely on the angling possibilities of Douglas county, but a few words must be said for the premier sport of North America—deer hunting. There is not in all probability, a half dozen sections in the entire county where deer do not exist.

The accessibility of hunting and fishing can be no more ably set forth than by stating that Douglas county has more than 2500 miles of public roads radiating from the populous centers to the more remote sections of the county, making it possible to travel by motor to points within a few hours of the most desirable fishing and hunting territory in the state of Oregon.

To the sportsman who desires to partake of the pleasures derived from a few weeks' contact with nature, no more ideal spot can be selected and no sportsman need return empty-handed or dissatisfied after a vacation spent here.
