

CONGRESS WITH PRESIDENT ON ARMS MEETING

Will Appropriate Money to Send Over Delegation, Madden Predicts.

EAGER TO AID EUROPE

Secretary Jardine Is Facing Task of Reconciling Farm Bloc With Coolidge View.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Chairman Madden of the House Appropriations committee today predicted that congress would make the appropriation necessary to send an American delegation to the League of Nations preliminary conference on disarmament.

In an article in the Army and Navy Journal he declared such a step would not mean that the United States "was injecting itself into the affairs of the old world." He defended the course of congress in appropriating for the army and navy, declaring the present armament was sufficient and that the army is "up to the 5-3 standard," held down by the Washington conference.

"The President's attitude unquestionably will meet with the hearty approval of congress, which upon his recommendation, will make the necessary appropriation for the delegation to represent our country," said the article. "For the entire government, moved by the economic condition of Europe, is animated by a keen desire to promote its improvement."

"Of course, our army has been reduced to the point where it is simply a police force. ... Should the disarmament conference lead to further reductions, of course, we must take account of the savings in future appropriation measures. But I see no reason why any question should be raised as to the strength of the army."

Surplus Crop Parley. While Secretary Jardine is consulting with the editors of farm papers next week on crop surplus legislation, both the senate and house agriculture committees will be approaching the same subject.

The house committee will hold its first meeting on January 11 and the senate committee will assemble January 12. These are the dates on which Secretary Jardine has invited farm editors to meet with him and some of the visitors may be asked to appear before one or both of the committees.

Vigorous efforts will be made to bring the views of the Coolidge administration and those of the western members of congress into agreement. The farm blocs of both senate and house are preparing, however, to examine the whole situation before they decide whether to accept the form of farm relief worked out by the agriculture department and the White House.

PASADENA ROSE FETE IS TURNED INTO TRAGEDY

college game yesterday. Pasadena, Cal., Jan. 2.—Chief of Police Charles H. Kelley declared today that his officers had made reports to him prior to New Year's day of the flimsy construction of grandstands along the route of the Tournament of Roses parade held yesterday, one of which collapsed, resulting in two deaths and more than two hundred injuries.

Chief Kelley said that when informed by his officers that many of the stands had been built of old dry lumber and put together with nails which were considered too small, he reported the conditions to Building Inspector A. C. Shaver. The building inspector asserted that prior to the receipt of Chief Kelley's verbal report, one of his assistants had tested the stand which later collapsed, and had reported it as safe.

As an aftermath of yesterday's accident, Chief Kelley announced that all grandstands which had been built for spectators of yesterday's festival would be reinforced before permission was given to tear them down. This will be done, he explained, to determine the quality of their construction so as to prevent a recurrence of the New Year's crash and to help in fixing responsibility for the crash.

GEN. HART CLOSE BEHIND ACCUSER IN FINAL SLEEP

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Major General William H. Hart, quartermaster general of the army, died early today at Walter Reed hospital, aged 62.

General Hart was appointed quartermaster general in August 1922, on the retirement of Major General Harry L. Rogers. General Rogers died in Philadelphia but a short time ago, after having preferred charges against General Hart alleging improper methods of procuring his appointment. The charges were found at the war department not to warrant any proceedings.

GREG GIVES FLOWERS CHANCE AT HIS TITLE

RICH INDIANS ARE QUARRY OF ALLEGED OKLA. MURDER RING

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 2.—The Oklahoma City Times says today that wholesale arrests are expected within the next 24 hours in connection with the long investigation of a series of deaths of wealthy Indians in the Osage country.

