The News-Review this morning received a telegram from Foster Butner, manager of the Umpqua Broccoli Exchange, stating that there is a big attendance at the American Fruit and Vegetable shippers' convention in Chicago. Mr. Butner left Roseburg some time ago to attend to business matters in the east and middle west and to be present at this convention. Manager Robinson Hastings of the Florida Potato Association made an address stressing the importance of trade organizations giving greater consideration to the agricultural problems. THIRD HORSEMAN CLIMBS STAIRS OF FAMOUS SHRINE IN JAPAN

TOKYO, Jan. 7.—For the third time in the history of Japanese horsemanship, a man has ridden up the long, steep stairway of the Atsuta Shrine and made the return journey without injury either to himself or his mount. The intrepid horseman was Tomioka Iwaki. The historic shrine flight is 90 feet high and has an incline of about 60 degrees.

ICE BRIDGE SPANS NIAGARA.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Jan. 7.—A large ice bridge spans the Niagara river below the cataracts today, reaching from the foot of the falls to the upper steel arch bridge. An ice jam is forming in the lower Niagara river, from Lewiston to Fort Niagara and the water has risen four feet. Precautions are being taken to protect property along both the American and Canadian shores.

EXHAUST STACK IS FOUND TO BE SOURCE OF FIRE TO PLANES.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Army air experts believe that in the exhaust stack they have found the fire bug largely responsible for the tendency of the crashed planes to burst into flames, and which cost many lives. The much repeated "flaming coffins" designation of certain old types of army planes by Colonel William Mitchell arose from this tendency.

An air service report said that thirty crash tests were conducted on obsolete airplanes. It was discovered that the exhaust stack was a very serious source of fire, and that if it were possible to so design an exhaust stack that it would be cool enough to prevent the self-ignition of gasoline or oil sprayed into the stack, the number of fires would be very greatly reduced.

"Preliminary designs of standard length, water-cooled exhaust manifolds and short, air-cooled manifolds have shown that it is entirely possible to prevent fires from this source," said the report.

STARMER IN PORTLAND.

Apparently, Douglas county is prolific in federal court cases for Sam Starmar, sheriff, is again in town as a witness in the federal court. Being a federal court witness is becoming a habit with the sheriff. "The last gobbler has been sold; the broccoli will be shipped in another month and then Douglas county will prepare to ship berries," explained the sheriff. "Strawberries ripen early in our district," he continued, "and it is not unusual for Douglas county strawberries to be shipped to market in April, which is a month or two before some other districts can get their berries ripe. Douglas county is fortunate, for it has one crop after another throughout the year, so that there is a constant stream of freight going out and a constant stream of money coming in for the products. No wonder we have a good county."—Oregonian.

WIFE HURLS ACID IN FACE ALLEGED WRECKER OF HOME

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—Mrs. Mabel Mayer, wife of Lee Mayer, head of the Mayer Productions Company of Los Angeles, is held in the city prison here charged with throwing acid in the face of Miss Elsa Granger, an actress, who says she is employed by the Mayer Company.

Mrs. Mayer called detectives to her home early today and pointing to a newspaper account of the acid throwing said: "It is correct." She declined to say anything further.

Miss Granger was in the restaurant of a downtown hotel when a woman threw a vial of acid in her face, saying: "You'll never break up another home. I'll mar you for life." The woman then rushed out of the hotel and disappeared.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—Mrs. Lee Mayer, wife of a traveling show producer who threw a quantity of "acid" into the face of Miss Granger, 22, leading woman of the revue, at a hotel here last night, when she charged that Miss Granger had "broken up her home," was released in police court today when Miss Granger refused to prosecute. It developed that the acid was skin of a human. Most of it landed on Miss Granger's hat.

"It was all a misunderstanding," the actress told the court. "I am satisfied Mrs. Mayer did not know what she was doing."

Mrs. Mayer said she had purchased the acid with the intention of drinking it but "I flew into a rage when I argued with her and then I threw the stuff."

She declared she had been separated from her husband for two months and that she had accepted "stories" that Miss Granger was responsible for her domestic difficulties, but that she had made a mistake.

FROHMAN URGES MORE TIME AND MONEY ON LOCAL TALENT.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Daniel Frohman has little sympathy with expeditions of American producers to foreign countries for actors and plays, and time, effort and money, he believes, could be used to better advantage in this country.

There are hundreds of actors and writers in the United States who can meet the demands of the stage, he says, and adds that the impression in some quarters that foreign players and plays have a greater attraction here, is erroneous.

After many years of activity as manager and producer, Frohman now rests in his quiet offices near Broadway among the memories of a glorious past and the significant facts of the present.

His theatre is leased to someone else and he has no production to him the "game now is too much of a risk," owing to competition and the "high cost of everything." Most of his time is devoted to the Actors Fund of America.

Mauds Adams, Hackett, Fotherham, Sothman, John Drew, May Trehan, Mr. and Mrs. Kendall and many other stars have played in his shows. He has been in intimate association with the world's greatest playwrights.

"The talent of today is just as great," he said in making comparisons, "but our players haven't the same opportunities—the plays now do not supply them."

DISCOUNT RATE CLIMBS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Formally recognizing a tightening of credit conditions throughout the country the federal reserve bank of New York today advanced its rediscount rate to four per cent from the 3 1/2 per cent charge that has been in effect since February 27. The change followed the increase in the Bank of England rate from four to five per cent December 3.

SUITCASE WITH VALUABLES AWAITS MISSING OWNER

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7.—A certificate for 15 shares of stock in the Security Loan and Savings Association of Eugene, valued at \$1500 and signed by John H. Coke, is among effects in a suitcase found by a police officer under a sidewalk here today. The certificate is made out to E. R. Patterson, to

whom the abandoned suitcase evidently belongs, but where Patterson is, or who hid the suitcase under the sidewalk is a mystery. It had apparently been hidden several weeks. The place where it was found is not far from the Southern Pacific railroad yards.

Among other articles is an Oregon automobile driver's license, also made out to Patterson and dated last September. There are several cancelled checks signed by Patterson and drawn on Johnson Brothers, bankers, of Dufur, Ore. A letter is addressed to Patterson at Box 2, Dufur, and the driver's license gives his address as The Dalles.
