



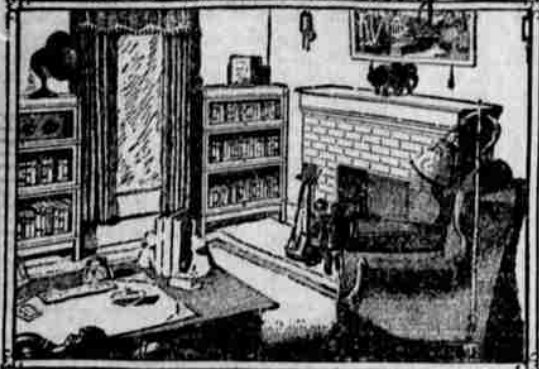

a protracted New Year's party during which she received a broken nose. The intoxicated she had consumed might save her life, physicians said, as alcohol is the most effective antidote for the poison she drank.

The prompt action of her 15-year-old son, Russell Thaw, in administering an antidote of milk and rushing his mother to the hospital have the physicians a chance to fight the poison.

Young Thaw said he knew no reason why his mother should try to kill herself. He had talked to her Monday afternoon and she seemed in a happy frame of mind. He knew nothing of her financial or social affairs, he said, and she had no worries as far as he knew.

Hectic Domestic Career. For 29 years Evelyn has been almost as much in the public eye as her former husband, Harry K. Thaw. Her marriage to Thaw in Pittsburgh in April, 1905, followed a three-year courtship during which the gay actions of the couple frequently got them in print.

She was then about 20. But it was 14 months later that she became the center of the world wide notoriety when Thaw shot White on the old Madison Square Roof Garden in January, 1906. Her confessions to her husband of relations with White prior to their marriage were repeated on the witness stand when Thaw was tried for the murder.

During the long period of Thaw's incarceration, trials and other legal difficulties, Evelyn lived quietly, the Thaw family supplying her with funds on condition that she keep out of the news columns. Thaw eventually divorced her and Evelyn went to Europe to continue art studies. She returned in 1912, with a baby whom she called Russell K. Thaw, but after long litigation, she failed to secure support for him from the Thaw fortune. She lavished on the child all possible tenderness and care and fought to the limit to establish him as the Thaw.

She then returned to the stage and rose to fame as a dancer, her partner being Jack Clifford. She married Clifford but they were soon separated.

Finally she turned to cabaret work, beginning as an entertainer in Atlantic City. Evelyn regained some of her popularity and traveled all over the country filling engagements.

KIWANIS CLUB HOLDS MEETING

NOTED LONDONER, CONVICTED, WILL APPEAL HIS CASE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

LONDON, Jan. 3.—Sir Basil Thomson, former Scotland Yard's official was convicted today of a charge of misconduct with a woman in Hyde Park and fined £5. The same amount in costs was assessed. A notice that appeal would be taken was entered.

Sir Basil was merely gathering data for literary work when arrested. It was testified on his behalf in the police court.

The defendant's counsel, Sir Henry H. Curtis-Bennett, declared he would call witnesses who knew of Sir Basil's intentions to write about "communism," Hyde Park and solicitation in the west end, generally, and to get his material by visiting the park at night. It was during a conversation with the woman to get such material, said the counsel, that the police made their charge.

Reginald McKenna, former chancellor of the exchequer, and Vice Admiral Sir Reginald Hall, gave evidence regarding Sir Basil's character.

Sir Basil confirmed his counsel's statement that he was in the park to gather material on communism, as he had been informed that a man he wanted to hear would speak there. He was accosted by a woman, and sat down with her to get material for his book. After some conversation, she complained that she was in need of money, and he gave her two or three shillings from his waistcoat pocket, whereupon the constables rushed up and announced their intention of arresting them for indecency. Sir Basil declared the constables' charges were untrue.

EX-CROWN PRINCE CHANGES NAME, BUT NOT AFFECTIONS

MILAN, Italy, Jan. 3.—Former Crown Prince Carol of Roumania, who renounced his right of succession to the throne apparently at the call of love, is to be known in the future as Scarlat Mondreanu. At least that is the name, taken from one of his estates in Roumania, appearing on the passport he has just received from Bucharest.

Carol is still at the hotel where Mme. Magda Lupescu, his auburn haired, blue-eyed, innamorata, is staying. Although having separate apartments, they are almost constantly in each other's company, taking their meals together and slipping out, through the servants' entrance for motor rides.

Magda is reputed to be 28 years old. She is of less than medium height, extremely pale, and wears her striking clothes effectively. She is credited with trying to obtain a divorce from her husband, who is said to be a Rumanian army officer.

MACCABEES ARE INTERESTED IN PROPOSED MERGER

Local members of the Maccabees are greatly interested in a proposed merger between that society and the Ladies of the Maccabees which will be voted on at the Maccabees international convention in Detroit, Mich., January 7.

The Ladies of the Maccabees approved the merger by a two-thirds majority at a convention on December 11, and if it carries in the other society, the combination will result in one of the strongest fraternal benefit associations in the world, with a membership of over 250,000, nearly 500 local lodges, assets in excess of \$25,000,000, and fully organized departments of men, women and children. An affirmative vote in the Maccabees' convention is practically certain, according to A. W. Frye, supreme commander, and the merger will go into effect 90 days after its approval by the Michigan commissioner of insurance.

While the Maccabees and the Ladies of the Maccabees have hitherto had no official connection, they have been brother and sister societies ever since the organization of the latter in 1888, with mutual aims and interests. In the opinion of leaders in both societies, these can be better carried out by operating as one association instead of two, with competition eliminated, reduced expense, and one society giving whole family protection instead of the husband alone.

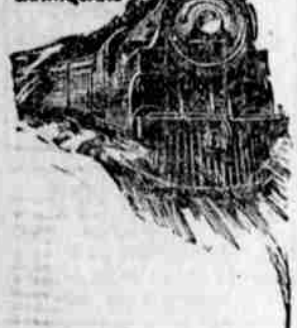