Plans contemplate the submission of a conspiracy testimony before a federal grand jury scheduled to meet in Guthrie Monday and prior to that time, the Times says. A number of men, some prominent business men and former officials, are slated to be taken into custody. The Times asserts that two men held in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, have confessed to participation in the murders and give state and national authorities a lead to follow in solving the puzzle of a score of mysterious deaths, now more than two years old. One of the men is said to have made a detailed statement of his part in the blowing up of the home of W. E. Smith at Fairfax May 21, 1922, and to have told the officers important facts regarding the disposition of the bodies of several wealthy Osages who are declared to have died in consequence of the operations of a sinister "murder ring" that sought their riches. It is said that the stake for which the ring was playing approximated \$2,000,000.

Smith died in the destruction of his home with his wife, sister of Anna Brown, wealthy Osage woman, who previously met death under mysterious circumstances. A servant girl in the home also lost her life.

U. S. GRAIN CROP 1925 FALLS BELOW 1924 VALUE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—The gross value of grain crops in the United States last year was placed by the Department of Agriculture today at \$3,810,713,000 of \$708,000,000 less than in 1924. Despite larger yields, the money value descended because of lower prices. The largest deficit was in corn, the gross value of which was estimated at \$1,954,326,000 as compared with \$2,270,544,000 in 1924.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—Practically all live poultry and country dressed meat was cleaned up with only a small amount of dressed stuff available on the local market today.

The demand for poultry remained firm right up to the last minute with heavy live hens, readily bringing 26 and 27 cents. Light hens were strong at the 20 cent level. Heavy spring brought 24 to 25 cents with all light springs moving at 27 to 28 cents. Dressed turkeys closed at the 48 cent top for No. 1, birds.

Country dressed veal receipts were limited to a half dozen pieces by express. Top calves were firm with the limited offerings bringing 165 cents. Choice light hogs were also in demand with nothing in. The closing price was 17 cents for choice light pork.

Cold weather has materially aided the local egg market and the meager receipts readily moved into consumption. On the dairy exchange fresh stocks closed as follows:

Standard extra 36c; standard firsts 34c; mediums 30c and undersized 28c. Current receipts were posted at 30c net.

The local butter market remains steady and unchanged. Butterfat bids held steady at 47 cents f. o. b. shippers' track and 44 cents delivered, valley No. 1, 11.10. Mohair, best combed 75¢@80¢; best carding 65¢@70¢.

NEWSPAPERS OF PRESENT DAY GET SEVERE SCORING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Newspapers are becoming prosperous but unless as watch dogs for the public, in the opinion of Don C. Seitz, formerly of the New York World.

The "self constituted gallies in grogery and there are cracks in its pedestal," he says in the current Outlook, of which he has become a director and associate editor.

"One of the many discoveries that came with wartime inflation was that profit-making could be made the rule and not the exception in journalism."

The discovery was first made in London by Lord Harmsworth, he says, and papers there already have lost their public usefulness. The object of a modern newspaper, he asserts, is to weaken editorial policy in order to avoid offending any groups of readers.

"The buying power of the mass has become the fetish of the advertiser," he explains. "Few papers are owned by their editors. Their work is done by hired men, some of whom are paid nearly as well as the union compositors, though working under a less certain tenure of employment, and a more shifting scale," he wrote.

The syndicate system, Mr. Seitz said, is crushing individuality as a result of its outflow of "canned goods."

Mr. Seitz also criticized the haste with which news is rushed into print, saying it was responsible for bad writing and misinformation.

Marked improvement in conditions on the Umpqua bar, are noted with the arrival here Sunday of the Steamer Winchester, carrying 320 tons of miscellaneous cargo, says the Port Umpqua Courier. The soundings at the bar during the crossing showed 17 feet, according to Jos. Butler, pilot, who brought in the Winchester.

The soundings show increased depth by scouring, of about seven feet. The channel now is along side the jetty, where it should be. Cement and steel rails and oil products were the main varieties of the cargo.

Caviar and lumber were to form the outgoing cargo. The steamer Winchester has been running between Coos Bay and San Francisco since bar conditions made it impossible to cross into the Umpqua.

Since the Sunday showing at the bar, it is believed that as the Sunday tide was comparatively small, greater improvement will be shown on the bar during the next few months.
