KLAMATH FALLS — Lucien H. Applegate, last survivor of the famous "Applegate train," which crossed the plains in 1843, and members of a widely known Oregon pioneer family, died at his Swan Lake ranch near Klamath Falls Monday night, as the result of burns which he sustained when ashes from his pipe ignited his clothing on December 27.

Lucien Applegate was born in 1842 in St. Clair county, Missouri, son of Lindsey Applegate, one of the brothers who commanded the train which crossed the plains in 1843. His members settling in Polk county.

In 1850 his family moved to Yoncalla and in 1859 to the Rogue River valley. Lucien settled in Klamath County in 1866. The same year he married Margaret Ellen Grab, who died in 1924. Applegate is survived by six children.

## SCHOOL BOARD WILL CONDEMN RIGHT OF WAY

legal body this morning.

The law provides that before a school district can file suit for condemnation that the approval of the district boundary board must first be gained. The petition filed this morning sets forth substantially the facts contained in the resolution and asks the board for permission to bring suit.

The boundary board is composed of the members of the county court and the county school superintendent, the latter serving as secretary. As the county court is now in session the decision of the board will undoubtedly be obtained within a few days.

As soon as suit can be filed the work of constructing the sewer can be started and the amount of damages to be assessed against the district can be ascertained by a jury when the case is brought to trial.

The board feels that the claim made by Mr. Bellows is not only exorbitant, but is also unfair, as the district purchased the large tract upon which the school stands together with the athletic field and surrounding grounds, eleven acres in all, from Mr. Bellows, paying approximately \$7,000. The sewer right of way, the board contends would not damage the property of Mr. Bellows and he would still have the use of the land.

The board recently agreed to cooperate with Mr. Bellows in the construction of a fence along the school property in return for the right to run the sewer across his land, but this proposition was rejected by him.
